







# CANADA AT WAR EMPHASIZED BY MILITARY DAY AT EXHIBITION

## MILITARY REVIEW WITNESSED BY VERY ENTHUSIASTIC CROWD

**Major-General Logie, Guest of Honor at Exhibition Yesterday, Delighted With Workings of Model Camp and Fine Appearance of the Men.**

"You will have the honor next week of forming a guard for His Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught, and if you conduct yourselves thus as you have done today there will be no smarter guard in Canada." This was the message given by Major-General Logie at the close of the review on the Exhibition campus, which formed the principal feature of military day at the National Exhibition. More than proud and with every reason for the sentiment, were the men of the platoon of the 169th who received this unusual praise from the general who had just reviewed their ranks, where he had found everything to justify his encomiums for the splendid military appearance of the men and the fine manner in which they had gone thru the various manoeuvres and drill.

Comparing them with the noted 25th, Gen. Logie told the men who now occupy Exhibition Model Camp that they were the equal and in some respects in advance of their predecessors of last season. Their conduct and work were an admirable object lesson. Their code was high, and any man who failed in this respect would be disciplined by his comrades. Major-General Logie, accompanied by Col. Bickford, came on to the field at 2.30. Previous to their coming the men had been put thru a course of drill, but at the appearance of the general and his aide the word was given by the officer commanding, Major Gas, and the khaki ranks became like so many bronze statues, remaining so while the military figure, whose movements were easily followed by the spectators from the camp, moved between the ranks, inspecting and noting with experienced eyes the faultless equipment and stand of the lines under inspection.

Following this came the march past, when the platoon, headed by their fine band playing a spirited march, filed by the general, who at the salute, when he and the officers exchanged courtesies, and the different companies around the enthusiasm of the men, who with the regularity of step and soldierly appearance. The sun beat down with its hottest rays and the dust flew at the feet of the marching bayonets which gleamed like flashes of burnished silver, and the concentrated interest of the spectators were compensating features of the display.

Physical drill, which left the field an exhibition of physical drill was given by the platoon. The men formed up in the open ranks, and under the eye of Sgt. Wade gave a fine display as could be witnessed anywhere of their physical movements. When the men, after laying down their arms, cap and belt and lastly their white jerseys which they had outlined in blue upon the letters 169 each, a great shout went up from the spectators in admiration of the movement of the platoon as it advanced simultaneously as if by one man force. The motive power of the whole movement where the men held their palms on the ground and laid their bodies almost prone on the ground, afterwards raising themselves without any support to a standing position, the applause of the surrounding spectators, as they marched off the field, they were accompanied by the crowd to the camp grounds, where the exhibition of their physical drill, which the onlookers, who surrounded the marching lines of the platoon, which the men, who were in the trenches, marched into the enclosure which led to the trenches. Forming where the shallow communication trenches were situated, the platoon divisions were inspected by their officers before the word was given for their entrance into the underground passages.

As the men disappeared, their gaze course was followed by an occasional head which appeared above the parapet. Meantime, the attack of the British lines had commenced, the boom of heavy cannon being reported by the muffled beat of the big drum, and the answer coming in the shape of sharp bombs from the opposite German trenches. When the line appeared above the first British trench the excitement became almost as keen as if warfare were a present reality. The crack, crack of firearms, the thud of the trench which passed between the hands of the men came above the parapet, taking hold of the wooden raised themselves from which they were wither with the final charge were all moments of extreme interest.

As the men with a shout rushed with their bayonets upon their foe, as upon the opposing line, the scene was almost as realistic as if the attack or Belgium. The route march of the 169th thru the grounds, which took place at 4.30 p.m. was still one of the features of the day's proceedings, when the enthusiastic crowds bordered the line of march, the platoon receiving a new impetus from the excited spectators who cheered and from the stalwart appearance of the men, who are such worthy representatives of the bravest and best of the nation. ### EXPECT RECRUITING TO BECOME ACTIVE

Seventeen Enlist From Total of Twenty-Four Applicants.

#### OPEN DEPOT NEAR EX.

Three Hundred Horse Transport Drivers Needed Now for Overseas.

Recruiting yesterday assumed greater activity than for the first three days of the week. Seventeen recruits were enlisted out of 24 who applied. Notwithstanding the large crowds in the city for the Exhibition, the recruiting sergeants are meeting with little success in their work this week, probably due to the fact that the eligibles are devoting their thoughts for the time being to the less serious aspects of life. More activity in recruiting is anticipated before the close, at the end of next week. Of those who enlisted yesterday, five joined the A.S.C., and the other units increased their strength as follows: 166th I., 242nd I., 67th and 70th Batteries I. each, No. 1 Construction Battalion I., R.C.D. 3, and the Guards 3.

The 69th Battery has recruited over strength, and the only recruits wanted now are a limited number of shoemaking smiths. Those who wish to join should apply at the 69th Battery orderly room, the armories.

A call has been issued by the Divisional Signaling Company for men of the following trades: Telegraphers, telephonists, instrument repairers, linemen, electricians, motor cyclists, shoemaking smiths, carriage smiths, harness makers and drivers. It is advisable for any who are engaged in the above occupations that they should enlist with the Divisional Signaler, as they will be able to follow their usual trade while in the service. Application should be made to the recruiting office of the Divisional Signaler at the armories.

The Engineer Training Depot, which is stationed at Valcartier, has permission to recruit through the entire Dominion, and men of the following trades are asked for: Engineers, carpenters, wheelwrights, harness and saddle makers, blacksmiths, railroad construction workers, drivers, Lieut. J. L. Mallory is in charge of recruiting for this unit in Toronto, and he will be glad to furnish any information to intending recruits. Applicants see him at the orderly room of the 2nd Field Company, Canadian Engineers, south side of the armories.

No. 1 Construction Battalion, now encamped at Valcartier, will proceed overseas as soon as 20 men have been obtained. This battalion, commanded by Lt.-Col. B. Ripley, is officered entirely by well-known engineers and mechanics, and is to carry on construction work at the front. A large number of applications have been received to fill up the required number, but the list is to be kept open at the recruiting depot, the armories, a few days longer, before a final choice is made. Lieut. F. A. McNair has charge of recruiting here.

C.A.S.C. have received orders to recruit at once 300 horse transport drivers, which are urgently needed to complete the draft going overseas shortly, also bakers, butchers, blacksmiths, carpenters and fitters. No. 2 C.A.S.C. depot is quartered at Camp Borden, and recruits will receive Army Service Corps training. There is an opening for two good cooks for overseas service. Applicants to join should apply to Lieut. R. M. Adams, C.A.S.C. quarters, armories.

In order that Exhibition visitors may be interested in the work of their unit, the Royal Canadian Dragoons have opened a recruiting office on Dufferin street, at the Exhibition entrance. Lieut. Saunders will be in charge and he will gladly explain the duties of the Dragoons to any desiring information.

The funeral of the late Pte. A. R. Thompson of the 214th Bantam Battalion, whose death occurred in the hospital Monday night, was held yesterday from the undertaking parlors at 846 West Bloor street, with interment in the Necropolis. The funeral was military, with a firing party composed of members of the battalion, who came from Camp Borden in the morning. The service was conducted by Capt. Canon Dixon. Pte. Thompson had been in the hospital for many weeks. Death was due to tuberculosis. His mother and sister, who were present at the funeral, reside.

Yesterday a squad of eight military police paraded the Exhibition grounds and corrected misdemeanors of visiting soldiers. The police force will be enlarged, it is expected, before the end of the week. Sgt. Kwoit, an imperial army veteran, was in charge of the party on the grounds yesterday. A draft of 106 officers, N.C.O.'s and men of the A.M.C. are required for overseas service as soon as the summer camps are over, and recruits are wanted to bring the unit up to strength and be in training before the draft leaves. ### SALE OF LIQUOR IN ROUMANIA FORBIDDEN

Severe Punishment to be Inflicted if Law is Not Observed.

BUCHAREST, Aug. 31.—The police commissioners have forbidden the sale and consumption of alcoholic liquors in all establishments through Roumania, under penalty of severe punishment.

Roumania's action in prohibiting the sale and consumption of alcoholic liquors follows the lead of many of the European countries now at war, including Russia, France and Great Britain.

Russia, the first belligerent country to place a ban on alcohol, abolished the liquor traffic by imperial decree at the outbreak of the war. As a result of this prohibition the sale of intoxicants in Russia fell within a year and a half from nearly a billion rubles to approximately four per cent. of that sum. The four per cent. consisted largely of the sale of liquors for medicinal purposes.

In France wine shops are forbidden to sell any form of alcohol before noon. Shies to women and children are barred at any hour.

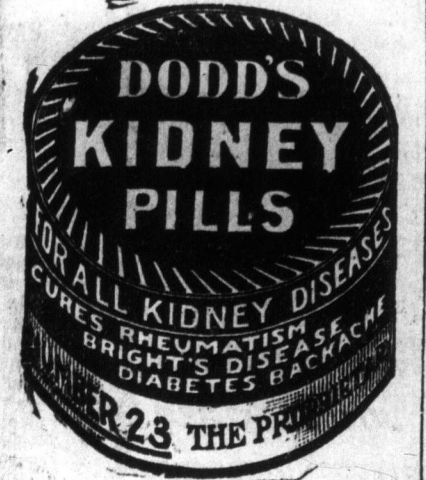
