We had 350 callers on New Year's Day, including esal the prominent Christian (Gregorian, Catholic and Protestant) Hen in the city. It seems as if there was a great awakening to ghe value of spiritual things in all parts of this Empire. It is Thother illustration of the old doctrine of the kemnant. Possibly isothing but these terrible massacres could have aroused the a ominal Christians of this land to a sense of their responsibilities. in pure and united Christianity in Turkey would soon, by its alhoral and spiritual power, overcome the dominant faith. Mr. rece and I think it is a good time to urge foreign missionary fork on our students and the churches. The Gregorian churches, have no missions, and our Protestants have not yet got beyon a little home mission work. We feel this state of things in sign of weakness, and are going to do our best to tone up the people on this subject. Our seminary is the only one in Turk now in operation; and, anyway, it is far and away ahead of a of the others. We make a large claim—that is, to give a the logical training equal to that offered by the best America seminaries; and on the whole I am sure we get more work of our men and take them just as thoroughly over the ground they do in Yale. I.M.A. Mission, Khangaon, Berar, India

Dec. 17th.-Since I wrote last I have taken in eight me girls, making our number fifty. This last party from t famine district were in a dreadful condition. I went to Jala or to meet to bank to them. When I got them home and had bathed and dressed I was tired out. The house is now quite full, and he is returned to the strain on the verandah by putting up bamboo rods and matting. This we use as a hospital, but now it is so cold as night that it is scarcely safe for the sick girls. The days hot, but the nights very cold. I sleep now with two t? blankets, a cotton q It and my big shawl over me. I am ke busy trying to get warm clothes and bedding for all. A bun of old clothes was sent from Bombay, which we are make into jackets and shirts. We have thirty new girls, but litter money, and they must have food. Only a week until Christifisi and we want it to be a little different from other days. want some little thing for each child-clothes or beddingthen we shall try to have a special dinner and service. means a great deal to take in all these purely heathen girls; the new ones speak Hindustani, so I am very glad to hiver Imanibai from Bombay to help in teaching them. She is one the first orphans Mr. Fuller rescued nearly twenty years atth She is about twenty-two years old. She speaks both Hindust at and Marathi, so is well fitted for the work. Sagoona also kn Tal a little of Hindustani and Musulman as well as Marathi. Lord has helped us wonderfully through the e ra rushbat work. I have been kept well and able to do it.
