



WHERE IS THE MAN? With the resignation of City Solicitor Chisholm, the question of the capacity and efficiency of Toronto's legal department becomes acute. DELAY IN PULLING BOX BRIGADE LOST NO TIME

Chief Thompson Answers Criticism of Way Big Fire Was Handled.

"I have not the least doubt that if he people at the parliament buildings nad pulled the box when the fire was first discovered the outbreak would have been confined to the section in which it started."

So said Fire Chief Thompson to the ire and light committee xesterday afternoon, in replying to comments which have been passed upon his de-partment in regard to the efficiency of the work of the firemen. "Rumors were being circulated about

the grounds," he said, "by members of the government and others, to the effect that the delay of the fire department in getting to the fire was the cause of a very large amount of the destruction. I dare say that is true, but the cause of the delay cannot be attributed to the fire department. The delay rests with the government and the government officials for having failed to send in an alarm directly the outbreak was discovered. The fire was burning for 15 minutes before the alarm vas sent in, and then whoever sent it n did not pull the box, but telephoned, which caused extra delay.

The fire chief went on to explain that on arrival at the fire the firemen concentrated all their efforts to prevent the flames spreading to the east and reaching the main building. The roof of the portion burnt out, he said, was very faulty in its construction. He pointed out that it was one of the men from the Yonge-street half who pulled the box on arrival at the fire, six minutes after the telephone message was sent in. The box had not been touchsent in. The box had not been touched, thus showing that none of the officials at the building had turned in a proper alarm. "Altho they alarmed people thruout the whole building," Chief Thompson remarked, "they did not think it worth while to give the fire department a chance." The times were beyond doubt for the man at the switchhoard say there and entered the switchboard sat there and entered the hour and the minute when an alarm was received and the record showed that the telephone message was re-ceived at 12.52, and the Yonge-street firemen, on arrival at the building, pulled the box at 12.58.





Association Resolves Not to Ente Into Interchange Arrangement With Bell.

A year of satisfactory progress was reported by Secretary-Treasurer F. Page Wilson, at the convention of the Canadian Independent Telephone Association, at the city hall yesterday. About 50 delegates attended, and Dr. W. Doan of Harriettsville presided in the absence of the retiring president, Dr. Demers, Levis, Que. A formal welcome on behalf of the city was extended by Crontroller Hocken.

W. Wilson stated that there are be 26,000 and 27,000 independent iones in operation in Canada. In Alberta and Manitoba, where the Bell equipment was purchased by the government, over a year ago, the mileage and number of phones in use has increased very rapidly.

J. B. Ware, general secretary of the International Independent Telephone Association, stated that in 1895 there were only 245,000 telephones in the United States, but as a result of cometition there are now more than six

"As a result of competition," he remarked, "the independent companies have installed new plants and forced the other companies to improve theirs."

Competition Would Help.

Toronto, he claimed, is not as well equipped in the matter of telephones as it would be if competition existed. He condemned those independent companies who sold out to the Belli Company. Some who should have re-mained loyal had become traitors, he said, and sold out because there was money in it for them. It was an illegal and an immoral transaction.




