They are all , pleased with the Communion set, as, indeed, they may well he We think it is beautiful. The bowl was first used las Communion Sunday to baptize Njangelo. a bright, intelliger girl ; she is the thirtieth member. She was married last wee to Kangombe, who was also chosen by the church as fit fo baptism, but he was then away at the coast with one of or cara yans. However, next Commanion service (D.V.) he will b admitted. Three new applicants have entered the Catechumen class. We are extremely busy just now getting ready fo Christmas. The people around are looking forward to the annual feast; it is becoming quite an institution. An ox or trf will be killed. The women in the villages are already poundin corn as their contribution.
The boys' letter was composed entirely by Ngulu, with th sanction of the others. He sat up till late to finish it and the roused the others out of bed to sign it ! This may account fo the shaky signatures. What is written is exactly as they all fee

Ondona Sanders, - The letter of this church which we put pose to write to you all. by oux hands, and with pure love.
have for a long time cast our eyes upon Yehova, our God, and when we needed anything He cared for us. Our little company of the church have for some time wished for fit cups to drink the holy blond of our Master Jesus. Then our teacher told us there were ladies in his country who were going to give us cups and plates. To hear this we were glad tc Yehova, God, all we believers, women and men and children, the day that they came, and when we saw them we rejoiced indeed. We who are nembers, voung people, women and men, number thirty (30) how. Many are learning the Holy Scriptures of Yehova. We think that in the beginning of the year we shall see others join the church. We rejoice to the Holy God our Father because many have beiieved. Here in this country are so many who have not yet believed-it makes pity. We pray that His mercy come to our church. We look to Him. He sees us every day of our earthly life. We rejoice to think of the heavenly life, vhere there is no stumbling but an eternity full of joy and love. We think again of you who do not know us sending us those pups. We thank you greatly. We think of the words of our Master, that wherever His words are spoken He will be with us. We could never buy cups like those-no, indeed, but you gave 18 the gift. The blessed of God Vehova will receive their eward above. If we could see your faces it would be good. Ne cannot see you, but ye know that we shall not always teman on the earth, we go to the grave. But they who have fied in Christ shall rise first and they who are alive shall pe caught up to rejoice with a satisfied heart ; and we, too, the time shall come when we shall see heaven. These things we vrite unto you, beloved, because of your kindness. In your country you knew many good things and words, while we know nothing yet. We did know that there was a God, but we fid not worship Him till the years the good teachers came, and hen we perceived what was right, and up to this time the work fi the Gospel goes on. Our teacher is all alone and many boys, till God put him to this work, and he is well. We love him as pur father. He advises us well that we may continue in peace and do our work. We call Nana Kole our chief and our ather.
Ondona Sanders, we thank you again for what you have sent 18. Keep in the grace of God our Master. Because of His Word we shall pray for each other, for we are your children. The time will come when in all countries God will call the people that they may believe.
We of Cisamba write to jou. Remember to pray for the nercy of God (u) us. As ye desire to be gaved, so have we fesired. Pray for us. We shall pray for you that you may well. We send our love to you all.

## From Miss Margret M. Melville.

 Cisamba, W. C. Africa, Dec. 20th, 1896.Dear Loved Ones,-I am still all alone. This has seem such a long day, and I seem to have accomplished so little. . did not have service until nearly twelve o'cluck, as the rain jo poured all morning, and only cleared about eleven, so there we not so many as usuai. There was also a funeral at the villas near. Whilst our service was going on we heard shouting a singing, accompanied by the ocingerfer, or native drum, which te played at all funerals and all times and occasions. I had a cla of eight little girls in Sunday Schoul, there being fifty-t scholars present. Helen has not yet returned, but we expp, her soon. She writes that she feels very well. The girls se bewildered as to where she is, for when they prayed for her Kamondungo they heard that she was at Bailundu, and wh they prayed for her at Bailundu they hear that she is at Sak jimba. Dr. and Mrs. Wellman and Paul are going to speteg: Christmas there, and perhaps Helen will also. We expect have a good time here at Christmas, for we are preparing shi and coats for the boys and girls, and they are to have gann We will hold a service in the morning to which all the villag $N$ are invited probably some of them, too, will receive presed and there will be a feast for all who attend. Wanga one of house boys is going to greet his father to-morrow. He is one th the chiefs or kings, at a distance, and has been in the interior ad some months, and it is proper for the children to go and mb t. him on his return. The King sent a quarter of beef as a presil $t$ to Mr. Currie on Friday, and we are enjoying some of it. Ifen very good and a change. Last Thursday another of our ghe was married, Njengolo. She married Kangombe, so therfoot one less on this side of the stream. In a few weeks Munga isott marry Yobe. We got at last our home box, shipped in Ma om and received in December. Well, I found such pretty thin $p$ Of course, Helen has not yet seen them, but we thank you alfor: much. The (Umbundu) mottoes are much admired, and arfee be put in the new school-house. We are very sorry to any furl
he plum pudding was given to the chickens and not kept for Hhristmas. The pear seeds you sent did not grow, but one of hose apricot stones has grown and is fully a foot and a half igh. A few days ago I had a slight attack of bilious fever. (I mquite well again.) Mrs. Currie slept with me three nights. kumba came in. He is so kind and full of sympathy. He had our nice ears of corn. After talking a little while he said he ad brought some corn. I said "to sell"" he said "no ocali" is a present. They were very nice. A couple of days after Vanga brought two ripe tomatoes, also an "ocali," and Kumba rought some peaches from one of his trees. It is worth being I sometimes to see how kind every one can be. The picture of the two houses, one falling down, eemed to take their fancy, and I am sure they understood how applied to them.

I wish you all a happy new year. Kiud vefegards to all friends. My Dear Father,-Post was late to-day in coming in, and I ave only a few minutes to spare now It would seem strange the way it used to be in the early days at Warwick. We have ad a very mıld winter so far, even for March-a great blessing the poor. We had 350 callers on New Year's Day, including ss 4 the prominent Christian (Gregorian, Catholic and Protestant) Ifen in the city. It seems as if there was a great awakening to ghe value of spiritual things in all parts of this Empire. It is foother illustration of the old doctrine of the kemnant. Possibly othing but these terrible massacres could have aroused the a ominal Christians of this land to a sense of their responsibilities. pure and united Christianity in Turkey would soon, by its ${ }^{3}$ Loral and spiritual power, overcome the dominant faith. Mr. rfee and $I$ think it is a gond time to urge foreign missionary中urk on our students and the chu.ches. The Gregorian churches,
have no missions, and our Protestants have not yet got beyo; a little home mission work. We feel this state of things is sign of weakness, and are going to do our best to tone up 4 people on this subject. Our seminary is the only one in Turke now in operation ; and, anyway, it is far and away ahead of a of the others. We make a large claim-that is, to give a the logical training equal to that offered by the best Americ seminaries; and on the whole I am sure we get more work od of our men and take them just as thoroughiy over the ground they do in Yale. Our great need is new bookz. Our libra was burned, you know. I am going to make an appeal in C, C. for 100 books. I hope something will come of it. I hd to get a good indemnity out of the Turks for my "Exile." sending 40 orphans to Jerusalem.

## From Miss Sarah A. Jeffery.

I.M.A. Mission, Khangaon,<br>Berar, India

Dec. 17th. -Since I wrote last I have taken in eight me girls, making our number fifty. This last party from in famine district were in a dreadful condition. I went to Jalaf on $t \cdot$ meet them. When I got them home and had bathed a. $Q$ dressed I was tired out. The house is now quite full, and $M$ ci Fuller is trying to get another Bungalow. Sagoona and I mat a room on the verandah by putting up bamboo rods aff matting. This we use as a hospital, but now it is so cold ar night that it is scarcely safe for the sick girls. The days hot, but the nights very cold. I sleep now with two blankets, a cotton $q$ it and my big shawl over me. I am ke busy trying to get warm clothes and bedding for all. A bun of old clothes was sent from Bombay, which we are mak into jackets and shirts. We have thirty new girls, but lith money, and they must have food. Only a week until Christr and we want it to be a little different from other days. want some little thing for each child-clothes or beddingthen we shall try to have a special dinner and service. means a great deal to take in all these purely heathen girls; the new ones epfak Hindustani, so 1 am very glad to $h$ Imanibai from Bombay to help in teaching them. She is on the first orphans Mr. Fuller rescued nearly twenty years s She is about twenty-two years old. She speaks both Hindust and Marathi, so is whll fitted for the work. Sagoona also knd a little of Hindustani and Musulman as well us Marathi.
