LABOR WORLD

News and Views of the Ever Advancing Army of Workers

Chas. Lavoie is in London this week working up a trade for union label tobacco.

The contest is getting warmer every day for the Typographical Union officers. The candidates are paying friendly visits to the different offices with the hope of getting the vote.

Sam Moore is holding a series of meetings in Cameron Hall of all the piano factories employed during this week and hopes to round up quite a number of new members for the Piano and Organ Workers.

Sam Landers addressed a meeting in Galt last week, and got a two column report out of it in both the local papers. Mr. Chas. Lavoie was also there in his capacity as agitator for union label tobacco.

The Bolt Workers were organized last Tuesday night in Temperance Hall, Bathurst street, by the Organization Committee of the District Council. Another meeting is to be held on Monday next to further perfect the organization.

William Ward is making quite an effort to get his trade all in line. He is holding meetings and bringing in new members for all the locals.

John A. Flett has been in Western Ontario this week, but will visit Quebec again the first of the coming week.

Robert Glocking paid a visit to Hospital during the week in an attempt to fix up a little difficulty there in the woolen mill. He thinks there is a probability of a strike there pretty soon if the members of the union discharged are not reinstated.

The Tailors' situation is now nearing a satisfactory conclusion. Before the week is out, it is expected that all the employers will have fallen in line with the possible exception of two or three. This will mean a strike for the Tailors, as their lowest scale now will be based upon a 20 cent an hour rate, while it will run up to 25 cents per hour on King street.

J. H. Kennedy, First Vice-President, has been in Chicago for a week or more with Hugh Pray and Frank Cole the other officers of the Sheet Metal Workers, making an attempt to settle matters between the independent local and the International Local of that city. The independent local have called a strike and things are somewhat desperate there just at present.

The Leather Workers have had the pleasure of welcoming their International President this week, who is here looking after them in their time of trouble. They have a strike on their hands just at the present time, caused by a demand for \$3 per week. They are, however, striking to win this time, and have a pretty fair organization now, with every prospect of winning.

The last meeting of the Stationary Engineers, Local No. 152, was a very interesting one. Bro. St. John read a paper. There has been between 20 and thirty new members added at each meeting since organization and the union now numbers most of the best engineers in the city. They are applying to the Legislature for a compulsory boiler inspection law, and for all engineers to hold a license.

The local unions of Brushmakers in different parts of the States, under federal charters from the A. F. of L., have under consideration the establishment of an international union. Should this follow, all the Brushmakers' union will go over to the new international.

The American Federation of Labor has published a bulletin containing exact facts in original colors of the union labels endorsed by all affiliated organizations. Copies may be had free, upon application to the American Federation of Labor headquarters.

The following crafts and callings, who have no label of their own, use the general American Federation of Labor label: Bottlers, Brushmakers, Badgenmakers, Cheiving Gun Workers, Coal Drift Workers, Egg Caddlers, Flour Millers, Glove Workers, Glass Workers, Horseshoe Workers, Miners, Tool Workers, Soda Producers, Soap Workers, Suspenders Workers, and Wire Workers. Medicine Workers, Coffee, Spice and Baking Powder, Stone polishers, Carpenters, Cloth Spicers, and Refinishers, Yeast and Vinegar Workers, Cereal Workers.

BONUSED INDUSTRY PAYS LOW WAGES

The Longs' Interests in Collingwood are Large But the Justice Meted Out to Employees is Somewhat the Opposite.

On the shores of the extensive and treacherous Georgian Bay, there is situated the bright little town of Collingwood, which, not to be outdone by any others in the province, must necessarily have a strike on its hands.

When Carnegie's \$350,000 reaches Toronto the Torontonians can sing "Yankee Doodle" to town.

Grand Rapids butchers and cutters have secured the closing of all shops on Sunday and recognition of their union.

James Simpson and Jas. Wilson, go to Oshawa to-night to address a public meeting in that town in the interests of the Carriage Workers.

The Carpenters' and Joiners' have arranged their advance in wages. By the arrangement they are to get 2 1/2 cents increase of the five asked.

Joseph Aimey, of Montreal, a member of the general executive board of the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners, has a most successful meeting with the Catholicians union while there last week.

General Secretary Klipetzki, of the Barbers' International union, has refused the Kingston barbers a charter, on the ground that they allowed their last union to lapse and joined a K. of L. assembly, which also lapsed, after which they were fined \$5 each. The charter will be granted when the fined ones pay up.

In the case of the Special Order Clothing workers, the locals all affiliate with the United Garment workers, and will use the regular garment workers' label now in use by that body, save with the word "made to measure" thereon. This addition of membership to the Garment workers gives them a membership of nearly 50,000, and makes them the fourth largest international body affiliated with the A. F. of L.

The Vancouver Trades and Labor Council has decided to ask the Dominion Trades Congress at its Brockville session to cancel the position of congress organizer of J. H. Watson, of Vancouver, in favor of a government official, being in the customs department. There has been considerable opposition to Watson in British Columbia for some time, owing to his antagonism to international unionism, and his loyalty to the Reform party in preference to the labor interests. The climax was reached at the last by-election in Burrard, when Foley, the labor candidate and trade unionist, was opposed by a Liberal candidate, and Watson took the platform for the government candidate against Foley.

East October, International Vice-President D. Stammer, of Moosejaw, Assa, while organizing his craft at St. Louis, Mo., was very successful from the freight and baggage employees of Eastern Canada to call upon them at his earliest convenience and organize them under the above Brotherhood. The beginning of January, Mr. Stammer completed his work in the Western States, and started for the east, arriving at Buffalo, January 16. Since that date, through the hearty and active cooperation of the freight and baggage employees on the C. P. R. & G. T. R., he has organized a number of local divisions of the Brotherhood at London, Hamilton, Toronto, Prescott, Smith's Falls, Ottawa, Montreal, Farham, Sherbrooke, Quebec, Lewis and Clark, and from present outlook and letters received, expects to have the few remaining points in N. B. & N. S. in line and united with the major ity of employees in a very short time. A system organization has been formed on both the C. P. R. and G. T. R., on similar lines to the system of Railway Employees and the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, Firemen, Engineers, Trackmen, Operators, Machinists, etc., and are now in active operation. The Brotherhood has the cooperation and endorsement of the great railroad craft brotherhood, and is in any way connected with the striking United Brotherhood of Railway Employees out in Western Canada, which organization is antagonistic to all craft organizations and paralyzes its members to break their contracts and also expects the trade unions at points where they jump into trouble to break them also to help them. No organization can succeed without it, and the hearty support of organized labor and the general public. To obtain this support the union must respect their contracts and agreements with their employers, and use all honorable means to get their grievances remedied and their just demands granted, and conduct their organization on business and craft lines.

The local divisions of the Brotherhood of Railway Freight and Baggage Handlers in Canada will no doubt in the near future affiliate themselves locally with the Central Trades and Labor Councils of their respective cities, and are also recommended to affiliate with the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada, thereby placing themselves in a position to co-operate with their brother Canadian unionists for better conditions and laws for all.

The Trades Council of Watertown, N. Y., will publish a weekly paper called the Bulletin.

Smith's Falls Trades and Labor Council is considering the question of affiliating with the Trades Congress.

The "National" Congress, which is composed of four K. of L. assemblies in Quebec and an independent Bricklayers' union at Vancouver, B. C., has adopted a universal label.

The A. F. of L. has now 1,050 elector and general organizers in the field. The Porto Rico organizer has organized a Typographical Union and two unions of Masons of Mayaguez, Carpenters and Masons of Mayaguez, Painters and Blacksmiths of Ponce, and several federal unions at different places.

The President of the Dominion Trades Congress wrote some time ago to Inspector Noxon of the Central prison, Toronto, asking him for information as to expiration of contracts now in force in the different works, and as to what classes of goods were being made there, etc. After a six weeks' wait, the President received an answer of about a dozen words, to the effect that the contracts all expire in 1905. No wonder how Mr. Ross was so quick to propose that the "prison made" label would be put on as soon as the present contracts expire, and this was before the last provincial election.
