The votes in the house of commons yesterday on the Maclean amendments to fix a standard railway passenger rate, to compel the railways to admit all telephone lines to their stations and to bring express companies under the jurisdiction of the railway commission, were significant and on the whole satisfactory to those who are in favor of progressive legislation and who uphold public rights as against corporation interests.

THE RAILWAY AMENDMENTS.

The votes showed that new questions were coming to the front and that the voters and their representatives would soon be dividing on new and living issues.

The paramount political issue to-day in the country is not Conservative versus Liberal, but the people against the corporations.

All sorts of special pleading, all sorts of excuses have been put forward against the amendments. A private member moving for a reform is limited to a concrete amendment. All he can do is to raise an issue, and to raise it he must put it in definite form. Every one, therefore who has any complete sympathy with the principle is bound. therefore, who has any genuine sympathy with the principle is bound to vote for it; he can well leave the details of the principle and its application to the committee, to the law officers, to work it out in harmony with the existing situation. But those who wish to avoid the principle and the princ mony with the existing situation. But those who wish to avoid the principle raise all the side issues and discuss all the details; and one finding this, and another finding that side issue or detail to their liking, seize upon it as an excuse for voting against the principle.

Vested rights, sacred contracts, the existence of the railway commission to do this very work; that the farmers want cheaper freights, not cheaper fares; these were among the subterfuges employed in the house of commons yesterday. One member who claimed that the commission was the very thing to settle passenger rates, had but a moment before declared that express companies should not come within the jurisdiction of the commission. And so it went.

But the cause grows notwithstanding, and the people will be quick to find out who are their friends. By the division lists of yesterday the people have now a chance to see what members—whether Conservative upon it as an excuse for voting against the principle.

The Both Leaders Opposed Campaign of W. F. Maclean, Still the New Question Received Generous Support From Rank and File.

PARAMOUNT QUESTION IN CANADIAN POLITICS TO-DAY

Ottawa, July 26.—(Staff Special.)—Three amendments to the railway lact, which W. F. Maclean has been pressing in the house and in the railway committee with varying success, were finally decided in the house to-day. To the friends of the proposed legislation the result was most encouraging. It had been freely stated in hostile quarters that the amendments would not find enough supporters to secure a record of the votes. The authors of this prophecy proved to be very bad guessers. The amendments were supported strongly on the opposition side of the house, and won several supporters from the government. Both party leaders opposed the amendments, a fact which gave the result of the divisions peculiar significance.

The first division was on the amendment making express companies ction of the railway commission. The amendr was defeated by a vote of 72 to 33. The amendment providing for the application of the Michigan law of graded passenger rates to Canadian railways was next to go down on an adverse vote of 95 to 17. A more favorable result followed the division on the amendment compelling railways to give independent telephone companies access to their stations on reasonable terms. The amendment was defeated by a vote

STRENGTH FROM OPPOSITION.

In each case the amendments drew the great strength from the opposition side of the house. Twenty-nine Conservatives voted for the control of express companies. Only six Conservatives opposed it. Of the thirty-five Conservatives who voted on the amendment to reduce passenger rates, 17 voted for and 18 against. Twenty-six opposition members voted on the telephone amendment, and of these 18 supported and only 8 opposed the amendment. Twenty-nine Conservatives and four Liberals voted for the amendment to regulate express companies. Seventeen Conservatives and no Liberals voted for the reduction of passenger rates. Eighteen Conservatives and seven Liberals supported the amendment compelling railways to open their stations to independent telephones. Altogether there were nine government members who broke away to support the amendments. Lese were: Messrs. Beith, Heyd, Lang, Oliver, Puttee, Scott, Smith (Vancouver), Schell and Wallace.

The only member of the government who had anything to say against the amendments was the minister of justice, and he said very P . Borden took a very pronounced stand against the amendment respecting express companies and the amendment providing for the application of the Michigan law of graded passenger rates to Cana-

JUST SPECIAL PLEADING. A notable feature of the contest was the fact that no member on either side of the house attempted to oppose any one of the amendments on its merits. The proposed legislation reveled in pretexts and special pleading. Express companies should be controlled, but they should not be controlled in the way proposed by Mr. Maclean. The critics did not themselves suggest an alternative scheme. Railway passenger rates should be regulated, but they should be regulated by the

He pointed out, however, that the Michigan law applies to only certain portions, of the State of Michigan. To justify the application of that law to chandlan importance of the state of Michigan. 





Cabinet Reviews the Situation Following the Sinking of a British Ship.

London, July 26.-Premier Balfour replying to a question in the house of ommons to-day in regard to the sinking of the British steamer Knight Comnander by the Russians off the coast of Japan, said enquiries were being made on the subject, but he was not yet in a position to make a statement. Replying to another question, the premier said the government was not aware of any convention concluded in 1901 between Turkey and Russia providing special conditions for the passage of the Dardanelles by Russian

ships.
Mr. Balfour while disclaiming that he was giving an authoritative decision, said that he believed the declaration of Paris in 1856 contemplated the abolition of privateering, and that a neutral flag covers an enemy's merchandise except when contraband of war. Dealing with the question of whether the Russian volunteer vesses being private ships commissioned by the state were different materially from brivateers, the premier said that the privateers, the premier said that the whole question of the status of the volunteer ships was now under discussion between Great Britain and Russia, and that it would not be desirable to discuss that point in the house of commons at present.

CABINET MET YESTERDAY.
