2 BELIEVED DEAD IN NORTH SHORE CRASH

TRAIN HITS AUTO; CARS ARE UPSET

Frank Young Dead; Harry Fraser Missing in Debris

ANOTHER IS HURT

C. N. R. Work Cars Overturned When Freight Crashes Into Motor Car

BATHURST, N. B., Sept. 28.—One man killed, another is missing and believed dead under the wreck, while a third lies in the Bathurst hospital in a critical condition as a result of one of the worst grade-crossing accidents in the history of the North Shore, about 10 miles from here, when a freight train crashed into an automobile about 10.30 o'clock this morning, wrecking the auto and overturning two work cars which were being pushed ahead of the engine.

FOREMAN INJURED

Fred Estabrook, foreman of a gang of men riding in one of the traveling boarding cars that turned over several times, was badly injured and was immediately rushed to the hospital here. Although his condition is critical, doctors hold out strong hopes for his recovery.

BOX CAR OVERTURNED

The terrific impact when the train struck the machine upset the box car in which the men were riding, causing injuries to the foreman. Last reports were that Mr. Fraser was missing. The engineer was William Young, of Campbellton.

LEeward AND WIndward ISLANDS FACE ISOLATION

Appeal Made to Dominion's Secretary for Canada Service Restoration

LONDON, Sept. 28.—The Leeward and Windward Islands, West Indies, according to a deputation that called on the Colonial Secretary, yesterday, are threatened with complete isolation through the withdrawal of the Canadian Royal Mail service, and the secretary of the dominions was requested to bring the matter to the notice of the Canadian government.

GOVERNOR APPEALS

The London County Council is to erect two buildings of Canadian houses here. Three pairs of such houses are to be provisionally erected by the County Council on its new estate at Becontree.

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SIGNALS HEARD ON WATER PIPE BY WORKMEN

Staccato Hammerings by Rescue Crews Draws Faint Reply

3 BODIES FOUND

Company Completes Elaborate Arrangements to Take Care of Men When Saved

IRONWOOD, Mich., Sept. 28.—Indication of life from the rock-bound eighth level of the Pabst Mine, where 43 men were entombed by a shaft cave-in last Friday, imbued rescue crews today with a do-or-die spirit. The first indication came yesterday, when a distinct signal on a water pipe was heard by a crew of workers in reply to staccato hammerings. Later Alfred Maki, a deaf-mute rescue worker, descended with a safety line about his waist and made his way through debris to the nearest point to the miners yet penetrated.

DELAYS RESCUE

This finding determined that it will be long before rescue can be made by this route. In the meanwhile, however, every available bit of energy is being concentrated on this and three other avenues, one of which is the piercing of a hole by a diamond drill, the most hazardous passage of food, clothing and messages to the men.

ALL ARE CONFIDENT

Everyone is confident that the rescue will be made. Just how long it may take cannot be determined. Expectations were that possibly one expedition would shore through late tonight. The Oliver Iron Mining Company, which owns the mine, however, issued a statement through its press bureau declaring that four or five days more may be necessary.

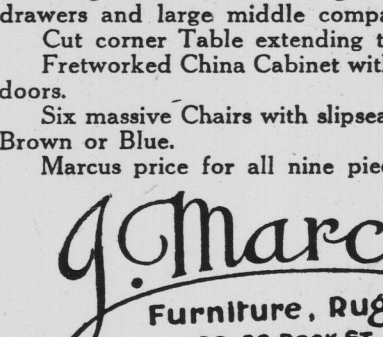

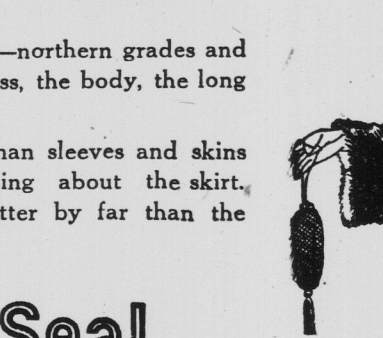

M. C. A. with Dr. L. DeV. Chipman, president, in the chair.

Reports presented showed that the last year had been a very successful one in Scouting in this district. For the coming season two winter courses of training for leaders, a special course for patrol leaders and a Boy Scout Christmas top-shop were proposed and it was also recommended that there should be a Boy Scout booth at the Saint John Exhibition next year.

PLANS FOR SEASON

It was also planned to conduct a 2-A course which would be open to all who had taken the preliminary course and would be based on the second-class test. This second course, it was suggested, should be held after the New Year. A course for patrol leaders was also suggested and this course, Mr. Choppin said, might be arranged for after Christmas, but would probably not be put on until the spring. The Scouters' monthly meetings were to commence as soon as possible. Mr. Choppin also pointed toward the suggestions regarding the Christmas tree top-shop and advocated having the Scouts collect discarded and broken toys, repair and paint them and then distribute them among the children of the city at Christmas time. He also recommended a Scout booth at the Saint John Exhibition next year.

INCOME RECEIPTS

To date about \$474,000 has been received in income tax payments in this district as compared with about \$500,000 at the corresponding date last year. As it is estimated that the refund in the income tax payments amounts to about 20 per cent. of the total sum it would indicate that the incomes in this district in 1926 had been about equal to those of 1924.

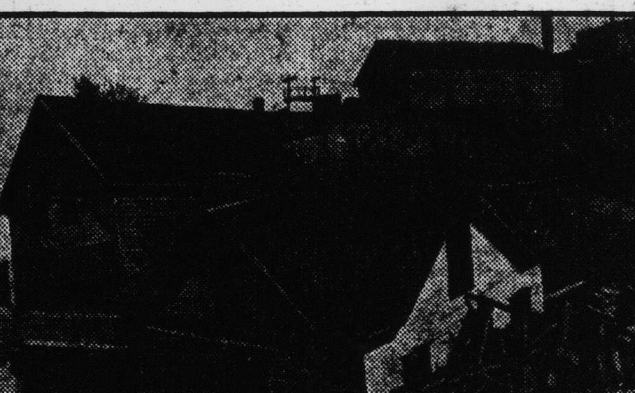
