





FOR BEAFF OF SOLDIERS Citizens' Committee com-

plete plans for raising of fund — Different activi-

ties. The executive of the citizens' com-mittee for the help of the soldiers and their families met yesterday morning at 11 o'clock in the Board of Trade rooms. Judge Forbes is chairman and A. P. Barnhill was appointed deputy chairman. Mr. Barnhill read a report of the insurance committee that had been looking into the matter of insur-ing the soldiers. He said that he had communicated with the Lieutenant Governor. The government would hold a meeting in the city on Friday morning and would take up the matter of haurance. A scheme would prob-ably be arranged to insure every sol-dier at the expense of the province. In the meanfume he suggested that the local committee defer action until after the government meeting. G. S. Mayes said that in addition to insurance which would be solw work-ing and good only in the event of the solder's death, there should be ool-lectors appointed to gather a fund for illes and to help the men themselves. L. P. D. Tilley supported this idea. Judge Forbes said the plan should be to divide up the committee of one hundred and to make fifty districts to vork our this plan. The Mayor then reported that the fity donation of \$2,000, amounted to \$4,6400, not counting the \$2,000 offered by Messrs. James F. Robertson and G. S. Mayes. The fund is to be cal-ed the "Soldiers and Families' Part-otic Fund." It is to be deposited in the Bank of Nova Scotta. The mentoned there were the following: A beneful




AMOUS GENERAL COMMANDING KAISER'S FURLES

General Heimuth von Moltke, who as Chief of Staff of the German army commands the Kaiser's forces, is sixty-six years old and has spent his life stidying the business of war. He distinguished himself notably in the prance-Prussian War. He was born in Gersdorf, Mecklenburg, and attended the gymnasium at Rendsberg. He was a leutenant in France-Prussian War time, and was decorated with the Iron Cross of the second class. Most of his service has been with the general staff, and at the time of the death of General Field Marshal Count von Moltke, his uncle, he became aide de camp to the Kaiser.
