Two surprises developed in the controllership contest, the one being the remarkable falling off in the vote for William Burns, who did not receive in his own ward as much support as he did last year for alderman The other surprise was the great strength shown by Controller Hubbard, who callried Ward Four by a large majority and received a very strong suppost thoughthe city. The effect of the nev system of cumulative voting was shown very forcibly in the first ward, where Controller Richardson piled up an enormous vote, which carried him thru to victory. The general consersus of opinion last night was that the new Board of Control would be a mort efficient one, and that the electors had made a wise selection.

Old Members Come Back, In the aldermanic contests the great majority of the old members of the Council were re-elected. Ward One returns Stewart, Chisholm and Fleming; in Ward Two, Ald. Foster and Noble are again elected, while Emerson Coatsworth is the new man. Ald. Ramsden heads the poll in Ward Three, with Ald. O. B. Sheppard second and G. R. Gen y third. S. W. Burns drops out in Ward Four, and makes room for S. Affred Jones, while Ald. Harrison and the veteran James Crape are again returned. In Ward Five, Frank Woods has made a chenomenal run, taking ex-Ald. Starr's place at the head of the pell, while Ald, Bell and Dunn are again in the Council, the latter having won a signal victory against a most determined opposition. LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR SHOULD ACT.

Goldwin Smith, seen by The World, thus expressed his opinion. on the situation: "The prerogative of the crown is, I take it, entrusted to the Lieutenant Governor for the purpose of seeing that the constitution is observed and that the government is in the hands of those who have the confidence of the people. It seems to me that it would be a misuse of this prerogative if it were exerted for the purpose of party strategy, or for keeping in power those who had lost the confidence of the people.

"As to whether the present government has lost the confidence of the people, I can scarcely presume to offer an opinion. The general impression seems to be that it has. I don't pretend to be a judge of the political situation, but it appears to mo that the result of the present struggle of the government to hold power may wreck the Liberal party in Ontario and perhaps not without injury to the Doninion government in the approaching general election.

"It looks to me as if the situation has reached the point where the Lieutenant Governor must act on his own discretion, assert the prerogative of the crown and cease to accept the advice of the cabinet representing the interests of the majority of the people. The Lieutenant Governor is bound to act upon the advice of the ministers in all ordinary questions of policy, but not on the position of the ministers themselves."

"Could the Lieutenant-Governor refuse constitutionally to sign the order in council convening the legislature?" "If he was satisfied the convening of the body was an act of party

strategy certainly he could. There are instances in Canadian history illustrating the exercise of the prerogative of the crown, contrary to the advice of the cabinet. This was true of Sir Edmund Head, Governor-General, when he refused to dissolve the Dominion parliament on the advice of George Brown, and I think he was quite right. Here the Governor-General exercised his discretion. Lieutenant-Governor Clark could exercise the same discretion independent of any a vivice in the present crisis." In most of the cases of which evidence exists the name of C. B. Richard & Co., bankers and shipping agents at Nos. 31 and 33 Broadway, this city, was used by Spencer, and this firm ciscovered the fraud in time to avoid serious loss. It is said, however, that the swindler has been issuing drafts and cheques on the Park Bank, of New York, and forged bills of lading on the North German Lloyd and other steamship companies.

According to papers in the possession of C. B. Richard & Co., Spencer has been operating on a scale which, when all the details are known, will probably involve sums reaching to thousands of dollars. These include drafts and cheques bearing the names of the Credit Lyonnais of Paris, the Russian Bank of Foreign Trade, of the same city; the Anglo-American Express Company, and French, Lemon & Co., of Florence, Italy. lorence, Italy.

Left Forged Cheque in New York, In the last two months letters of ininquiry have come to Richard & Co. from firms in London, Paris, Brussels, Bordighera, Italy, which is close to Monte Carlo, and other European cities, all conveying information of the man's operations and asking for facts as to his identity and reliability.

While working on a large scale abroad Spencer was not above petty swindling here, for the Glizey Hodse has a worthless cheque for \$25 signed by Spencer on Sept. 29 last and drawn to his own order on the Riggs National Bank of Washington. On one end of the face of this check were printed the words "S. W. Spencer, H.B.M.'s V. Consul," and it was certified with the name of H. H. Mathews, assistant cashier of the Riggs Bank, which eignature turned out to be a forgery. It was during his stay at the Glisey House that he called on Richard & Co., and had negotiations with F. E. Tamlyn, foreign forwarding clerk for that firm. To Tamlyn he said that he wished to ship on behalf of the Trenton Watch Company, Limited, of Trenton N.J., a case of watches to Emil de Loth, at Marseilles, France, and that he desired to make a draft against that shipment. He obtained one of Richard & Co.'s shipping instruction blanks, which he filled in regular form, making the amount of insurance \$1289.60, and also one of their drafts, which he also filled for the sum of 6000f., signing it "The Trenton Watch Company, Limited, per S. W. Spencer, Attorney."



The Vanderbilt and Pennsylvania systems contain about 20,000 miles each, either one of them nearly equaling the 22,000 miles of all England. And tho the individual roads in these systems have in some cases their separate boards, these usually consist of practems have in some cases their separate boards, these usually consist of practically the same men. Many important lines are also "leased and worked." Against the 230 systems of 22,000 miles—less than 100 miles to a line—in England, the Vanderbilt and Pennsylvania systems include together less than twenty component lines or less than twenty component lines, or an average of more than 2000 miles per line. The longest single line in the United States, the Southern Pacific, has over 9500 miles of track.

3790 miles is in states and territories
west of the Mississippi More work
was done in Oklahoma than anywhere was done in Oklahoma than snywhere else. The southern states east of the Mississippi are to be credited with 1022 miles, which leaves less than 1000 miles for the rest of the country. The gain in New England was only twenty-three miles, and in New York forty-five miles. The United States—Alaska being included—will have at the end of the year a raliway mileage of 2009.855 miles. The showing would be a more impressive one if the mileage of electric lines were included.






