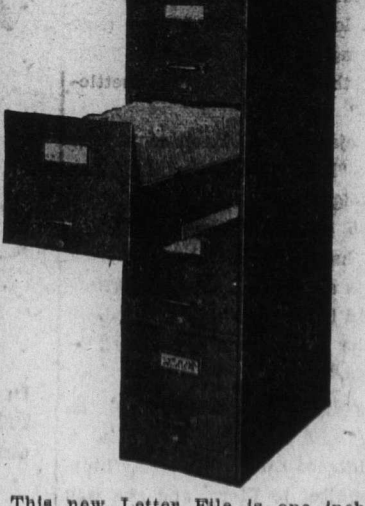

### Grim Fight Saved Grand Falls

We congratulate the fire fighters at Grand Falls on the grim and determined fight they put up to save the mills and the town from destruction by the big fire which sprang up in the mill, which supply the mills. To those who have not seen the great piles of billet, which are like ranges of hills, it is difficult to realize the formidable task which was before them. Although a fire break has been made and the fire is now under control, great care will have to be exercised in seeing that it does not spring up again with renewed fury. In the underparts of the heaps the billets will be largely carbonized from the heat in the absence of air and there will be immense quantities of charcoal formed which will consume slowly just as the middle and lower layers of anthracite in a slow combustion stove. It is, however, a matter of sincere thankfulness that the fire has been got under control and that the danger to the immense pulp and paper works and electric plant and the town has been averted. Newfoundland could ill afford to have had this town and plant destroyed. It would have meant an immense loss not only to the Company, but to thousands of people who are dependent on it. It would have been a severe blow also to the future development of Newfoundland if this immense plant had been destroyed before it had been proved that a big plant could be made into a dividend paying concern. Newfoundland prospects in future developments in this direction would have been put back for a generation or more. It is therefore with sincere thankfulness we congratulate the people of Grand Falls and not forgetting the women, on the fight they put up to save an industry on which so much depends.

## BIG FIRE At Ottawa

### Parliament Building Almost Destroyed.

Two Women Dead—Some Members Injured by Fire—Others Made Hasty Exit Through Dense Smoke.

OTTAWA, To-day. The fire of unknown origin which broke out in the reading room of the Houses of Parliament just after the resumption of the sitting last night caused the legislators to make a hasty exit through the windows and by ladders and seek safety in the bitter cold night without hats or overcoats. So rapidly did the dense smoke spread that many of them had difficulty in finding their way through the corridors. Hon. Martin Burrell, Minister of Agriculture, was severely burned about the head and face. Dr. Michael Clark, M. P. of Red Deer, was burned about the hands. Fire Chief Tremblay, with a company of firemen in charge of one steamer motor hose wagon left Montreal for Ottawa about 11 o'clock last night in a special Grand Trunk train to assist fighting the fire. The bodies of two women have been taken out of the Commons gallery dead. From the reading room situated in the northeastern corner of the Commons Chamber, dense volumes of smoke immediately caused members to evacuate the House. Part of the roof over the reading room chamber has fallen in. Women who jumped from a second story building were badly injured. Several other persons were overcome with smoke and have been taken to the hospitals. Sir Robert Borden got out safely. Sir Wilfred Laurier was not in the House.

OTTAWA, To-day. The fire which broke out in the reading room adjacent Chamber Commons, main building, in the Commons houses rapidly spread and at midnight was still beyond control of firemen, spreading towards Senate side of building; two lives are known to have been lost, while scores of people were overcome by dense smoke, others were injured. The women have been yet to be estimated. Members of the Commons in the Chamber and various Parliamentary officers had to admit their way to safety. The people in the upper stories of the building had a narrow escape, scores having been taken out by ladders.

### MAYOR MARTIN'S STORY.

Mayor Martin, of Montreal, first alarmed the members of the Chamber on his way to his room which was the library when he heard the explosion which may or may not be caused by spontaneous combustion among newspapers. He immediately rushed to the Chamber and shouted fire, and despite the efforts of firemen the fire rapidly spread through the great corridors of the main building quickly eating its way through the Commons Chamber roof which fell in. The Speaker's Chambers is destroyed with their many valuable paintings and costly furnishings. There were a number of persons in the galleries of the Commons and they had great difficulty in fighting their way down the narrow stairways to safety. Several officers assisted the people in making respirators of their clothing and aided many to battle their way out. Two soldiers were taken to hospital badly cut with falling glass. Mayor Mederic Martin, of Montreal, told his story to the Eastern Press shortly after his arrival at Chateau Laurier escaped uninjured, but was mourning the loss of his fur coat and cap and other wearing apparel. "I was on my way from the Chamber to my room which is near the library, said Mayor Martin, and had gone through the door on the east side of the Commons' Chamber, when I heard an explosion and instantaneously flames shot out from the reading room. I realized that there was a blaze. My first thought was the fire extinguisher which was in the chair and everything was tranquil until I dashed through the door and shouted fire and a big one. I turned toward my room again, but by that time the corridor was filled with smoke and the flames were beginning to show in the Chamber. I then cried for members to get out, ran around by room 16 giving the alarm, and there escaping into the open air. I saw them helping one Minister. I think it was Burrell, out of his room, and later saw Dr. Clark, who had been burned about the face and hands. I put in an order for the Montreal Fire Brigade. I notified Chief Tremblay to send as many men as possible. The flames swept along the corridor at an awful rate. It seemed just a few minutes until the whole place was black with smoke, making it impossible to see. There was not much confusion on the floor of the House, and to this many members probably owe their escape.

### WILSON WANTS FULL DISAVOWAL.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., To-Day. President Wilson received from Secretary of State Lansing yesterday what members of his party characterized as very important despatches relating to the foreign situation. Their contents were not revealed, but it was understood they related to the Lusitania and American interests. The President spent the late afternoon reading despatches in his private car, and through them getting in touch with developments of the foreign situation since he left Washington. The final settlement of the Lusitania case is expected soon after the President arrives at Germany. He is determined that Germany shall make a full disavowal and reparation, and it is understood he will be satisfied with nothing less.

### FRONTIER ENCOUNTER.

LONDON, To-Day. Reuter's Athens correspondent has received a report from good sources that an encounter between Bulgarians and Allies troops took place Tuesday on the Greco-Bulgarian frontier. The Bulgarians fired at a French detachment reconnoitering at a point near the Macedonian and Bulgarian frontiers meet, but the Allies repulsed the Bulgarians.

GRIMSBY, Eng., To-Day. He noticed from 17 to 29 members of the crew were clinging to the envelope. boats. We all went under with the ship. When I came up again I caught hold of a life belt. After swimming for some time I saw across the Chief Engineer and the Steward, who had also managed to get hold of a life belt, and by their aid we kept afloat for an hour. It was pitiful to hear the cries of some other men who had come to the surface after the disappearing of the vessel. But soon their cries ceased. We concluded all were drowned. Meanwhile we continued shouting for help. When we were almost exhausted a Belgian steamer heard us, and lowered a boat and picked us up. Subsequently we were transferred to a mine sweeper and landed. Asked how the Zepplin managed to locate the vessel in the dark, Hillier said the collier was riding at anchor, and her anchor lights must have been seen by the men of the Zepplin. As the vessel was stationary it was easy to drop bombs on her.

### PRaises WORKMEN'S EFFORTS TO TURN OUT SHELLS.

LONDON, To-Day. David Lloyd George, Minister of Munitions, addressing the workers of a new shell factory, congratulated them on the manner in which they had renewed their pledges to deliver the goods. This, said the Minister, is a fight not merely between the British army and the army of the Kaiser. It is a fight between British workmen and the workshops of Germany. British workmen are now supplying material which is going to enable us to destroy forever the despotism of Prussian militarism, and inaugurate the reign of freedom in Europe. In the old days, the hustler was regarded as an alien enemy come over to this country to steal trade from easy going British, but now we have discovered we can hustle ourselves. We used to think that none but Americans and Germans could run up workshops in no time, fill them with machinery and turn out great shells, but now we are doing it ourselves. Mrs. Winston Churchill, at the same meeting, read a letter from her husband, the former First Lord of the Admiralty, now a Major in Flanders, in which he said, as a result of Lloyd George's labors and the workmen responding to his call were already obvious at the front. Our infantry in the trenches, writes Major Churchill, cheer when they see British guns are able to reply sometimes threefold to every German shell and always replying with interest. During the campaign of 1916, if the noble exertions now being made in the workshops of Britain, are maintained without flagging, we ought for the first time in the conflict to meet the enemy on equal terms, and even with an advantage which will steadily increase.

### HEAVY SHELLING.

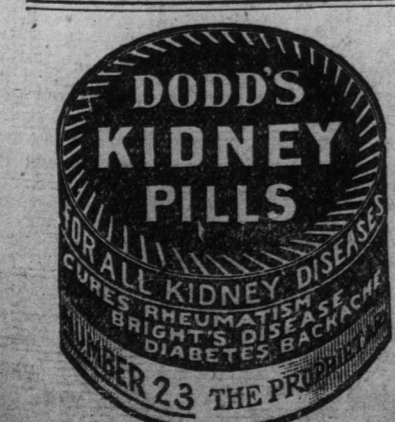

The power of elusiveness to make a woman more attractive in courtship days is universally recognized. Every woman who knows anything about the art of charming a man knows that. Now is marriage bad for the memory? If not, why is it that the average woman forgets this fact just as soon as she is married, and practices just the opposite tactics? Perhaps you think I am foolish not to recognize that marriage is a very different state from courtship, and that it would be impossible for a woman living in the house with a man and sharing his daily existence to remain the elusive creature she was when he was courting her.

No, I didn't forget that, but I don't think she needs to go to the opposite extreme.

She Even Asks Him What He Is Thinking About.

Let me tell you about one young married woman who typifies the attitude to which I am objecting. She is very fond of her husband, and her fondness shows itself in this way—she simply can't let him alone for a minute. I don't know how she acts when they are by themselves, but when they are with intimate friends she is always straightening his tie, picking a thread off his coat, or going over to sit on the arm of his chair. When he reads, she asks him what he is reading about; when he is silent, she asks him what he is thinking of. It is her boast that he almost

never goes out evenings without her, and when they had been married three years I heard her declare that she had never been away from home a single night.

Her Husband Seems a Little Bored.

Now, of course I may be mistaken, but it does seem to me that there is a certain boredom in her husband's manner sometimes, a rather forced tenderness in the way he receives some of her onslaughts of affection. ### Escaped German Spy Writes.

New York, Jan. 21.—The New York American this morning says: The following letter was received last night from I. T. T. Lincoln, the escaped spy. It was delivered by messenger to a boy at the entrance to the New York American's office.

Concerning where it came from the American has no knowledge: "New York, Jan. 20, 1916. Editor New York American:—Jokes aside, my escape is a serious matter and there is more behind this statement than anybody can imagine. "I have tonight addressed a note to Capt. Offley's office making a final appeal not to act as subservient tools of the British government against me. I will see what they will do.

"If reason, fair play and justice prevail at Washington, I will surrender of my own free will. Washington knows what I mean but if not then I will disclose the full story of my case and fight to the American people through your columns.

"The crux of the whole thing is that Great Britain is directing the secret service of the country as it apparently is directing the other departments as well.

"But whatever happens, I will certainly not tolerate that either United States Marshal Power or United States Deputy Marshal Johnson or anybody else be made a scapegoat for the inexcusable blunder of people higher up at Washington.

"Many people will consider it presumptuous for an individual thus to speak, why? Meanwhile, I request Deputy Marshal Johnson to participate in the hunt. He can see from my statements published in your columns this morning that I want to save him.

"I am not afraid of him, nevertheless, if he will not immediately drop out of this childish hunt of a so-called secret service agent, I consider it as a deliberately unfriendly act, and speak out.

"I refuse to be hunted, bullied and calumniated by an assinine British government. It is my innate right to fight against it with every means available, just as any government fights another.

"The next step rests with the United States government. Yours very truly, I. T. T. LINCOLN."

# War News.

Messages Received  
Previous to 9 A.M.

OFFICIAL.

LONDON, Feb. 3.  
The Governor, Newfoundland.  
Headquarters in France report that the enemy attempted a surprise attack, without previous bombardment, against our position on the Ypres-Pilkem road. It was easily repulsed. Elsewhere was mining activity. In the Caucasus the Russians approached Chorok River, and near Erzerum successfully engaged the Turkish advanced guards.

BONAR LAW.  
M. S. ACT WILL COME INTO FORCE FEBRUARY 10.

LONDON, Feb. 3.  
King George at a Privy Council meeting to-day signed a proclamation fixing February 10th as the appointed date at which the Military Service Act shall be regarded as coming into force. According to the law, all single men between 18 and 41, who have not attested under Earl Derby's recruiting plan, and are not exempt under the Act, will be allowed until March 2nd to attest. After that time they become conscripts, and may be compelled to serve.

INQUEST HELD.

LONDON, Feb. 3.  
An inquest was held to-day on the cases of 13 Zeppelin victims in Staffordshire. A verdict was returned of willful murder against the Kaiser and Crown Prince, Germany being accessories to and after the fact.

REPULSE SURPRISE ATTACK.

LONDON, Feb. 3.  
The following British official statement has been issued regarding operations on the western front: One of our patrols last night after shooting a hostile sentry, threw hand grenades into the hostile trenches established at the northern end of Frise. At about eleven thirty o'clock this morning the enemy attempted a surprise attack against our trenches near Ypres on the Pilkem Road. The attack was not successful, but any artillery bombardment, and was easily repulsed by our fire.

GERMANS ATTACK.

PARIS, Feb. 3.  
The following statement was given out at the War Office this afternoon: The night was calm and there is nothing of importance to report. Shortly after midday yesterday, following a spirited bombardment, the Germans launched an attack against our positions at Bois Des Buttes in the north Aisne region, and the village of Bois.

REPORT FROM TRAWLER.

LONDON, Feb. 3.  
A fishing trawler reported to-day to the naval authorities that she had seen a German Zeppelin in the North Sea in a sinking condition. This was stated in an official announcement given out this evening.

AUSTRIAN COLUMNS ADVANCING.

GENEVA, Feb. 3.  
Austrian columns are continuing to march along the sea towards Avlona Albania, and have reached the northernmost source of the River Mati, telegrams from Austria affirm.

WILSON AT TOPEKA.

TOPEKA, Kans., Feb. 3.  
"For one thing it may be necessary," President Wilson said with emphatic gesture here to-day, "to use the forces of the United States to vindicate our rights so that American citizens everywhere may enjoy the right of international law. America is not going to abide habitual or continual neglect of these rights." The President also declared that the American flag would come down in the Philippines, as it has in Cuba, as soon as we feel the Philippines can take over their own affairs, and our protection is no longer required.

STEAMER SINKS OWING TO AN EXPLOSION.

HUNTINGDON, West Va., Feb. 3.  
"Sam Brown" a Pittsburg steamboat sank within a few minutes after her boilers exploded in the Ohio River opposite this city to-day. The great majority of the members of the crew, approximately thirty, are believed to have perished. Not more than six survivors reached the Ohio side of the river following the explosion.

'BELLE OF FRANCE' SUNK.

LONDON, Feb. 3.  
The British steamer Belle of France has been sunk. The Europeans in her crew and 22 Lascars were landed. Nineteen Lascars are missing.

'CHAS. E. HILL' SUNK.

LONDON, Feb. 3.  
Reports of the sinking in mid-Atlantic of the British freighter Chas. E. Hill, from New York on January 13th for Havre, with a cargo of supplies for the French Government, were confirmed to-day. The Chas. E. Hill foundered on Jan. 15th. Her crew was rescued by the Spanish steamer Adriatic from New York for Barcelona, and arrived at Gibraltar Feb. 1st.

DUTCH VESSEL TORPEDOED.

HOOK OF HOLLAND, Feb. 3.  
Continued activity by German submarines in the North Sea is evidenced by the torpedoing of the Dutch motor vessel Artemis near the Noord Dinden Lightship. The Artemis arrived here to-day lacking badly.

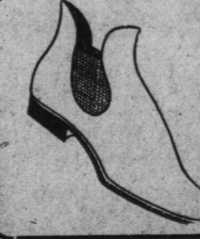

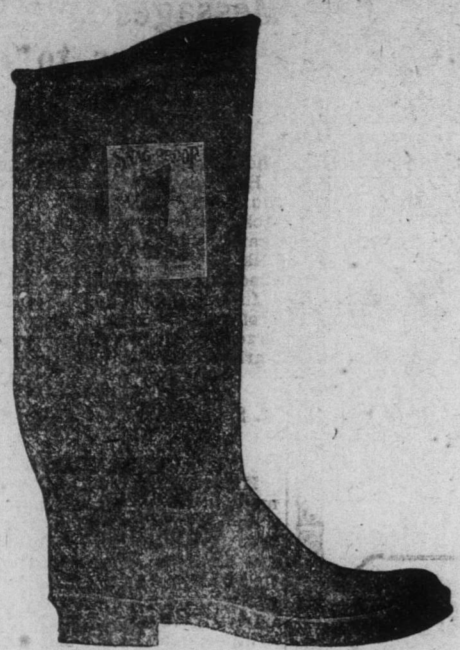

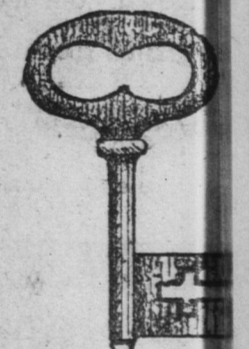
