## CANADIAN WAR DATA

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## I N T R O D U C T I O N

The purpose of this REFERENCE PAPER is to present a statistical summary of Canada's contribution in manpower and resources in World War II.

Canada entered the war on September 10, 1939, and the conflict did not end until the surrender of Japan on August 14, 1945, almost six years later.

Because the demarcation between war and peace was not clear cut in all areas of the Canadian war effort, December 31, 1945, was chosen as the most suitable date in many of the following tables for which to quote final figures. By that time, in most cases, activities pertaining to the war had been completed, although in some fields such as price control and rationing, war measures continue to affect national life.


The withdrawal of direct government participation in war industry is well on the way to completion. Crown companies numbered 31 in all. Of these, 17 have ceased operation and nine are in the process of liquidation. Five will continue as part of the peacetime program: Wartime Housing Limited, Polymer Corporation, Parks Steamships Limited, Eldorado Mining and Refining (1944) Limited and Canadian Arsenals Limited.

Measures regulating the selection and placement of labour have all been withdrawn with the coming of peace. On the other hand, some important developments in the field of labour administration which have occurred during the war years are likely to have a continuing significance for considerable time. They include the following:

1. The huge war emergency training program, carried on co-operatively between the federal Department of Labour and the provincial governments for the training of personnel for the armed services and war industry, has been converted into a federal-provincial post-war training scheme called Canadian Vocational Training to provide rehabilitation training for veterans, to give post-war training to civilian war workers and to assist the provinces with their vocational training programs for young persons of high school age.

2. Wage control, first introduced in 1941, still continues as a phase of the general economic stabilization policy. The National War Labour Board and the nine regional war labour boards which administer this policy are still in operation.

3. The conciliation services of the Department of Labour have been expanded considerably during the war. They carry over into peace regulations establishing the right of employees to organize, the right of workers' organizations to name bargaining agents and the right of collective bargaining.

The above estimates provided by the Department of Labour are based on the most recent information obtainable from the Dominion Bureau of Statistics and other official sources, little statistical information is available for domestic servants, agricultural males, men and employers own accounts and no pays. In these cases the estimates are subject to considerable error, especially for dates furthest from the date of the final census (June 2, 1941). Includes prisoners of war and persons missing but still on strength. Excludes persons engaged in civilian occupations. Does not include women gainfully occupied on farms or in farm homes, who are included with those not employed at April 1 with those for October 1. In attempting to compare the estimates of employment at April 1 with those for October the seasonal difference between these periods should be considered.

3. Includes employment on direct and indirect war production and construction, and the war content of employment in ancillary industries.

4. "Own accounts" are persons who carry on their business without assistance of employees. "No pays" are mainly family workers receiving no fixed money payment.

5. Since it was impossible to estimate the number of women engaged in farm work, all women residing on farms are here included except students, women 65 years of age and over and those gainfully occupied outside the farm.

6. In 1943 and 1944 the number of unemployed was accounted for almost entirely by persons temporarily out of work while moving from one job to another.

7. In attempting to compare the estimates of employment at April 1 with those for October the seasonal difference between these periods should be considered.

4. Services designed to promote better understanding between labour and management in industry will remain. The Industrial Production Co-operation Board is being continued. Plant committees organized under its sponsorship numbered 444 at the end of March, 1946.

5. The National Employment Service, set up in 1941, administered the wartime Selective Service regulations. Although the Selective Service section has been dropped, National Employment Service is a permanent fixture. Functioning in more than 200 Canadian cities and towns as a voluntary public placement agency, it also handles unemployment insurance benefits, administers the Reinstatement in Civil Employment Act and looks after out-of-work allowances on behalf of the Department of Veterans Affairs.

Canada's achievements in the field of scientific research during the war have been outstanding. Since 1939 the facilities of the National Research Council were widely extended, the laboratory staffs increased fourfold, the budget expanded six times. With the close of hostilities, Canadian scientists are applying the results of their wartime research to the betterment of peacetime living. Reaching into almost every area of human activity, the work of the council includes scientific aids to housing, rural electrification, health and welfare, the rehabilitation of the wounded; studies to improve the design of aircraft, canals, harbors, ships; the application of radar to air and sea navigation, of the principle of echo sounding to mineral prospecting and the detection of flaws in solid structures; the utilization of atomic energy not only in war but also in industry, and the use of its products in research and medicine.

Canadian medical practice has been greatly enriched by experience gained under the vicissitudes of war. In keeping with this general trend toward better health consciousness was the establishment of the Department of National Health and Welfare in 1944 with duties, among others, of carrying on research for the health and welfare of the Canadian people and of publicizing the results of such efforts.

Of particular importance, when measured by the yardstick of human values, is the contribution Canada has made of foodstuffs to a hungry world. (See: "Food from Canada," 1946 REFERENCE PAPERS series, No. 2, April 30, 1946). Labour shortages notwithstanding, Canada maintained a steady flow of wheat, bacon, cheese, eggs and other products to the United Kingdom and other allies. Wheat has been flowing out of Canada at the rate of a million bushels each working day for the last three years; fish products at the rate of a million pounds each day for seven years.

After six years of concentrated toil Canadians find that their efforts have not only helped win the war but have also moved the nation up to higher levels--to more mature heights of economic, political and cultural development and to largely expanded diplomatic relations with the other nations of the world.

(For the convenience of those who have in their possession a copy of the Recapitulation Issue of CANADA AT WAR, No. 45, published in July, 1945, the tables in this paper are numbered as they are in that booklet. The numbers are not consecutive throughout, however, for in a few cases tabulations similar to those contained in the Recapitulation Issue have not been presented here, and a few gaps therefore occur).

- (1) Figures of intake do not represent actual strength of the armed services, as they do not take into consideration men discharged for medical or other reasons, personnel enlisted, casualties incurred and other factors.
- (2) Population figures for the age group 18 to 45 (as at June 2, 1941) were estimated from summaries of the 1941 census which had been published in 5-year and 10-year age groups.
- (3) Army appointments and enlistments do not include Reserve Army personnel called out on active service, from time to time, under various general orders.
- (4) The above figures of enrolments, National Resources Mobilization Act, include only those men actually documented as NRMA recruits. Men who reported to training centres or to depots on being called up, but who volunteered immediately and were never documented as NRMA recruits, are included with appointments and enlistments.
- (5) This column consists of men discharged from the army for the purpose of joining the navy (1,721 to June 30, 1,746 to September 30) or air force (10,209 to June 30 and September 30) and men enrolled under NRMA who subsequently volunteered for general service (57,034 to June 30; 57,309 to Sept. 30). No similar deduction has been made from navy or air force enlistments for personnel discharged therefrom to join other services.
