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

OIR DENOMINATIONAL WORK.

Some twelve years ago an endeavor was put forth to systematize our methods of raising funds for our denominational enterprises. The outcome of this was what is known as the "Convention Scheme." In this scheme two principal objects were had in view—to augment the aggregate fund raised by the churches, and to apportion this fund wisely and equitably, according to the needs and the importance of the different departments of our work. The plan met with less opposition, perhaps, than usually fails to the lot of innovations, and, or the whole, it has proved highly Scheme." In this scheme two principal objects were had in view—to augment the aggregate fund raised by the churches, and to apportion this fund wisely and equitably, according to the needs and the importance of the different end departments of our work. The plan met with less opposition, perhaps, than untilly falls to the lot of innovations, and, on the whole, it has proved highly satisfactory. The aim to raise annually a sum equivalent to one dollar a member for all embraced within the limits of the Convention, has not as yet been reached, but there has been a marked increase in the contributions from the churches. 1. It is not customary. We think there are good reasons why such a practice should not obtain. All reference to the Lord's Supper in the New Testament go to show that it was observed by the church, or a company of disciples met together for religious worship. But in many churches, especially in the United States, they are simply elected to hold office for a certain time. Pretty much all that is said about deacons in the New Testament will be found in 1 Tim., chap. 5. The seven, spoken of in Acts, chap. 6, were certainly appointed with the imposition of the hands of the apostles. But these are not called deacons, and whether they were deacons in the ordinary sense, to say the least, admits of question. "The recorded memberahip of the church a year ago today was 200. Since that day we have visited the baptismal waters on eleven different occasions at home. We have given the hand of fellowship to 95–70 of whom came to us by baptism, 22 by letter and three by experience. Of the 95 added during the year, 31 are young men (including 11 who are under sixteen years of age), 29 are female-heads of families and 14 are male heads of homes. Among these heads of homes are 12 couples. It may not be without ingrest to say that of the number who joined us during the year, three had their training in the Roman Catholic aith, 14 in the Episcoplain faith, 25 in the Methodist faith, and 12 in the Presbyterian faith. By the additions of the year 23 families are now represented on our membership roll who were not there a year ago, besides four other families we have left the city."

Mercy drops are still falling upon us, for which we are grateful. We are not holding any special services, but we are enjoying special favors and gradual, yet constant accessions. Aiready this year eighteen have been added to our number, six of them this week. Our young people's meetings are seasons of great prefit and encouragement. We have no resteemed Bro. D. A. 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

No better use of winter made manure is possible than to draw it out and apread thinly over fields which are to be clover seeded this coming spring. It will assure a rampant growth and even stand of clover, and it will be all the better if the manure is spread evenly over as large a surface as possible. Each particle of manure will shelter and fertilize a clover plant, and before midsummer it will give the clover gisch a growth as it will give the clover gisch a growth as to make it smother the smaller annual weeds, besides being a serious check to quack grass and Canada thistles. So strongly are we convinced that clover growing is profitable that we would advise purchasing high-priced fertilizers to give the clover a start on land too poor to make a catch otherwise, rather than apply such fertilizers to crops it be sold from the farm. 
