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A Catholic Jubilee.

Oh, it must be now that the Kingdom's come!
An "Eccegenical" letter of our Most Holy Lord, Pius IX. by Divine Providence, Archbishops and Bishops and all Ordinaries of places, in grace and communion with the Holy See and to all the faithful of Jesus Christ, proclaims the year 1875 a Jubilee year, the second that has been observed as such in this century. After reciting the causes that postponed the celebration from 1850 until now "our most Holy Lord" says:

Let, then, the entire militant Church of Christ bear the words in which, with a view to her own exaltation, the satisfaction the Christian world and the glory of God, we decree, announce and promulgate the great and general Jubilee for the whole coming year 1875, and all the saints, the faithful of the salvation of men has conferred to our stewardship. Therefore, confiding in the mercy of God and the satisfaction of his saints, the blessed Peter and Paul, and in virtue of the supreme power of binding and loosing, which God has entrusted to us, notwithstanding our unworthiness, we concede and grant, during the jubilee year, the Plenary Indulgence of the Jubilee year, with the remission and pardon of all sins, to the faithful of Jesus Christ and to each of them individually whether inhabiting our Mother Church or who come thence or who reside beyond its walls in whatever part of the world they live in the grand and oblation of this Holy See, providing that, being truly penitent, they confess and receive the Holy Eucharist, and that they have been duly examined by their vicars or representatives as soon as our letters shall have been received by them, and that they shall devoutly pray for the prosperity and exaltation of the Catholic Church and for the souls of the departed, and that they shall also contribute to the support of the Holy See, and that they shall be diligent in the payment of their tithes and other ecclesiastical dues, and that they shall be diligent in the payment of their tithes and other ecclesiastical dues, and that they shall be diligent in the payment of their tithes and other ecclesiastical dues.

Salary Grabbing Reflected.

It is stated by an Ottawa despatch that a fresh salary-grabbing scheme has been concocted by this Government. Having helped their friends liberally out of the public treasury, the Ministers have decided to help themselves. The Premier, the economical Mackenzie, wants \$120,000 a year, and such men as Mr. Isaac Burpee value their services at \$100,000. This will still further open the eyes of the people to the fact that plunder, not the public good, was the motive that impelled the men who resorted to villainous practices to get into power. Ben. Bullock and his followers have distinguished themselves at Washington by using the power entrusted to them by the people for robbing the treasury, and the self-proclaimed promoters of purity and economy at Ottawa are following in his footsteps. All that is necessary, in order that they may attain to the same depth of official degradation, is for them to incorporate a back-pay clause in this measure.

In Bad Odor.

United States legislators are in very bad odor generally. A man may not lose his character by going a week to Congress, but his reputation is in danger. The fact that a man has held a seat in that body or a State Legislature for any length of time is generally held to be prima facie evidence of his dishonesty—dishonest enough to hold him for a few years of any unscrupulous charges that may be made against him. "There's where they do the stealing" is what hackmen say as they point out the halls of legislation to sight-seeing tourists, and the remark passes without protest. 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City Police Court.

The room was crowded this morning, the great excitement being the Royal Hotel robbery trial. Besides this there were cases on the sheet, the disposal of which occupied four minutes, three and one-third seconds.

Daniel Tado, Tread or Todd, as the same man has had his name written on the sheet, was in for protection. He was charged also with vagrancy, and confessed to the charge. Six months in the penitentiary fixed him.

John Thomas and Arthur Bryden, arrested drunk in Charlotte st., were fined \$4 each.

The Clarke-Peters case, for abusive language, was adjourned until tomorrow.

Then the great case came up, and Mullin, Cassely, Furness, Donnell, O'Doherty, Donovan, and Hatfield were arraigned on the charge of stealing \$60 from the till of the Royal Hotel. They all pleaded not guilty. It is seldom that such an array of legal talent is seen sitting round the Clerk's table. It was immense in quantity. F. A. Morrison appeared for the prosecution; John Kerr for Mullin, Cassely and Furness; C. A. Stockton for Donnell; G. R. Pugsley for O'Doherty, and Donovan; and E. C. Skinner for Hatfield.

The first objection was made by Mr. Stockton, who inquired whether all the prisoners would be examined together, or whether they should be examined separately. Mr. Pugsley made the same inquiry. The Magistrate said they would all be examined at once. David Boyle was the first witness. He is night porter at the hotel. According to his evidence the hotel door was closed at 11.30 p. m. and, after answering a bell, he came down stairs and saw the crowd in the office. The witness was asked to identify the persons he saw in the bar room, and he pointed out all but O'Doherty and Donnelly. The counsel for the prosecution wanted him to identify the two others, but Mr. Pugsley objected, as one of his clients had been pointed out. Mr. Stockton also objected, and a lively "oh" ensued between the counsel. Oil was poured on the troubled waters, and the examination went on. The witness stated that the crowd went into the bar, and commenced, after a little, having a "light in fun." Mr. Pugsley wanted to know what a "light in fun" was, and the witness said that it was a game of cards, and was rolling and tumbling over the floor, kicking and striking each other. This description of a party fight convulsed the court. He proceeded to say that they were working in the bar room, through the wash room, and out of the door. The examination was finished and the question arose—"Who shall cross-examine?" Mr. Morrison thought that one of the counsel for the defence might do it. The counsel assented, and then Mr. Kerr arose to cross-examine. He wore an Ulster gown. Apologizing for commencing the examination, as he was junior counsel, he proceeded. Under a pointed examination the witness shook in his statements. He said that the outside door was fastened at eleven, and was afterwards unlocked by the waiter, and that some one else, when asked why he did not say before that Furness was let in fifteen minutes before, he said he was not asked. He also said that Furness and his friend went out before the rest of the party. There was another identification, and the witness walked round and touched five of the prisoners gently on the shoulder. The lawyers would only be content with identification by touch, pointing out was of no use. The prisoners smiled audibly as the fingers of the porter touched their shoulders. Mr. Pugsley asked one question and had another identification. By Mr. Stockton's examination it was proved that the bar was open for the accommodation of customers. Mr. Skinner closed the cross-examination. His questions were directed to prove that there was no unusual thing for a crowd to go in. The witness said he was in and out of the bar room several times, and that it was after one o'clock when the crowd left. The lights were turned down once, and again lighted when a drink was called for. "You are a man of ordinary intelligence," said Mr. Skinner. "That's for the court to decide," said Mr. Morrison. "We are not trying out the question of the stupidity of the witness." "He seems of ordinary intelligence," said the Magistrate. "Then," asked Mr. Skinner, "how many of the seven men in the bar room were fighting?" The witness could not say. "Very ordinary intelligence," remarked some one. The witness swore that the crowd were in the bar room in the dark fifteen minutes. On this point the counsel examined the witness severely. He could give account of one minute, but could not tell much about the other fourteen. The witness at the close positively swore that two of the crowd went in first, three afterwards, and he could not tell how two others got in. The re-direct examination was commenced by Mr. Morrison. His first question was "Did all after they went into the bar act together?" The counsel for the defence objected, Mr. Skinner being particularly emphatic, and insisting that it was for the court to decide whether they were acting together or not. "I know that as well as you," said Mr. Morrison. "And why do you do such a question?" "I know what I'm doing," was the curt response. The Magistrate decided Mr. Skinner's objection well-taken. There were no new facts elicited, but some little amusement was furnished by the "spats" of the counsel. The re-cross examination by Mr. Pugsley proved that, from the position of the witness on the stairs, he could see every one who entered the front door. At this point Mr. Morrison asked that the examination might be adjourned, as he wished to go to Frederickton. The counsel for the defendants all consented on condition that the prisoners should be released on bail. "Any bail would

Shipping Notes.

The brig Ethel Bolton, Swain, master, sailed for Portland on the 4th inst. from Port-au-Prince, New York, while being shipped up to Portland on foot of the schooner Gladstone, staying the latter's boat.

The steamer "Ondine," Miller, master, at Hamilton 4th inst. from Liverpool and Halifax, ran ashore at the mouth of Craigville Channel during a fog on the night of the 28th inst. It is thought probable that she sustained little if any damage.

Miss J. Veselac, the bark Olive Mount, Jordan, master, sailed from Norfolk, Va., for Liverpool, on the 10th Dec., and was spoken on the 4th Jan., in lat. 50 40, lon. 18 15, (about 400 miles off Cape Clear) has not since been heard of. She is partly owned by J. G. Jordan, Esq., of this city.

The schooner Trout, which sailed from London on the 1st October, for this port, was off Deal on the 2nd, and which put into Dartmouth for shelter, sailing again on the 29th, has not since been heard of. She is now 103 days out from the latest port. It is feared she has foundered with all hands.

LONDON, Feb. 8.

The Times' telegram from Spain states that Senor Zorrilla's office consisted in his issuing invitations to a conference for organizing the Republican party on the basis of the Constitution of 1809.

The committee of Austrian nobles, which have hitherto contributed largely to the Carlist cause, have advised Don Carlos to conclude peace with Alfonso.

The Daily Telegraph's correspondent asserts that the object of the Carlist attack at Oteiza was to capture King Alfonso. He was known to be in the vicinity. Eight battalions of Carlists were engaged in the movement.

PARIS, Feb. 8.

M. Duhret, the Legationist Deputy in the Assembly, is dead.

Additional returns from the election in the Seine et Oise, yesterday, show that M. Valentine, the candidate of the Republicans, was elected to the Assembly.

A dispatch from Bayonne contains the following concerning the military operations in the north of Spain: "Alfonsist chiefs, Mendicuti and Arguente, were killed by their own men. Don Carlos has retreated to the town of Vergara."

NEW YORK, Feb. 8.

A smoking car on the Missouri Pacific Railroad, near Osgo River, was thrown from the track, and several persons were seriously injured.

OTTAWA, Feb. 9.

Premier Mackenzie gives notice that he will introduce a resolution authorizing the Government to grant a full amnesty and pardon to all persons connected with the Red River rebellion, excepting King and Leprie, who will be banished from the country for five years.

The Government ground their reasons on the promise of amnesty as they allege, that was made by the late Government, which involved the honor of the country.

Mr. Donville, on Thursday, will enquire of the Government whether it is its intention to purchase Ferguson's property, St. John harbor, for a deep water terminus for the Intercolonial Railway.

LONDON, Feb. 8.

A steamer with 400 troops leaves Cadix shortly for Cuba.

DISPATCHES FROM SPAIN DO NOT confirm the report of the capture of Estella by the Alfonsists.

King Alfonso returns to Madrid Saturday.

Gen. Jewell, takes chief command of the army of the North.

It is reported that upon the passage of the Supreme Court Bill, Mr. Forster, Minister of Justice, will be elevated to the Quebec Bench. Pelletier will succeed him.

It is proposed to increase the salary of the Premier to \$12,000, and the salaries of members of the Cabinet to \$10,000. Parliament last evening. The Treasurer had his accounts ready, and they were inspected by the members of the House. The accounts, covering several quinquennial periods, are models of neatness, and effected many compliments to the Treasurer. These accounts show that the receipts from various sources last year were \$5,623,283, and the disbursements, amounting to \$380,23 were ordered to be paid.

L. T. McCleary through A. L. Fisher, Esq., his counsel, notified the Board that an action for damages against the town would be entered in consequence of injury sustained by him through a defective sewer.

Holly street was ordered to be repaired. The winding of the sewer, Church clock was vested in the Police Department. A copy of the Slaughter-House Bill was submitted and referred to the committee on Town Officers.

Mr. A. B. Palmer asked leave to build a house in Main street, on a line with certain other buildings already erected, but as it was shown that said buildings encroached on the street the privilege was not granted him.

The Auditor of Schools Accounts reported. The amount received was \$24,722.28, and there was a balance on hand of \$325.32. It also appeared that there were outstanding debts to the amount of \$7,825, the principal part of which is due the Government.

The taxes of Messrs. Long & Barnhill, whose mill was burned last fall, were reduced 850. The legal adviser of the Town, by letter, informed the Board that the Town had no right to the Fishery Lots on the Straight Shore.

(This is in accordance with a decision given in the City Police Court some years ago in a case that came before Police Magistrate Gilbert.)

Cons. Fellows submitted two bills—one to provide for the placing of water and sewerage affairs in the hands of a commission; and the other to provide for the issue of debentures to pay for permanent improvements. The two bills were referred. On motion of Coun. Hayward it was resolved that it is desirable to have a Standing Committee to take Justice Tappin's place in case of illness or absence. Board adjourned.

One of them was his partner, surrounded by his family, when the door suddenly opened, and the other rushed in, and placing the muzzle of a pistol close to the breast of the first exclaimed, "I've got you now."

The hunter struck a pair of scissors in the intended victim's vest pocket, and was cut into three places which were afterwards found in the pocket.

The would-be assassin was permitted to depart without molestation, the assailed man merely observing to inquirers that it was a vendetta, and he would settle it himself, and he probably will when he has more pistols than he can carry.

At the same time a vendetta is now such a bad thing to have on hand when you have plenty of scissors distributed over your person.

The Archbishop of Canterbury is not satisfied with the manner in which the ships of the British navy are christened on being launched into their native element. (It is the correct thing to say "native element," but why it should be so is one of those mysterious points which are not explained and they carry).

Knocking away the dog shores, cutting the silk cord and smashing the bottle of wine over the ship's bows are not solemn enough for such an occasion, and so the Archbishop has prepared a service which is hereafter to be used at the launch of a royal ship. The service opens with a portion of the 107th Psalm, beginning with the words, "They that go down to the sea in ships." A special prayer is provided, and the service closes with the Lord's Prayer. While the matter looks like an endeavour to extend the temporal influence of the church, the ceremony in proper hands may be made very impressive.

The unprecedentedly large number of divorces taking place in Maine has begun to attract attention. It has been ascertained from official sources that 487 divorces were decreed in this State last year. It is said that in no other State in the Union is a divorce so easily procurable as in Maine. Of the 487 divorces granted last year, 255 were on decree, 82 for adultery, 79 for cruel and inhuman treatment, and 33 for other causes,

such as neglect to provide, incompatibility of temper, &c. One divorce was decreed in a certain county for about as absurd and trivial a reason as one could possibly conceive, and yet, because one had "sailed with" and the other didn't, there was a wish of harmony between the two, which was sufficient cause for the marriage relation to be legally severed.
