An Indian Claim. Dr. P. E. Jones, chief of the Mesquias Indians of the Credit, is in Ottawa looking up evidence in support of claims which his tribe are alleged to possess upon certain lands in Ontario. He has been granted access to copies of all ancient treaties bearing upon the subject. He also brings a claim for money, contending that from 1820 to 1855 there was a yearly deficiency of \$200 in payments to his tribe, and the principal was acknowledged and paid in 1858, no interest was allowed; the lands claimed by Indians include Mesquias Point, near Niagara, five miles of Burlington Beach, and a hundred acres on Burlington Heights; Long Point, on the shore of Lake Erie; Turkey Point, in the same vicinity; the Blue Bell property, consisting of about four acres, near Toronto, opposite the residence of the late Col.
