Several of the diplomatic personages were absent; some from indisposition, and others from having gone on summer excursions into distant and different parts of the country. The following presentations took place:
Russia.—M. Alexandre de Bodisco, Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary.
Great Britain—Rt. H. L. Bulwer, Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary.
Ministers of France, Spain, Portugal, &c.
Mr. Bodisco, Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary of the Emperor of Russia, being the senior member of the corps, on being presented to the President, made the following address in behalf of himself and his colleagues:—

"It has pleased Divine Providence to take out of this world the Chief Magistrate appointed by the people to preside over the destinies of the American Union.

After having shared with the whole country the deep and unanimous regrets given to the memory of the illustrious general and emment statesman, whose long and brilliant career has been so suddenly closed, the Diplomatic Corps appear before you to present their respects to the President designated by the Constitution to complete the term of the rational election.
