4. That the object of this association is to stimulate recruiting in the Province of New Brunswick.

5. This association shall meet monthly at the call of the president.

6. The executive of this association shall meet at the call of the president.

7. Four members of the executive shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business by the executive of this association.

8. Eight members of this association shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

9. The president, or in his absence, the vice-president shall preside at *Il meetings of this association and in case of the absence of both the president of the members of this association of those members present.

10. That the members of this association embers present.

10. That the members of this association and all the officers thereof, serve without any compensation, and without being reimbursed for expenses.

11. The secretary of this association shall be the chief recruiting officer

of New Brunswick.

12. He shall keep a true and correct record of the transactions of this association.
