FORCE TO HEAL FRETFUL SOUL


Address on Brotherhood by Former Pastor of St. John Church.


Brotherhood was the force that would eal the fretful soul of man, pacify his spirit and sweeten his existence, said I. W. Williamson, formerly of Victoria street Baptist enurch, St. John, who at-tended the World's Brotherhood Con-gress at Washington, D. C., and who gress at Washington, D. C., and who addressed the Men's Brotherhood of Hamilton, Ont., the other night. Quoting Foss' beautiful lines: "Let me live in my house by the side of the road, and be a friend of man", Mr. Wil-liamson said that the whole pith of the World's Brotherhood Movement was wrapped up in those words. They breathed the gospel of brotherhood; they challenge to men to lighten the load of those who bore heavy burdehs. The essential quality in successful brotherhood work was the accessibility of friendship, the readiness to extend the helping hand in the moment when it was most sorely needed. Sympathy was also a strong factor. "Often we see men grovelling in the mire," continued Mr. Williamson, whom we think are quitters, who we think are no good because they have lost their manhood. But we should realize the fights those men have waged with their souls. Perhaps for 99 times they have worsted that which has reared its head to destroy them. The fight has been so intense, the odds so unequal, that often the fight has enervated the man, and when the contest must be fought for the hundredth time, he has not the stamina to conquer. If one man losses out, a whole community suffers; If one man wins out a whole community profits. Men are hungering for our gospel of brotherhood. Let us go and seek them," he concluded. GEORGE GIDDENS, ACTOR, DIES AT 75

The Noted English Character Comedian Last Appeared in "Happy-Go-Lucky"-Sixty Years on the Stage.

(N. Y. Times.)
George Giddens, iong well known as an actor both in this country and in England, died yesterday at the St. Paul Hotel, Columbus avenue and Sixty-first street. He was seventy-six years of age and had been on the stage for nearly sixty years. At the height of his career he was considered one of the foremost low comedians of the English-speaking stage, and in more recent years, although generally cast for lesser roles, he never failed to score a personal triumph in any play in which he appeared.
The actor made his last stage appearance at the Booth Theatre recently in "Happy-Go-Lucky," but ill health prevented his going on tour with that play. He had been failing for many months, but his death yesterday followed a comparatively brief illness.
Although he contributed scores of delightful characterizations to the many plays in which he appeared, George Giddens is perhaps best remembered for two roles—that of Toney Lumpkin in "She Stoops to Conquer," and as William, the waiter, in "You Never Can Tell." 


THE FARMERS' STRIKE.
