The Weekly Prayer Meeting is held on Wednesday evening at 8 o'clock, in the Lecture-room.

Ordinary meetings of the Kirk Session are held on the first Saturday in each month.

The Sacrament of Baptism is administered on the first Sunday in each month.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper is observed on the last Sunday in January, May, and October.

Meetings of the Board of Managers are held quarterly on the first Monday in the months of January, April, July and October, at 7.30 p.m.

Meetings of the Ladies' Association are held fortnightly, or weekly, according to arrangement, during the winter months.

Collectors appointed by the Ladies' Association call monthly for contributions to the Missions of the Church, and distribute copies of the *Presbyterian Record* to all contributors.

Meetings of the Young Ladies' Sewing Society are held weekly.

Ordinary meetings of the Young Men's Association are held fortnightly, from the beginning of October to the end of April. All young men belonging to the Congregation are invited to attend.

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Pew rents are payable to the Treasurer, quarterly in advance, at the Managers' Room adjoining the Church, on the 21st day of March, June, September, and December. Sittings not paid for within six weeks thereafter may be re-let by the Managers.

The Managers will be in their Room every Monday from 7.30 to 9 p.m., to attend to applications for sittings.

Packages of envelopes will be furnished to Members and Adherents of the Church who are willing to adopt the "Envelope System" of making their weekly offerings. "Envelope System" of making their weekly offerings. The plan is simply this: Each envelope bears a number corresponding to the number opposite to the contributor's corresponding to the number opposite to the contributor undername on the Treasurer's book. Each contributor undertakes to give a fixed amount weekly, and to make up the takes to give a fixed amount weekly, and to make up the deficiency in case of absence on one or more Sundays. As deficiency in case of absence on one or more than covered the current expenses of the Church are more than covered by pew rents and open collection, the whole amount contributed by envelope will be applied this year to the payment of interest and the reduction of the debt, and will be acknowledged accordingly at the end of the year.

For packages of envelopes apply to Capt. Perry, or at the Managers' Room any Monday evening. Contributors should not leave envelopes in their pews, as it sometimes happens that the envelopes are used by strangers, times happens that the envelopes are used by strangers, or even taken away altogether, and this leads to confusion and annoyance.

The Minister will, as a rule, be found at home between 12 o'clock and 1.30 p.m., except on Mondays and Fridays. He will also make a point of being at home on Friday afternoon and evening, after 4 p.m.; and he will be glad if members of the congregation, and especially those who are comparative strangers, will avail themselves of the opportunity of coming to the Manse, if convenient.

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Missions and Schemes of the Church.

Contributions for the following objects are collected monthly by the Ladies' Association.

1. Home Mission.—The field is divided into two sections—the Eastern, embracing the Maritime Provinces, and the Western, extending from Quebec to British Columbia. In the Western section there are 105 supplemented Congregations and 404 Mission Stations receiving from \$50 to \$500 each; of these Mission Stations, 97 are in Manitoba, and about 50 in the Muskoka District. For the carrying on of the work during the current year it is estimated that about \$35,000 will be needed.

2. Foreign Mission.—The Church in the Maritime Provinces provides means for carrying on operations in Trinidad and the New Hebrides. The Church in Ontario, Quebec and Manitoba carries on work in three distinct fields:—1. Among the Indians in the North-west, where we have four Missionaries; 2. In Formosa, where we have Rev. G. L. Mackay, D.D., Rev. K. F. Junor, and thirteen native helpers; 3. In Central India, where there are three or

dained Missionaries, Rev. J. M. Douglas, Rev. J. F. Campbell, and Rev. John Wilkie, and two female Missionaries Misses McGregor and Roger. The amount required

3. Ministers' Widows' and Orphans' Fund, for profor this year is \$25,000. viding annuities for widows and orphans of Ministers who die in the service of the Church. Each Minister contributes \$12 annually to this Fund, and the amount paid to any widow is in proportion to the amount contributed by the congregation or congregations of which her hus-

4. AGED AND INFIRM MINISTERS' FUND.—The sum of band was Minister. \$400 is aimed at as a retiring allowance; but the amount at the disposal of the Committee last year only enabled

5. Colleges.—Western Ontario is expected to provide them to pay \$225. the means necessary for sustaining in efficiency Knox College and the Theological Hall in Queen's College. About \$12,000 is asked for the current year.

6. Queen's College Scholarship and Bursary Fund. This Congregation is responsible for two Scholarships, one of \$60 and the other of \$50, to be competed for by students who have the ministry in view.

7. French Evangelization, for Mission work among the French Canadians. Twenty-seven Missionaries were employed during last year, of whom twenty are ordained Ministers. Sixteen of these Missionaries regularly conduct services in both English and French. Eleven Colporteurs are also at work, and eighteen Teachers, with an attendance of more than 450 pupils. The central schools are at Pointe aux Trembles, the property of the French Canadian Missionary Society at that place having been purchased by the General Assembly. The estimated expenditure for the year is \$32,500.

8. Assembly Fund, to defray expenses connected with the meeting of the General Assembly. Amount required, \$5,475.

9. Mission Schools.—Some payments are still to be made on the purchase of the lot on which St. Mark's Church stands. The Session became responsible a year ago for \$10 per month in aid of the Dorset Schools; but it has been to a large extent relieved of this burden by the Young Men's Association.

Minutes of the Fiftieth Annual Meeting.

The Fiftieth Annual Meeting of the Congregation of St. Andrew's Church, Toronto, was held in the Lecture Room of the Church, on Wednesday evening, the 19th January, 1881.

The Rev. D. J. Macdonnell, B. D., was appointed Chairman, and Mr. Wm. Mitchell Secretary of the meeting.

The meeting was opened with prayer by the Chairman. The minutes of the last Annual Meeting, as printed in the Annual Report, were, on motion, held as read, and confirmed.

The Annual Report of the Board of Managers, together with the Financial Statement, were read by the Secretary, when it was moved by Mr. Joseph Robinson, seconded

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by Mr. W. D. Beardmore, and agreed, that the Managers' Report and Financial Statement, now submitted, be

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The Chairman announced that the three Managers who received and adopted. now retire by rotation were Messrs. Wm. Mitchell, Russel Inglis, and James Michie, whereupon it was moved by Mr. R. W. Sutherland, seconded by Mr. Jas. M. Rogerson, and agreed, that the three retiring Managers be re-elected, and that Messrs. David McGee and W. D. Beardmore be appointed Auditors for the current year.

Mr. James Maclennan moved, seconded by Mr. J. F. Muir, that this meeting heartily approves of the recommendation in the Managers' Report to make an effort to pay off the balance of the floating debt before the close of the current year, and for this purpose urge the more general adoption by the Congregation of the envelope system for the weekly contributions.—Agreed.

Mr. Michie having submitted the statement of the Finance Committee, it was moved by Mr. Beardmore, seconded by Mr. Lawless, that the statement of the Finance Committee be received and adopted, the Committee, and especially the Chairman, Mr. Michie, thanked for their valued services, and the Committee re-appointed.

Reports of the Sunday and Evening Schools con-Agreed. nected with the Congregation were submitted by their respective Superintendents, viz.:

Dorset Sunday and Evening Schools by Mr. Cassels. When it was moved by Mr Alex. Gemmell, seconded by Mr. James Patterson, and agreed, that the thanks of the Congregation are due, and are hereby tendered, to the Superintendents, Teachers, and other Officers connected with the various Schools, whose interesting reports have now been submitted, and that we express our satisfaction at the results of the good work which is being done in this department of Church work.

The reports of the Ladies' Association, the Young Ladies' Society, and the Women's Association having been read by Rev. Mr. Macdonnell, Mr. Michie moved, and Mr. Maclennan seconded, a hearty vote of thanks to the members of these organizations for their valuable services rendered to the Church during the past year.—Carried unanimously.

The reports of the Young Men's Association and of the Savings Bank Committee were read by Mr. Lawless and Mr. Fitzgibbon respectively, whereupon it was moved by Mr. Beardmore, seconded by Mr. Rogerson, that the reports now read be received and adopted.—Agreed.

The Chairman submitted a statement from the Kirk Session.

Mr. Maclaurin moved, seconded by Mr. Scadding, that this meeting tender a hearty vote of thanks to Mr. Fisher and the Choir for their valuable and efficient services in conducting the service of praise in the Church.—Carried.

The Chairman announced that the contributions of the Congregation for all purposes during the past year, including revenue from property, amounted to \$25,684.

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The work of the Sunday Schools and of the various Associations connected with the Church has been steadily and successfully prosecuted during the year, as the reports submitted shew. The Bible Class for young men was conducted during the greater part of the year by Mr. Jas. H. Hughes, and the Class for young women, which was taught by Mrs. Henning up to the time of her leaving Toronto, is now under the charge of Mrs. Macdonnell.

Towards the close of the year a "Musical Institute," open to all members and adherents of the Church, was organized for the study of sacred and secular music. The Institute is conducted by the Organist. The attendance

has been large, and good results are confidently antici-With the concurrence of the Managers, the salary of the Organist was increased to \$650 in April last. pated.

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The amount collected by the Ladies' Association for the Missions and Schemes of the Church, with interest, and including \$29.55 returned by the men on the C. P. Railway to pay for the binding of volumes sent last year, was \$1,647.58. The thanks of the Session are given to the Ladies' Association for their careful administration of the portion of the fund placed at their disposal.

The amount raised for the Session's Sunday School Fund was \$179.94.

A special collection for the relief of the sufferers by the fire at Hull in May last amounted to \$130.

On the 28th June last the Congregation celebrated its Jubilee by special services, conducted in the forenoon by the Moderator of the General Assembly, the Rev. Donald Macrae, D.D., and in the evening by Principal Grant, D.D., of Queen's College. In the afternoon a Com-

munion Service was held, at which the Session of this Church was assisted by the Session of "Old St. Andrew's," Church was assisted by the Session of "Old St. Andrew's," as well as by Mr. T. A. Maclean, formerly an Elder in St. Andrew's. To this service all were invited who had been at any time communicants in St. Andrew's Church, been at any time communicants in St. Andrew's Church, and there would have been, doubtless, a much larger attendance but for the exceptionally heavy storm of rain which prevailed during the afternoon.

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On the Monday evening following a Praise Meeting was held, at which addresses were delivered by the Moderator and Principal Grant, and by representative men from various churches in the city. It has been thought desirable to embody in this statement the substance of the remarks made on that occasion regarding the history of the Congregation:

Fifty years ago "Muddy Little York" had a population of about 5,000, and one Presbyterian Congregation that of Rev. James Harris, who had organized a congregation in 1821 in connection with the "United Synod." According to a statement in Mr. Croil's "Historical and Statistical Report," the authority for which is Mr. Rintoul, the design of forming a congregation in connection with the Church of Scotland was first entertained by some members of the Legislative Assembly when in York during the session of 1830. One of these, the late Hon. Wm. Morris, of Perth, has left on record an interesting incident. (The names of Chief Justice Maclean and the Hon. Peter McGill are also associated with this incident.) He was walking on a Sunday morning by the ruins of the former Parliament House before going to the Episcopal Church, thinking of the possibility of of this drew's," Elder in who had Church, h larger

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"I will not go into my house, nor to my bed ascend;
No soft repose shall close my eyes, nor sleep my eyelids bend;

The words came home to him like an oracle. next day a meeting was held, at which the Hon. Francis Hincks presided, and Mr. Wm. Lyon Mackenzie acted as Secretary. Mr. Thos. Carfrae was the first Treasurer, and the original subscription list bears the names of many of the most prominent men of the time. The men of the 71st and 79th Highland Regiments, then stationed at York, were liberal contributors to the building fund of the Church. The first payment entered in the Treasurer's book was made on the 10th June, 1830. When the corner stone of the old building was removed, there were fragments of two weekly papers found wrapped round the bottle, the Freeman and the Gazette of date Thursday, 24th June, 1830, from which it may be inferred that the corner stone was laid within a week from that day.

The Church was dedicated on the 19th June, 1831. The first minister was the Rev. Wm. Rintoul. The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was first dispensed in the Church on the 30th October, 1831, to 112 communicants. Mr. Rintoul resigned in 1834, and was subsequently minister of Streetsville, and of St. Gabriel Church, Montreal, till his death in 1852. The second

minister was the Rev. Wm. T. Leach, from July, 1835, to 1842, when he removed to York Mills. He is now a minister of the Episcopal Church in Montreal. He was succeeded by the Rev. John Barclay, D.D., who was inducted on the 6th November, 1842. Owing to ill-health, Dr. Barclay demitted his charge in 1870, having spent twenty-eight years in the pastorate of the Church. The present minister was inducted on the 22nd December, 1870.

In 1844, those in sympathy with the Free Church in Scotland withdrew from St. Andrew's and united with Mr. Harris' congregation, forming Knox Church. Subsequently, the Irish element of the Congregation hived off from Knox Church and formed Cooke's Church.

At a meeting of the St. Andrew's Congregation on the 3rd February, 1874, it was resolved that a larger and more commodious edifice should be built. On the 20th April, 1875, the corner stone was laid. On the 13th February, 1876, the new edifice was dedicated, appropriate sermons being preached by Rev. Robert Campbell, M.A., of St. Gabriel Church, Montreal, Rev. Professor Maclaren, of Knox College, and Rev. Daniel M. Gordon, B.D., of St. Andrew's Church, Ottawa.

About the same time, a number of members and adherents of the Church, who did not fall in with the decision of the Congregation to remove to the new Church, were formed into a new Congregation, meeting at first in the old building, and moving subsequently to Jarvis Street, where they have built a handsome Church, and have grown rapidly under the energetic pastorate of the Rev. George M. Milligan.

The erection of the new Church at the corner of King and Simcoe Streets rendered necessary the removal of a building which had been erected by subscription some years before, and in which a Sunday School had been carried on with success. The building was removed to the western part of the city, and is now occupied by the St. Mark's Sunday School.

It may be of interest to state that St. Andrew's Congregation was the first in the Presbyterian Church in Canada to introduce instrumental music into the ordinary public services of the Church. As far back as 1852 a harmonium was used to assist the Choir. A better instrument was introduced in 1860, and a few years later the present organ.

Fiftieth Annual Report of the Board of Managers.

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The Managers have the satisfaction of reporting that the revenue for the year just closed is largely in excess of that of any previous year in the history of the Congregation, the total amount being \$21,766.12. The largest item is the collections, which amounted to \$14,011.63. Of this sum \$11,706.74 was contributed through the envelope system, and \$2,304.89 by open collections. The revenue from pew rents, \$4,495, has varied very little for the past four years, from the fact that with few exceptions the seats during that period have all been rented, so that this item varies only by the amount of unpaid pew rents at the close of each year.

As the Congregation is now entering upon the sixth decade of its existence, it may not be uninteresting to look back, if not over the whole of the past half century's financial record, at least over the last ten years of it, as showing the financial progress made under the incumbency of the present Minister of the charge, which is as follows:

While this result is in the highest degree satisfactory, more than realizing, as it does, the most sanguine expectations of those who undertook the responsibility of erecting so costly an edifice, it must be remembered that the debt is still too large to carry without materially interfering with the work of the Church. The Managers therefore trust that the liberality which has characterized the Congregation in the past will be continued, and that at least the balance of the floating debt will be paid before the close of the year now entered upon.

By special arrangement with the Standard Life Insurance Company, the rate of interest on the loan from that Company will, commencing from the 1st of May next, be reduced from seven per cent. to six per cent. per annum. The rate of interest on the floating debt was arranged for at six per cent. in September last. Through these arrangements a very considerable sum will be saved on interest account.

St. Andrew's Sunday School.

To the Kirk Session of St. Andrew's Church:

I beg to submit for your consideration the following report of the congregational Sunday School for the year ending December 31st, 1880.

The roll of the school shows that there were 140 boys and 159 girls—making a total of 299 scholars, who, with 27 teachers, were in attendance during the year. The average attendance of scholars per Sunday was: Boys, 88; girls, 110; or a total average of 198 per Sunday, being an increase in the number attending of 13, and of 3 in the average attendance, as compared with the previous year.

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Rewards were given to 13 girls and 7 boys who were present punctually at every session of the School held during the year; to 9 girls and 13 boys who were absent only once; to 9 girls and 5 boys who were absent only twice; and to 5 girls and 4 boys who were absent not more than three times—this number being the limit to which prizes are extended. A large proportion of the books and Bibles given were donated by the Trustees of the Jesse Ketchum Bequest Fund, and were by appointment presented to those entitled to them by Rev. S. J. Hunter and W. H. Howland, Esq.

The contributions of the scholars for Missions amounted to \$180.55, which, with a balance unappropriated last year, has been applied mainly to the Missions in India, China, and the New Hebrides, as detailed in the Statement of the Kirk Session. To meet the current expenses of the school, the sum of \$125.64 was received from the Sunday School Fund of the Kirk Session.

The Library contains 560 volumes, and continues to be a source of interest and usefulness to the scholars. An addition, however, of new books is much needed, and as no grant has been made for this purpose for the past two years, I would recommend that one be made at once.

The result of the year's work in the school has been on the whole satisfactory. The general attendance in the different classes has, with a few exceptions, been good. These exceptions refer chiefly to the senior classes of boys, and are no doubt accounted for by the frequent absence of the teachers of these classes, either through sickness or through business engagements. The interest in the lesson studies has been well maintained, and substantial progress has been made in the religious instruction of the young of the Congregation.

Third Annual Report of the Young Ladies' Society.

Thirty-one meetings of this Society were held during the year, at which the average attendance was 15—24 being the largest number present at any meeting. The number of members on the roll is 30.

Five drawing-room socials were held during the first three months of the year, from which the sum of \$85.86

was realized. The annual social took place in the Church in the month of April, the proceeds of which amounted to \$57.65, and a Christmas sale was held in December which yielded \$158.13.

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e first \$85.86 It will be seen that the greater amount of the money raised this year has come from these sources. The Society meets every Thursday for the purpose of sewing. The receipts for this part of their work are necessarily small, the time available for sewing being so short, and the comparatively small number who attend the meetings precluding the possibility of more orders being undertaken. It is hoped that a larger number of the ladies of the Congregation will attend these meetings, and lend their aid in this part of the work of the Society.

The proceeds of this year have, as agreed upon at last Annual Meeting, been devoted to the Building Fund.

Report of Young Men's Association.

The meetings of this Association have been held as usual, fortnightly, during the year. The total number now on the roll is 48.

At a general meeting held in February last, it was decided to amalgamate the working of the Penny Savings Bank with that of the Night School, and for this purpose a suitable building was secured at 168 Adelaide Street West, at a yearly rental of \$180, the total estimated cost to the Association for managing both institutions being about \$240 per year. The Association have undertaken, if possible, to relieve the Kirk Session of the grant made by them to the Dorset Night School, viz., \$120 per annum. The Session have been called on during the

year to pay only \$40, thus having been assisted by the Association to the extent of \$80.

The Association have pleasure in reporting that the change of premises having provided much greater facilities for the satisfactory working of both these institutions, gratifying results have been secured which will more fully appear in the reports of the Superintendent of the Night School and the Convener of the Savings Bank. At the suggestion of our esteemed President, the subject of temperance was taken up, and the question, "In what way can total abstainers and moderate drinkers work together for the suppression of intemperance?" was discussed by the members; and after full discussion from various standpoints, the result was the determination of the members of the Association to discountenance the present "treating" system, this being considered one of the most fruitful sources of the evil of intemperance, especially among our young men. Other resolutions were passed, and a special committee was appointed, which is now engaged in endeavouring to secure the co-operation of other societies.

Social open meetings, debates, etc., have been held during the year, and on the 16th December a most interesting and instructive lecture on Music was given by Rev. John Thomson, of Ayr, in illustrating which he was assisted by Mr. Fisher and the Choir of the Church.

Members of the Congregation and their friends are welcome to all general meetings of the Association, and their sympathy and help in the various departments of work undertaken will be much appreciated.

Dorset Night School Report.

In the beginning of the year our school removed to new quarters in the Romain Buildings, and was there carried on for about two months with considerable satisfaction and success. Finding, however, that the expense of conducting the school there would be greater than we

could well bear, after some negotiation a very satisfactory change was made by which the school was taken in hand by the Young Men's Association, and the school is now carried on in their building, No. 168 Adelaide Street West.

Since our removal to Adelaide Street we have extended our work considerably, and now keep open our rooms six nights of the week, lessons being taught on three nights, and the boys received and entertained on the remaining nights.

On Saturday evenings, concerts, at which numerous friends have kindly given their services, have been regularly carried on since the beginning of March until the present time, except during the months of July, August, and September. The attendance at them is not confined to the boys belonging to our school, but they are open to all who care to be present, and many of those who deposit in the Savings Bank take advantage of them.

The attendance at the school during the past year has been tolerably satisfactory, and our staff of regular Teachers has been increased to twenty, several of them, as is well known, being members of other churches in the city.
