Upon reading the petition of Fred Lewis, Registrar of Probate, it was ordered that the said Registrar be allowed to pledge the credit of the county to the extent of \$25.00 yearly to provide suitable fire protection for the books and records of the Probate Court.

Upon reading the petition of Allison Smith and others, it was ordered that Fletcher A. Roy be allowed to do his statute labor on his own private road, under the supervision of the Surveyor of Highways.

Upon reading the petition of Isiah Palmer and upwards of twenty others, praying for the alteration of the road around the Sand Hill, so called, on the Vaux road, in Ward No. 1, it was ordered that the prayer thereof be granted, and a committee be appointed to inquire into the propriety and necessity of said alteration.

Upon reading the report of the Committee on Finance, it was ordered that the report of said committee be received and adopted.

The following are the reports: To the Wardens and Councilors in Session convened— Your Finance Committee beg to report that they have examined the 1894 accounts, papers, etc., placed in their hands for 1894, which are herewith annexed.

Your committee again call the attention of the Council to the delay occasioned by bills not being in the hands of the Clerk at the opening of the session, and respectfully suggest that in future a strict rule be made admitting no accounts or bills after the first day of the session.

Upon hearing read the report of the Committee on the Construction of Inmate Asylum, it was ordered that said report be received and adopted.

The following is the report: To the Municipal Council now convened at the annual meeting of April, 1894.

GENTLEMEN—Your committee appointed and empowered to build an Inmate Asylum at the annual meeting of April, 1894, to report.

The full committee, with the exception of one, met at Bridgetown, May 2nd, 1894, to consider the building of a new, and having made a close study of the various reports, building resolved that the work of construction be commenced as soon as satisfactory arrangements could be made.

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We decided to commence the construction of the building by day's work and materials, as we deemed expedient, from time to time, notwithstanding the fact that tenders had been received for its construction in amounts from \$5,000 to \$12,000.

In looking over plans and specifications, we decided that if any tender was received, we would have to provide for additional work which would amount to a large sum. Furthermore, we would be at a disadvantage if we deemed changes in construction necessary after the contract had been made.

We have nearly constructed a building, with general improvements, an outlay less than the lowest tender received, and we are confident that we have secured a better building than we first supposed would be required.

We found when the building was well on towards completion, that by raising the top of the walls about 4 feet we would get the safety of the building, requiring seventy-five thousand more brick, and five thousand more cement.

Having spaces for twelve rooms more than at first contemplated, we asked a meeting of the Council, called by the Warden, what should be done with the extra rooms. It was decided that the rooms should be completed, and that we have done so.
