WHAT HOLLAND OFFERS TO DO

To Send a Commission to South Africa to Tell Boers it is Time to Quit.

PERMISSION WOULD BRING NO ONE.

Dutch Government Has No Authorization From Boer Leaders, But Appeals to Humanity.

London, Jan. 30.—The Hague correspondent of the Daily Mail says he is able to announce on authority that the Dutch note to Great Britain, after renegeing the earnest concern of that government at the prolongation of hostilities in South Africa, offered its good offices in bringing them to a close.

To this end, Holland asked whether Great Britain would be willing to permit a Dutch commission to proceed to South Africa to enlighten the Boer leaders in the field as to the real position of affairs, and, more especially, since it is understood that there is not the slightest chance of intervention on the part of any European power; that the prolongation of hostilities is useless, and the Boer struggle can serve no further good purpose.

The correspondent says the Dutch government expressly announces in this note that it possesses no authorization whatsoever from the Boer leaders, either in Europe or South Africa, to take this suggested step, but that it appeals to Great Britain, on the ground of common humanity, for military permission for the Dutch commission to accomplish its mission of peace.

Such permission would bind neither the British government to the discussion of terms or the initiation of any negotiations, nor pledge the Dutch government for the success of its self-imposed task.

It is understood that Great Britain is awaiting the receipt of Lord Kitchener's views on this suggestion, and is willing to grant the requested safe conduct to the Dutch commission if Lord Kitchener has no objections, though it is not hoped for any practical result from the effort.

FREE PER CENT TAKE-OFF

Officers of Militia Department in Ignorance of the Alleged Commission—No Claim Likely to be Made for \$100,000 Credit at British War Office.

Ottawa, Jan. 29.—It is news to the officers of the Militia Department that the War Office intends to allow a commission of 3 per cent to the colonies upon purchases for the imperial army. About three and a half million dollars' worth of supplies for the War Office has been purchased in Canada by the Department of Militia and Agriculture, but in no case has any thing been added for commission.

MILLINERY HOUSE GUTTED FOR FIRST TIME IN HISTORY

Building Occupied by J. M. Hamilton & Sons at 8 West Wellington Street Badly Scorched.

Insurance of \$27,000 Carried—Fire Evidently Originated From Defective Furnace.

There was a serious fire last night at the premises of J. M. Hamilton & Sons, wholesale milliners, at 8 West Wellington-street. The building was badly damaged, and the contents will, it is believed, have originated from the furnace.

It was discovered a few minutes after 8 o'clock and policemen Baines, Thompson and Private Watchman James turned in separate alarms from boxes at Yonge and Wellington-streets, King and Yonge-streets, and King and Bay-streets. The firemen found the second and fourth stories in the possession of the flames, which were bursting out of the windows facing Wellington-street. For some little time the adjoining buildings were threatened, as the flames had every appearance of spreading, but the efforts of the firemen alone prevented a more serious conflagration.

The Minister of Education, Hon. Richard Harcourt, vehemently replied that the people were charged exorbitant prices for school books.

Mr. Harcourt explained that Ontario was not the only country where the schoolbook system was a live question, and he asked the House when discussing educational matters to remember from a non-partisan point of view.

Mr. Whitney declared that the people were utterly disgusted at the existing state of affairs in connection with school books, and there was not a high price charged for them and the monopoly of them had not been discussed.

Premier Ross thought that the great point was as to whether the school books in use were suitable or not. To his mind it was not of any great importance if there was a monopoly of publishing them.
