The supreme example of instinct has been the wasp going through an elaborate course of action to provide food for its yet unhatched offspring, seeking out a particular species of caterpillar, stinging every segment just enough to stun the animal but not kill it, and then depositing the worm at the bottom of its newly made nest where it has laid its egg, covering up the cell and then leaving, never to see the larvae nor to live to do the same act another season.

The spider, finding that its web recled away apparently of its own volition, naturally pulled in the opposite direction to get away.

But, it is said, Cachot found, to his great delight, that the spider did not pull with sufficient force to break the thread, but actually seemed to enjoy the process, maintaining just sufficient tension to keep the web in continual motion. Many spiders, it is said, were tied in this way and at last a sufficient quantity of their produce was obtained to be woven into a fabric. This it is alleged, was superior to natural silk in tenuity, elasticity and tenacity.






