The electric waves came with the regularity of pendulum movements. They lasted about three minutes each. They swung from negative to positive polarity, in almost perfect rhythm, and our instruments showed a maximum intensity of 370 volts. When the current was at its maximum, positive polarity, we could talk to Dickinson very easily by using the regular Morse code. As the pendulum swung back to the negative pole the sounds from the instruments used became fainter

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
