

Let us assume that the will of the people made itself felt on both government and oposition in turn. Let it be underood, too, that the amount payable to the recipients under any one of these schemes may be too small by comparison with family requirements. The fact still remains, however, that some provision is now made where it did

not exist before. Before proceeding further one point ought to be made clear on unemployment. It is probably quite true that unemployment and short time is more serious to-day in Britain than at any pre-war period. But who can tell? It is only since the unemployment insurance scheme came into full operation that there has been any real basis of calculation in this connection; and whilst there are more unemployed than in 1913 there are also more persons engaged in industry now than before the war. What has happened is hat our industrial undertakings have failed to absorb the increase in population in our country; and emigration for some unknown reason is not flourishing. The "quota" system of the U.S.A. is the most serious factor in this respect. Let us try to further dispel the pessimism about the old country by taking into account vital statistics. After all, it is a fair indication into the life of a nation to find out what, more particularly, health and criminal figures show. In 1915 54.295 persons died from consumption in England and Wales. In 1923 the figure had been reduced to

40.788. The infantile mortality in 1910 was 111 per 1,000 births, in 1922 it was only 77. In the language of our present minister of health "A baby born to-day may reasonably expect to live twelve years longer than his grandfather." The deaths from consumption in 1867 were 2,653 per million: in 1922 only 855.



The Archbishop Complains About Bad Preaching

AND SO DO OTHERS.

"Ii Something Better is Desired
Must be Paid For," Says One
('ritic.

"I have no doubt at all that the average preaching to-day is less thoughtful, less painstaking than it was in our fathers' days. And for mending the lack we need more midnight oil, or, what is better, more forenoon hours with closed doors, steady, if miscellaneous, study, and big notebooks. With all my soul I would urge upon those whose ministry is still young and plastic that they should turn not thoughts only but efforts that way."

"When we speak to-day we have to speak to those who have been taught to think, and who, as certainly as any generation which ever lived, are ready to listen whole-heartedly to the man who stands there, not because he has to say something but because he has something to say."—The Archbishop of Canterbury.

There may not be much prospect of y-union, but the heads of the Churchas seem to be united as to the serious character of the problem of our halffilled Churches. Early October is always a miniature "May Meeting" season, as the Church Congress and the
Autumnal Assembly of the Congregational Union prove. The Archbishop
of Canterbury urged the clergy to devote more time for preaching, while
Dr. J. D. Jones, at Bournemouth,

Naturally the subject of preaching good or bad sermons has captured the interest of the leader writers and newspaper correspondents. The Countess of Oxford in the Sunday Times boldly says, concerning the extract from the Archbishop's address quoted

"I rather doubt if what our muchless Archibishop said in his opening the Archibeshop said in his opening the archibeshop said in his opening the archibeshop sermon. It is not midtable oil, closed doors, or big noteless so much as intellectual materin that is wanted, and for this you not education and a living wage to enable young men to enlist in the ministry of the Church.

"I never understand why the clergy should be expected to preach a good sermon, not only once but often twice every Sunday, and why if this is so they do not quote from some of the great sermons which have been printed. Men like Robertson, Magee, and Liddon have published sermons which, if read now and then, would double the congregation in many of the Churches in these islands."

"The preacher who would make a mark on his times must keep abreast of them—not, of course, in the sense of running after every current fashion or fad of speculation, but in the sense of knowing where the great mass of fairly intelligent people stand, how much he may assume them to know, at what points he may expect their moral or spiritual difficulties to begin," asserts the Manchester Guardian while "Optimus" (the nom de plume of a well-known preacher), in the Westminister Gazette, says:—

"The Archbishop's advice to the clergy either to burn more midnight oil or to keep their study doors more lightly shut in the morning was a good home thrust. The clergy are too apt to regard the sermon as something to be got through at the least cost in prepartion. At the same time, people to-day do not want sermons that are academic and bookish.

"They want a message for real life, not a learned disquisitio on sublects of abstract interest. Too much time and too many words have been spent on God's Word to Israel centurles ago, and far too little on God's



Motor Boat Rainbow IV. Smashes all Records

ther evidence that the highmotor boat may be designed built to afford both safety and d bulit to anora both safety and durance was afforded recently on the Rosseau, Muskoka, when Harry Greening's Rainbow IV, was driv-1.218.8 miles in 24 hours, an averspeed of 50.78 miles per hour. Greening is a Hamilton man is internationally known as a boat enthusiast, and has ownmany famous power boats. He has never aimed at speed alone, but at peed combined with endurance and reliability and two notable achievenents stand to his credit in this renect: the record set by Rainbow IV cently and the record of 1064 miles in 24 hours made two years age on Rosseau with Rainbow III, In both these instances Mr. Greening was assisted by Herbert Ditchburn of Gravenhurst, another power best en-thusiast, who built the hulls of Rain-bow III and Rainbow IV. Apart from the figures set by the two Rainbo the best mileage ever recorded over water for twenty-four hours was some 770 miles chalked up to the credit of the giant Cunarder, "Mauretania," on one of her record-making passages.

Rainbow IV's average speed of

50.78 miles per hour during the recent trials was figured on elapsed time which included stops of about three minutes every 115 miles for refuelling and changing crews. It also included a stop of thirty minutes when one of her gas lines became clogged and the motor consequently ceased to function. When allowance is made for these stops, her speed during the twenty-four hours of operation works out at about 54 miles per hour. The maximum speed of which she is canable is a little better than 60 miles per

That a twenty-seven foot boat could be driven through the water at such speed for so many hours and finish in condition for untold hours more of operation without adjustment or repairs is a striking tribute to modern design and construction. No automatic bailers were used on this test run and examination at the conclusion of the twenty-four hours disclosed that the hull was as tight and sound as on the day she was launched.

Commissioner Duncan

BAYS BRITISH COAL SUBSIDIT A

Sir Andrew Duncan, chosen by the British Government as chairman of the Board which will inquire into coal mining conditions in the Nova Scotia mining area following the strike there this year, recently arrived on the Cunard Liner Alaunia.

Discussing conditions in England, Sir Andrew believed a great deal of the so-called unrest in Great Britain at present was due to the uneven scale of wages as between different irades. Without venturing an opinion on the merits or demerits of this scale, he said certain classes were dissatisfied when they realized train drivers were receiving, say, fifteen shillings more, a week, than men employed in the basic industries.

"It is for the individual to decide in his own mind whether or not this is unfair," he said, "but one thing seems to be proven, a Government cannot interfere in the matter of wage scales, or, for that matter in business."

This led to a question about the coal subsidy and drew from Sir Andrew the comment that the dole is a mistake because it gives other industries a lever to use in demanding subsidies from the British Government. In a nutshell, he considers the subsidy to the coal industry in British is a dangerous precedent.

So many are given that the supply of friends runs out, and people who dine out much know that at nine dinners out of ten they will sit among people they don't know well. One talks, but not so wittly and freely as of old; for conversation also is a lost art. And as for singing, they would think one was inchristed.

Finally, one knows that one must eat fast. In these days of independent women, Eve will not allow the men to sit long over the port. They may smoke half a cigar, swallow a glass of port—and off they must go to join the darlings for bridge, or Mah Jongg or

The worst of all dinners are theatre dinners. You dine in a terrific hurry, the women generally are in ill-humar, having had to dress and tittivate in haste, someone is always late, which adds to the general strain. Why dipe at all? A sandwich and a short drink are quite sufficient. After all, the play's the thing. After it, one can sup at leisure and discuss it. That is, the time for the good wine, the carefully-chosen, well-cooked dishes.


