A third question is that of a route into the country. This route is in some respects the best that can be suggested. The only objection to it is that its terminus is in territory over which the United States now exercises jurisdiction. The route from Telegraph Creek on the Stickeen to Lake Teslin involves a longer overland journey, but has the advantage of being an all British route. At present the course taken by the trail is somewhat roundabout: but the government is expecting at any day to be put in possession of a report as to a more direct line. If this is favor able, the government is prepared to open the trail and, if the appropriation made at the last session is not sufficient to spend what is necessary and trust t the legislature to sanction the outlay. As the Dominion government has Mr. St. Cyr, C.E., on the same ground, and as Sir Wilfrid Laurier has promised that the Dominion government will do what it can to supply the needed connections it will probably not be necessary in any event for the Provincial government to exceed last session's appropriation; but if it is, we are sure that public opinion will support them in doing so.

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




