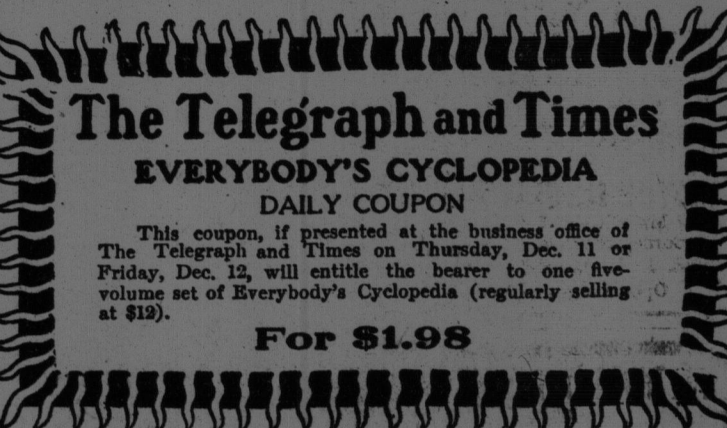

SIR WILFRID COMING BACK
A Toronto correspondent of the Manchester, England, Guardian writes that "for the first time since September 1911 politicians are seriously discussing the possibility of the return to power of Sir Wilfrid Laurier at the next general elections." Continuing, this correspondent says:—

"For the past two years Conservatives have regarded Laurier as merely a getting sum, but as time slips by it is becoming increasingly probable that Laurier has one more fight left. He has been campaigning in the by-elections, and is exhibiting a vitality and buoyancy that surprises even his intimates. This is quite different from the story told by some Conservative journals in Canada, which are pleased to describe Sir Wilfrid as 'now in his political dotage.'"

Discussing Sir Wilfrid's probable policy on the naval question when he returns to power, this correspondent points out that his proposal in parliament last session was to establish two Canadian fleet units, and that attacks upon his loyalty will not cause him to abandon the task of putting into operation an effective naval policy.

"If," says this correspondent, "there is Canadian inactivity in naval matters today, and a possibility of such inactivity continuing, some share of the responsibility must be assumed by the Imperial fusers, who are not satisfied because the Empire is not organized on the pattern of a factory plant, and who are trying to rush the country into a half baked, and, to many people, an objectionable scheme."

Sir Wilfrid's attitude with regard to the navy is very well known. He believes in a Canadian navy, manned and controlled by Canadians, and as far as possible built in Canada, being, however, an integral part of the navy of the Empire. That is the Australian policy, it is the New Zealand policy, and it will be the South African policy when South Africa decides upon a naval programme. That Canada has not already made substantial progress in carrying out such a policy is due to the unfortunate blunder made by the people in September, 1911.

The correspondent of the Manchester Guardian, who says that politicians are discussing the possibility of Sir Wilfrid Laurier's return to power at the next general elections, is quite right. His statement is true, and at the present time the indications are that the longer the appeal to the people is postponed the bigger will be the majority of Sir Wilfrid and his party.

The council of the board of trade is once more prodding Mr. Hazen. It is not a pleasing pastime, but a disagreeable necessity.

Usually at this time of year all the hotels at St. John are over-crowded with passengers going to the old country for Christmas. This year the Halifax hotels are over-crowded.

The figures for November show decreasing revenue and increasing expenditure under the Borden government. The people are paying the price of the blunder committed in September 1911.

There are persistent rumors of a coming shake-up in the provincial cabinet, and the introduction of new blood. These rumors appear to be fairly well founded.

The fact that it costs thirty-nine cents to distribute a dollar's worth of food in New York city, if it is a fact, should lead to a complete re-organization of the system of distribution.

The Playgrounds Association expended nearly \$4,000 during the year and is able to report a balance on the right side. The work of the association is now firmly established, and will grow in importance and value from year to year.

A fourth transcontinental railway for Canada is being promoted. What Canada most needs in connection with transportation at the present time is to see that the ocean ports are equipped to handle the traffic brought to them by the existing transcontinental lines.

Were not assurances given a year ago that the new parcel post system would be inaugurated in Canada the first of next year? An Ottawa despatch says it will probably be the end of February before the system is on a working basis.

The unfortunate New Brunswick man who fell a victim to his devotion to duty as manager of the Bank of Montreal at Plum Coulee, Manitoba, is said to have warned the head office of the danger of robbery. It is most unfortunate that the warning was not heeded in time to prevent the tragedy.

The actual beginning of the work that is necessary to provide proper drainage for the proposed athletic field at Rockwood Park is an assurance that the city council will do its part toward making a portion at least of that field available next year. The field must first be drained. After that has been done.

BIRTHDAYS OF NOTABILITIES

SATURDAY, DECEMBER 6
His Honor Thomas Wilson Patterson, lieutenant-governor of British Columbia, celebrates his sixty-first birthday today. He was born in Ayrshire, Scotland, came to Canada as a boy and has made a fortune out of railroad contracting.

The Hon. W. W. Sullivan, Chief Justice in Prince Edward Island, was born in New London, P. E. I., on December 6, 1848. He practiced law for many years in Charlottetown, entered the provincial government and became premier of the island in 1879. He has been chief justice since 1889.

Ven. Archdeacon Cody, of Toronto, one of the most gifted pulpits orators in the Anglican Church, was born in Embro, Ont., forty-five years ago today. He has for years been a member of the faculty of Wycliffe College but is best known as rector of St. Paul's Church.

SUNDAY, DECEMBER 7
Lt.-Col. A. G. Irvine, warden of Manitoba penitentiary, was born in Quebec, on December 7, 1887. After military service in the east he became assistant commissioner and then commissioner of the Royal North West Mounted Police. He was also a member of the Council of the North West Territories.

Joseph Edward Roy, one of French Canada's most prolific writers and now attached to the Dominion Archives, Ottawa, was born in Levis on December 7, 1868. In early life he was a lawyer but latterly he has given all his attention to historical research.

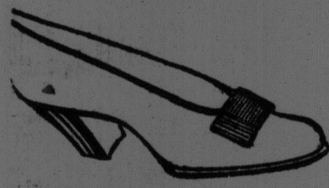

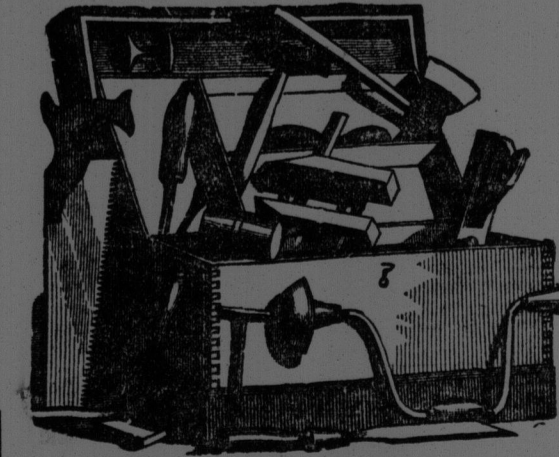
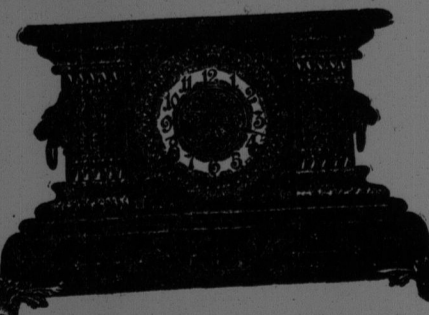

GOVERNMENT AND THE EAST INDIANS

Injury To Empire If Justice Is Not Done

BRITISH PAPER'S VIEWS

Demands in South Africa Two in Number and Reasonable—Responsibility of the Dominions to the Races of the Empire

(Manchester Guardian.)

There are some signs that the strikes of the Indians in Natal will not last, but the partial failure of an agitation in which rather more than half the population (apart from the Kaffirs) has taken part argues nothing against its justice or expediency. The strike can be put down with the strong hand, for the Indians, fortunately for us, are not fighters. But its rights and wrongs cannot be evaded without the gravest risk of injury to the empire. Nor must repression take a form which humiliates too plainly the ordinary civil rights of by far the most numerous class of British subjects. On both these headings the action of Natal shows a lack of consideration for imperial interests.

The repression of the strike is taking forms that are intolerably harsh. Only a very small proportion of the strikers have been guilty of crime; the great majority have been orderly, and far more submissive, than English strikers would be. But strikers who offend by passive resistance to the wrongs of their race have been arrested wholesale and thrown into prison. There may be provisions in the articles of indenture which prescribe imprisonment as the punishment for failure to work, but it seems plain that Indians who are not under indentures are being imprisoned, and unnecessarily so. Evidence that Indians on strike are being brutally flogged by their employers, and generally, are being treated more like runaway slaves than as equal subjects of the king.

The first duty of the home government, therefore, is to watch over the measures of repression, and to see that they are not illegal and to insist that the grievances of the Indians shall be considered, and that promises made to them shall be kept. The strikers desire satisfaction for two demands only. The first is that a tax of 2s a head imposed on Indians whose indentures have expired should be repealed. This tax is designed to force the Indians in Natal to return to India or to enter into indentures once more. It is a measure of forced labor, and such is grossly unconstitutional and illegal.

Their second demand is that there should be reasonable freedom of migration from one province of the South African Union to another for Indians and their families. It has been held by the courts that as Mahomedans may marry more than one wife a Moslem man may be polygamous and therefore that a Moslem Indian may not take even his first and only wife from one province of South Africa into another without the terms of the compromise with General Smuts. Both these demands are obviously supported with the whole weight of the imperial government.

One or two misapprehensions need to be removed. We could wish theoretically that any British subject should be able to hold his head high wherever he may be, and claim as his birthright certain elementary rights of citizenship. Gladstone in a memorable speech attached to Lord Palmerston's boast of Civis Romani sum, but a boast which might be regarded as a boast of his superiority would on the lips of a Briton born be more than an assertion of ordinary human rights. We could wish, if conditions were other than they are, that in every part of the empire the rights of British citizenship gave equal political rights. If it did, India would claim the right of free immigration into South Africa, the vote, and of unimpeded movement from one end of Africa to the other.

If they asserted that right we could understand the jealousy and opposition of the dominions. They would say that the immigration of a race with a lower standard of civilization was endangering their own existence, and that it was necessary to exclude and even to oppress in order to maintain the ideal of a white, that is to say European, South Africa. But the Indians have freely acknowledged the force of these objections. They do not ask for the right of free immigration into South Africa. All they say is this: "Exclude fresh immigrants who you like. Deny us the vote if you feel that you cannot safely share it. But allow those who are already in South Africa certain elementary rights. Do not insist that an Indian shall leave his wife behind him as a condition of moving from Natal to the Cape or to the Transvaal. Allow us to be an inferior class of citizens without the vote, but do not tax us out of the country or into indentures in which we are not quite slaves nor yet free men." Could demands be more modest? Could greater consideration be shown for the ideals and even the prejudices of South Africa?

YEAR BOOK OF CANADIAN ART

The Telegraph has received from J. M. Dent & Sons, Limited, Toronto, a copy of the Year Book of Canadian Art, which has been compiled by the Arts and Letters Club of Toronto, in the belief that it will supply a need in giving information regarding the development of Canada during the year 1912-13 in literature, architecture, music, painting and sculpture. The publication of the book, it is said, has been undertaken as a matter of love for the arts, rather than with the idea of gain, the club having received the cheerful and unpaid assistance of many writers and other authorities in the compilation of the work.

D. Arnold Fox, of this city, contributed an interesting article on "Music in the Maritime Provinces." He says, in referring to what St. John has been doing, so far as music is concerned: "There is a creditable amount of musical activity, and the high standard of efficiency maintained by some of the church choirs of the city is a feature of the choral situation. Both in the standard of music performed and in the manner of performance the ideal is a commendably high one. About two years ago, on the invitation of Ernest S. Peacock, members of several of the choirs united with St. Luke's in the rehearsal of many of the Messiah choruses, and in April last the choir of the cathedral and St. John churches which, under his leadership, took part in the festival. He also writes appreciatively of the excellent work done in St. John by the bands of the 8th Regt. Garrison Artillery and 62nd Fusiliers, and the City Cornet, Carlton Corral and St. Mary's bands.

"No account of music in the province," he adds, "would be complete without mention of Edward Manning and J. S. Ford, both of whom have exercised themselves in the creative side of the art. Mr. Manning has written a number of very beautiful songs. Mr. Ford is the composer of many graceful songs, including two song cycles and a prize anthem."

The Messias and Creation were immediately put into rehearsal, the former being well performed in the Opera House in January 1912. This was followed by a two day's festival in May following, at which Haydn's Creation received a successful rendering, accompanied by a local orchestra. During the past season a successful performance of Cowen's Rose Maiden was given, the soloists, with the exception of the soprano, being St. John people, the accompaniments being sustained by a local orchestra. In April last the society concluded its season with a successful two day's festival."

Mr. Fox, in writing of the annual festival at Fredericton in connection with the re-opening ceremonies in commemoration of the restoration of the cathedral, gives words of praise to the choir of the cathedral and St. John churches which, under his leadership, took part in the festival. He also writes appreciatively of the excellent work done in St. John by the bands of the 8th Regt. Garrison Artillery and 62nd Fusiliers, and the City Cornet, Carlton Corral and St. Mary's bands.

LAYING PIPE TO DRAIN NEW PLAYGROUNDS

Work Begun at Gilbert's Lane-- Other Work of Water Department

The water and sewerage department yesterday commenced work on the laying of 250 feet of concrete pipe under the I. C. R. tracks beyond Gilbert's Lane to drain the new playgrounds at the entrance to Rockwood Park. As the pipe is forty-eight inches in diameter and each section weighs a ton this will be a difficult piece of work. The department is undertaking the renewal of 150 feet of sewer main in Adelaide street, beyond Victoria. The new sewer main in Robbsey avenue has been completed and the filling in of the section which runs along the road has been accomplished. All that is to be done now is the filling in of the trench in which the outlet pipe which runs to the Marsh creek is laid. The new sewer is eighteen inches in diameter and replaces an eight inch pipe.

WANT SISTERS BACK IN PARIS HOSPITALS

Petition Signed by 17,000 is Presented to the City Council

Paris, Dec. 6--A debate was begun in the city council last night on the question of restoring entirely or partially, Sisters of Charity and the members of other nursing organizations to the positions they held in the Paris Hospitals prior to the separation of church and state. H. Alphy and Count De Puyvalgre, members of the municipal council, argued in favor of restoring the Sisters to the former positions, and said such a section was generally desired by the Parisians. They handed in petitions to this effect signed by 17,000 persons. They also favored the re-employment of numerous doctors. The councillors said their arrangements if carried out, would mean a saving of \$50,000 annually. Opponents of the proposition urged that the hospitals should remain neutral so far as religion and politics were concerned, and denied that the annual saving by the re-employment of the nuns would be as great as contended. The debate will be resumed on Monday.

WHITE SLAVERY IN OTTAWA

Five Cabmen Get into Hands of the Police

Ottawa, Dec. 6--One of the biggest hauls made by the Ottawa police occurred when five cabmen and Robert Ford, an alleged white slaver, with three women were arrested. The men are charged with procuring women for immoral purposes. The charges will be laid under the new amendment to the Criminal Code which makes it an offense for a driver of a licensed vehicle to drive women or girls for immoral purposes, no matter what the character of the woman or man may be. The offense is now placed in the same category as white slavery.

A DEPOT INCIDENT

Some more or less unusual sights are presented in the Union Depot these days. With the start of the winter-ports service, it is customary to have a large number of foreigners of many nationalities passing through the city. Amongst the first of them to attract pronounced attention was a diminutive female yesterday. She sauntered past a gathering of citizens, carrying a load which would have startled a man of great proportions. In each hand she had a generous sized grip, with a parcel tucked under one arm, and as though this were not enough, the little woman, who was dressed in the strange native garb of the Caucasian peasant, carried another good-sized bundle carefully balanced on her head, and which did not even "teeter" as she walked along. "It would take two of us to carry all that stuff" said a strong man standing nearby, but she was as unconcerned and unmindful of the attention she attracted as a baby with a teething ring.

GRAMMILE OF THE TOWER OF LONDON

More of it is to be Thrown Open To Public

WHERE PRINCES WERE SLAIN Dungeons Also Where Wretched Occupants Suffered a Living Death—Where Sir Walter Raleigh Took Exercise Before His Execution

(Times Special Correspondence) London, Nov. 22—People who visit the historic Tower of London after the beginning of the New Year will be able to enjoy more thrills by many than have fallen to the lot of visitors in the past, for after that date, the famous Bloody Tower and the grisly dungeons underneath it will be thrown open to the public for the first time.

The Bloody Tower to which a grim air of mystery always has attached, received its name from the murder of the two little princes, Arthur and Edward, at the behest of their uncle, Richard III, which took place there. Up to now, visitors to whom their tragic story appeals have had to content themselves with a look at the tablet which marks the spot, in the nearby White Tower, where the princes' bones were discovered, the Bloody Tower itself having been used as quarters for some of the tower officials, but now the work of getting it and the dungeons ready to be viewed by the public is well under way.

In the Bloody Tower, too, is the famous torture chamber of the old prison, the walls of which were painted with representations of men bearing and inflicting terrible torments. From the upper window of the tower one can enter the so-called Constable's Garden, where Sir Walter Raleigh was allowed to take exercise. After the dynamite explosion in the White Tower in May 1893, which killed sixteen visitors and for which the perpetrators, Cunningham and Burton, were sentenced to penal servitude for life, the historic dungeons were filled up, but they are being cleared rapidly.

"On the walls of some of them," said an official with whom the writer talked, "are carved the names of some of the poor wretches who were imprisoned there." These underground cells are as deep as the famous tower itself, and many of them were specially constructed with a view to the torture of the inmates. One of them is called "Little Ease." It is a cell so small that it was impossible for a prisoner to stand up or lie down in it, except in a cramped position. Another was called "The Pit." It was a frightful place into which little light came, and prisoners were scarcely better than buried alive. Others were full of rats driven into the dungeons in scores at a time from the Byward, Salt and Broad Arrow towers probably will be opened. On the wall of the second named is a quaint drawing of the Zodiac, the work of one Hugh Draper of Bristol, imprisoned there as a sorcerer in 1561. None of these parts of the fortress, however is equal in interest to the White Tower, where Raleigh was confined, where Richard II took refuge during the rebellion of Wat Tyler, and where the Duke of Clarence is said to have met his death in a butt of Malmsey wine. This tower has been open to the public for many years, and thousands of visitors have looked at the axe with which the Earl of Essex is said to have been beheaded, and the block at which Lord Lovell knelt on Tower Hill to receive the fatal stroke.

The White Tower is the oldest part of the grim prison. It was built about 1078 and the first prisoner was Ralph Flambard, or Flebrand, who escaped through a window. It was strengthened by Edward III, who imprisoned there among others, David, King of Scotland, and John, King of France, and his son, Philip. Raleigh is said to have been imprisoned in one of the rooms on the first floor during the time he wrote his "History of the World."

English Author's Work So Treated

LITERARY LONDON

Duchess of Marlborough Spends an Afternoon in Dickens Land—Critic Who Calls Longfellow "a Popgun Loaded With Pop-corn"

(Times Special Correspondence) London, Nov. 19—Eden Phillpotts, who got into trouble with the official censor not long ago, over a play which he made out of his novel "The Secret Woman," has an unofficial one all to himself. The novelist of Dartmoor, who makes his home at Torquay, has been in London for the last week in connection with his new book "The Joy of Youth" and, apropos thereof, he told some of us at the Savage Club the other night about his private and self-constituted censor.

Every time he publishes a new book, Phillpotts says, he receives, a few days later, an unstamped letter addressed to him in which he is still about twenty-one cents to the good after paying the postage due on his censor's letter. The contents of her post-bag, meanwhile, are causing, and have for some time caused, considerable annoyance to a certain woman dramatist, who writes to the papers to protest. Her name is Brandon "D. Brandon," it read on the bills of fare called "The Man With His Back to the East," which was performed in London last year, and because of this some of the critics inferred that the author was a man, while others opined that "Brandon" was an assumed name.

"I am getting a little tired," declared the author, "of appearing in inverted commas, also of having specimens of cigars and cheap or silly books sent me. I am, I repeat, only a dramatist, I beg to assure you that I am not a censor." (DOROTHY) "Spinster."

This letter of Miss Brandon's is supposed to have been written by her and called "Venus on Earth," to be produced at the end of the present week. It is likely that the name will appear on the programme in full in Dickens' Land.

However, since he is welcomed to the pages of the periodical which publishes Maschell, Hewitt, and, incidentally, John Helston, one supposes that Aleister Crowley must have some standing in the literary world, though it is worth nothing that the editor of the "English Review" is careful to remark that Crowley's opinions are not necessarily those of the periodical.

PORTUGAL UNDER WHEEL OF DESPOTISM

ANOTHER HONOR TO EARL BEAUCAMP

Rich and Lucky Young English Nobleman

WARDEN OF CINQUE PORTS

Has Held Many High Posts—Mayor of Worcester at 23, Governor-General of New South Wales at 27

(Times Special Correspondence) London, Nov. 19—To one of the luckiest and most plentifully honored young men in Great Britain still another high honor has just come. This is Earl Beauchamp, who, though he is only forty-one, already has held such distinguished posts as Lord President of the Council, First Commissioner of Works, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of New South Wales, and Lord Lieutenant of the County of Gloucester, to mention only a few, and who has just been appointed Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports in succession to the veteran Lord Brassey, who finds the duties, light as they are, too much for his advancing years.

The motto of the Beauchamp family—whose name, one of those which tickled Mark Twain so much, is pronounced "Beauchamp"—is "Fortuna mea in bello comit," which, in plain English means "My fortune falls in pleasant places, and surely enough, the young earl's has done so. When not yet of age, he came into the earldom, a big fortune and one of the finest "seats" in the country, and at twenty-three he was mayor of Worcester and two years later member of the London school board. At this time the young nobleman was a strong Conservative and he had the youngest pro-consul of a first-class colony on record, too young, perhaps, for his administration in the antipodes was hardly a success. Right at the start he put his foot in it badly by quoting Kipling's famous line to the effect that the inhabitants of the colony had "wiped out their birth stain," a reference to the fact that the colonies were a convict settlement. This indiscretion was fiercely resented, and a newspaper humorist crowned merit by advising "sufferers from birth stain" to "try Beauchamp's pills."

Not Sedate Powder

As he was unmarried, one of his six sisters was left to share his social responsibilities and the "hour" which they held was severely criticized for its pomposity. There was more trouble, too, over his Lordship's endeavors to preserve the exclusiveness of various official entertainments. In order to do this he would issue cards of invitation of two different colors, blue and white—those of the former shade being forwarded to the more important of the guests. It is said that once, when a certain dignitary and his wife arrived at Government House to attend some function, it was found that the blue cards were of two different colors. They were, accordingly, asked to enter by separate doors. Upon this the lady waxed wrath and astonished the officials by remarking "I'll let them see that my husband and I are not a sedate powder."

So it is not surprising that Lord Beauchamp's term of office in Sydney lasted less than two years. The first thing he did after he got back was to marry Lady Lettice Grosvenor, an only daughter of the late George Wyndham, as well as a sister of the Duke of Devonshire, to have kept him permanently in the Tory ranks. She did not, however, for when the split in the Conservative party over Mr. Chamberlain's fiscal policy came, the young earl changed his political coat, even as "Joe" had done before him, and went over to the Liberals, and they welcomed him with open arms.

Almost immediately he was appointed steward to the king, and in 1910 he became a member of the cabinet, succeeding the late Lord Wolverhampton as Lord President of the Council. Two years ago when Lewis Harcourt was made Secretary of State for the Colonies, Lord Beauchamp followed him as First Commissioner of Works. When Lloyd George opened his great "mandating" campaign at Bedford, a few weeks ago, the earl, who owns 18,000 acres, was in the chair.

As Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, Lord Beauchamp's chief duty will be that of acting as chairman of the Dover harbor board. His official residence, Walmer Castle, was the favorite home of the Duke of Wellington, who died there. This lord wardenship of the Cinque Ports goes back to the 13th century, when the five ports—Sandwich, Dover, Hythe, Romney and Sandwich—were the strong of defending England against her continental foes.
