





out on your switch and press the starter button, the hand on the ammeter should ossilate slightly backwards and forwards to the discharge side, if it does this it is more or less sure that the ignition is right, so turn your attention to the gasoline supply. In my experience in the last few vears the greatest cause of trouble has been dirt or water in the gasoline, so you want to make sure that asoline is getting to the carburettor. On most cars you can get at the float chamber of the carburettor and in the centre of this there is a small shaft of metal sticking up through the cover of the float chamber which is called the needle valve. Sometime this is covered with a screw cap which is easily removable. To find out if gasoline is coming to

the carburettor lift up this needle valve and in from five to fifteen seconds gasoline should flow out of the carburettor, if the gasoline flows out. then turn your attention back to the electrical system, but if the gasoline does not come out then you have a rather dirty job ahead of you.

I must not forget, however, that our friend the Ford has not the regulation needle valve and it is not so easy to find out whether gasoline is in the carburettor or not. On the Ford float chamber at the bottom there is a screwed plug with a pin through the end to turn it by. If you unscrew this plug gasoline should flow freely, let it flow for several secconstant, if it does not flow at all you know your trouble is gasoline.

We are now in the position of assuming the gasoline is at fault, so let us take the causes that can stop the soline getting to the carburettor.

If these two are right screw them back into place and look at the pipe from the bottom of the vacuum tank leading to the carburettor, as there s another wire gauze filter here which we will call number three. This is where you usually find your trouble if it is gasoline trouble. If when this pipe is disconnected gasoline flows freely from the pipe, yet will not flow out of the carburettor when the needle valve is lifted, you know your trouble is there. This filter is usually taken off by the carburettor, at the very bottom of the carburettor, when you have taken this off remove the wire gauze and cleanse in gasoline. Now I can hear you ask, where am I going to get gasoline to clean it with on a country road in the middle of the night. 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London In Figures.

Where the Death-Rate is Highest-Widowers Who Do Not Like To

Romance is not usually to be Flound in books devoted to statistics. yet "London Statistics," 1921-3 (P. S. King and Son), contains some wonderfully interesting and diverting information. For instance, we learn that while the population of Greater London is still increasing, soaring towards the 8,000,000 mark, that of the County of London is slowly and steadily shrinking. This is evidence of the great migration to suburbian the last 20 years. The City shows the greatest drop in population, and toroughs that show it noticeably are Chelsea, Bermondsey, Finsbury, Holborn, Westminster, St. Marylebone and Stepney. On the other hand. There were only 152,795 births in 1922 in Greater London, as compared with 193,052 in 1920. Only 148 babies were born in the City. Shoreditch held the record for babies in 1922 with 28 for every 1,000 of population; Bermondsey (26.9), Poplar (26.7), and West Ham (25.7) were close rivals. More affluent Westminster (13.3), Hampstead (14.8) and Wimbledon (14.1) were the boroughs with the lowest birthrates per 1.000. There were nearly as many deaths by violence as from old age in 1922. Only 3.5 per cent. of the deaths in the L.C.C. area in that year were due to old age, while 3.3 per cent. were due to suicide and other forms of violence. More than one-third of the total number of deaths occurred among persons over 65. Nobody over 15 died of whooping cough. Bermondsey had the highest death-rate with 16.9 per 1,000 of population; Finsbury and Shoreditch were next with 16.3. Hampstead and Lewisham (11.2) had the lowest rate in the L.C.C. area, though they do not seem to be so healthy as many of the outer suburban boroughs, where the rates are extremely low, falling to 9.7 in the case of Southall-Norwood. On the evidence of this most interesting book widowers do not like to marry widows; the widows in turn prefer bachelors. In 1921, 4,104 widowers remarried, but only 1,579 of them chose widows, although 4,-445 widows were married again in that year. The book talks also in figures of London's weather. 
