News of the death of Dr. F. T. Taylor, a leading physician of Charlottetown, P. E. Island, was received by Rev. Dr. G. M. Campbell here Tuesday. An added address was given to the occasion by the request that Rev. Mr. Campbell would speak the news to Dr. Taylor's only daughter who arrived in St. John yesterday, having left her father, to all appearance, in good health.

Dr. Taylor came of Loyalist stock and was born at Sheffield, Sunbury county. In his early days he taught school and after taking his medical degree practiced for a time at Sussex. From there he went to London for a post-graduate course and on returning settled in Charlottetown about the year 1871. He married Miss Harz, daughter of Richard Harz of Charlottetown, and a sister of Rev. Dr. Harz, president of the Nova Scotia conference. He leaves his wife and one daughter, Miss Pearl, residing at home, and three sons—Richard, Nettling, and Trevor, in Montreal and Boston.

Both the young man looked a little haggard and anxious, but otherwise they were irreproachably dressed, and there was not the slightest sign in their courtly demeanor, of the terrible catastrophe which they must have felt hovering round them and round their child.

The funeral of Mr. Sproul will be held at 2 o'clock Wednesday afternoon from his late residence to Golden Grove cemetery.

ARE RESTRAINING THE SPECULATIVE ELEMENT

Review of Conditions on the New York Stock Market—Developments that Had a Bearing Upon Sentiment Last Week.

(New York Commercial, Saturday.) Throughout the week it has been generally evident that the interests in control of the market are keeping a heavy hand of restraint upon the professional speculative contingent. Mr. Stillman's alleged intimation that there would be no stringency worth worrying about in the money market provided the mob did not go mad in the stock market, reflected the mood of the strongest bull movement now temporarily halted. From day to day the general list has shown irregularity—the week's advance in securities yesterday was of no more importance in the broad field of values than the decline of many of the wayward stocks. LARGER SUBSIDY FOR THE SENLAC

ON THE WEST SIDE The board of works yesterday rescinded a resolution adopted a few days ago, and also decided that it may be necessary to secure another dredge to clean up the existing steamship berths at Grand Point. Something will depend, of course, on the progress that may be made in the next few days. If the site for the new berth is cleaned up quickly and the crib sunk, the dredge Beaver may be available for the other work. But the board feel that there must be no further doubt or question regarding the dredging to be done at the existing berths, and so enquiries will be made at various points where dredges may be available. This is an interesting commentary on the wisdom of the board and its officials. The citizens were assured months ago that the small city dredge could do the work at the existing berths in ample time and without difficulty. Judging from the tone of yesterday's discussion it is now deemed necessary to secure another dredge. The citizens will support the board in taking such steps as will ensure the necessary depth of water to accommodate the largest steamers at any one side berth at any time of tide. If thirty feet depth is required, thirty feet depth must be provided. The board will do well to keep itself in daily touch with developments, and in this matter refuse to be soothed into a state of easy content by the statements of any of its officials. There is time to do all the work that is needed, but there is no time to be wasted.

THE GRAND JURY Occasionally, in St. John, at least, a grand jury demonstrates its usefulness by very pointedly directing public attention to needed reforms. It may be that such a course is not pursued frequently enough to justify the continued existence of the grand jury. This is certainly the view of the Chatham World, which, after criticizing the last one summoned in Northumberland county, makes this comment: "All grand juries are not so conscientious and misguided, but all are useless. They occasionally defend the ends of justice by taking it upon themselves to acquit an accused person without trial, but they never by any possibility help to punish the guilty or protect the weak. The antiquated body should be abolished. Mr. Tweedie ought to take it in hand and run it out of New Brunswick courts. He ought to put his hand on the judicial system of the province, in this way, and thereby carve his name indelibly on the monumental marble of New Brunswick's history as a reformer. The grand jury may have been useful in the past, but it is useless now. Abolish it."

THE SHADOW OF HEARST The shadow of Hearst looms darkly over the New York state democracy. The Democratic convention to nominate candidates will be held next week, but the Independence League, which is Mr. Hearst's for the governorship, and his friends will try to force the Democratic convention to endorse that nomination. This has developed a condition in the party which is thus tersely put by the Brooklyn Eagle: "The Independent League candidate for governor is in the field to stay, and 'His candidacy will defeat any man nominated at Buffalo, presuming that man to be other than Mr. Hearst himself.'" This brings the Democrats face to face with the following alternative: "They will have to decide whether they will take Mr. Hearst, with a chance of winning, or let him alone with the certainty of losing." It is pointed out that Mr. Hearst and his friends will "exhaust the resources of the political bargain counter" to effect such a combination as will ensure his nomination by the regular Democratic convention. Therefore the Eagle joins other reputable journals in an appeal to the Democrats to accept defeat rather than submit to the domination of the Hearst party. "This is the time," it says, "to file a protest. This is the time to say that there is danger of betrayal. This is the

time to add that the party of the state might as well disband as play second fiddle to the League and its proprietor. Victory is not always with honor. If the Democracy of the state is ready to substitute for its own emblem that of the League, it is already for its grave. After that, a tombstone."

CONCRETE VERSUS BRICK The Times has on several occasions referred to the growing popularity of concrete and steel for building material, as opposed to brick. That the rivalry is becoming acute in the United States is evident from the following article in the New York Commercial: "It is significant of the advance made by concrete as a building material that the New York State members of the bricklayers' international union are in conference in this city this week over the competition of concrete with brick. There is no doubt that the situation is serious, when the bricklayers find it advisable to take up the subject in this special way. The matter has been before former conventions as one of several to be discussed, but at present it seems to come up as an exclusive and important subject not only for discussions but for definite action. While it does not necessarily follow that the more general adoption of concrete would mean disaster to the bricklayers, it might mean that, if the latter failed to prepare themselves for the changed conditions. At present the popularity of concrete must apparently depend on other qualities than its durability, which, however great, has not been practically determined like that of brick through many ages of building. To be prepared, however, for the possible and probable, even if temporary, popularity of concrete shows wisdom in our bricklayers, and their adjustment to new demands will thereby come the more easily and profitably."

The death of ex-Chancellor Harrison has followed very quickly upon his retirement from active work. He has been so long a prominent figure in the life of the university that, though he did not journey about the province, there are young men in all parts of it and in many parts of the world who will regret to learn of his death, and who will have kindly memories of associations with him in student days at Fredericton.

Much depends in New York politics upon the result of today's primaries, but of course the interest centres chiefly in the Democratic camp, where Hearst is fighting for control of the coming Democratic convention. The city is in a political ferment of unusual proportions.

The cotton mills are a very important St. John industry. Anything affecting their future is of interest to the whole community. Therefore the possibility of purchase by the combine, which might also involve periods of idleness, is a matter of general concern.

Sydney is much smaller than St. John, but it has a much larger number of prisoners serving terms with hard labor. Twenty-seven men in the "chain-gang" is a formidable record for a town like Sydney.

The Cuban insurgents cheerfully accept all favors from the government. But they insist that there must be a new election. President Palma is neither a young nor a very vigorous man, and his position is exceedingly trying and difficult.

A CANADIAN FLAG (Montreal Witness). The Canadian flag that is in common use is a very unfortunate one. It has no warrant or authority. The authorized flag places the arms of Canada, and nothing else, on the field of the flag, and the arms of Canada, as authorized at Fredericton, contain the escutcheons of Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia and nothing else. It is time we stopped trying to include new provincial complications in the national seal. It is time that the first four provinces ceased authoritatively to monopolize it. That, however, is a policy matter combined with the flag. It is time the whole barbarous complication, with its unwarranted attachments, was swept away from the national ensign and the single maple leaf, without any frills of any sort, put in its place—a maple leaf 'or' in a field 'gules'.

ITALIAN TRAIN BRIGANDS One of the most remarkable features of the widely organized system of train robberies in Italy has been the impunity with which they have long been committed. The police, however, have at last succeeded in striking a blow which, if properly followed up, may for a time cripple the brigands. On no line of railway has the pillaging of passengers' baggage been more persistent than on the Rome-Naples railway. A large plate glass window, valued at about \$45, the property of T. M. Walker & Co., of Market street, in Springfield, which was being wheeled through Main street from the Mackins, Packard & Wheat store to the Walker building, the other morning, broke into thousands of pieces with a crash, opposite Pynchon street. The glass, which was eight feet square, was on a truck, which was in charge of four men, and the only reason for its breaking was that there was a flaw in one side. The crash was heard for about two blocks.

In Alamo and the German part of Lorraine many families send their children over the French frontier to buy meat. They can get it for 3 or 4 cents a pound less than they are charged in Germany, and there is no duty on small quantities.
