QUESTION IV.

What Ministers have died since last Conference?

ANS,WER.

WILLIAM SMITH, who was a native of Bingham, Nottingham, England. Losing his father when but a child, he was piously brought up by his excellent mother, who was for many years a truly devoted member of the Wesleyan Church, the event furnishing another to the many instances in which, through widowed maternal influence, a gracious Providence developed character and fits for usefulness its obedient instruments. In early life Mr. SMITH was converted to God, from which time, notwithstanding some little peculiarities of temperament, he was earnestly consistent in his religious course and demeanour, — very studious and very successful in his studies.

In the year 1827 he was appointed by the English Conference to labor as a Missionary in these Provinces, where he has occupied with credit to himself and profit to our congretations, some of our most important Circuits, and in all his appointments, earning for himself the character of an industrious Pastor and able Minister of Jesus Christ. He was eminently a man of prayer. His death was sudden. In redurning from an evening service a short time before his deAre

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mise, he had taken cold, from which he suffered much, through great difficulty of respiration - a temporary relief however permitted his occupancy of the pulpit on Sunday forenoon, (Feb. 16th,) when a relapse ensued, closing his public labours of thirty-six years. On Saturday, the 21st, about noon, the attention of Mrs. Smith was more particularly engaged by some observation he had made, when suddenly his eyes were fixed, and the ominous pallor which indicated death, announced the flight of the immortal spirit. Since the death of his daughter, last autumn, Mr. SMITH's mind was much engaged in meditation and prayer, which subsequent events prove to be peculiarly appropriate, and although the suddenness of his removal precluded the possibility of any verbal testimony as to his hope of eternal life, we sorrow not for him hopelessly-a life-long testimony sustained by the spirit of an intelligent piety-the result of a loving faith in the Lord Jesus warrants the persuasion that he has entered into the joy of his Lord.

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QUESTION XII.

What are the Resolutions of Conference respecting the Supernumerary Ministers' and Ministers' widows' Fund ?

ANSWES.

1. The Conference is pained to observe that whilst several of its Ministers have recently been compelled by the failure of their health to become Supernumeraries, and consequently claimants on the income of this Fund ; the sums reported from the Circuits are below the amount raised by them in the year

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preceding, and the whole is greatly below the originally estimated, and very moderate contribution of an average of ten cents per member.

2. The Conference invites the attention of the members of the Church generally to this fact, and of the Superintendents, who are directed not only to make the required Public Collections, and the personal application to the members of classes for contributions—but also to carry out our rules for securing an income to this Fund, so considerately and earnestly, that the amount raised during the next year, and in subsequent years, may become commensurate with the increasing claims upon its income which must inevitably occur.

3. The Conference observes further, that during the year, no special donation to this fund has been made, perhaps because that form of liberality may not have been the subject of remark to our kind and able people, who, we are sure, have no disposition to forget the Ministers who have worn themselves out in the service of Christ and His Church.

4. The Conference resolves that for the future administration of this Fund, the following shall be the Standing

RULES AND REGULATIONS.

(1.) THE Committee shall consist of the President, the Co-Delegate, and the Secretary of the Conference, six other ministers and six lay gentlemen, to be appointed annually by the Conference, one of the Members of the Committee so appointed, being designated to the office of Secretary, and two, one Minister and one lay geatleman,—to that of Treasurers of this Fund.

(2.) Every member of this Conference, not being a Supernumerary, and who is not connected with the Annuitant Society of the Parent Conference, shall be *required* to pay a subscription of ten dollars, N. S. Currency, annually, in advance, at the time of the District Meetings.

(3.) Preachers on Trial may pay the Annual Subscriptions for the period of their probation, either in advance from year to year, or by an equivalent payment in one sum at the expiration of their probation

(4.) Each Circuit shall be considered as responsible for a yearly sum, equal at the least, on a general average of all the Societies included within that Circuit, to sixpence (ten cents) per member; the number of the members being taken in all

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ailure of equently ted from the year cases as returned at the preceding Conference, and published in the Minutes.

(5.) Every Minister shall, at the renewal of the Society Ticket during the September visitation, fully explain to the members the nature and reasonableness of the claims of this Fund upon the justice and liberality of our Church# He shall then enter in the Class Book the individual annual subscriptions, which are to be paid before the ensuing District Meeting.

(6.) An Annual public collection in aid of this Fund shall be made in all our Chapels and other preaching places in the month of December.

(7.) Applications shall be made to our friends in each Circuit for Subscriptions and Donations in aid of this Fund.

(8.) The CAPITAL STOCK of this Fund shall consist of the amount of all monies received by the Treasurers from time to time until the Conference of 1863; and this shall be increased by the addition of all suns which may be received as legacies from time to time, or subscriptions under the 3rd and 11th Rules, and the excess of *current income* above current claims in each succeeding year.

(9) The CURRENT INCOME of the Fund available for the payment of Annual claims for each year, shall, until the Conference of 1870, be the monies collected under the 2d, 4th, 5th, 6th and 7th Rules, and subsequently to that period, in addition, the interest received on the amount of the Capital Stock invested.

(10.) Any Minister being a Member of this Fund, shall, upon becoming a Supernumerary, at or after the Conference of 1865, have a claim upon the current income of the Fund, so long as he shall remain a Supernumerary in connection with the Conference-for an annuity equal to the sum of all the Annual Subscriptions of ten dollars each - which he shall have previously paid to the Fund ; - and a widow of any Minister having been a member of this Fund, at or after the Conference of 1863, shall, so long as she shall remain his widow, have a claim upon the current income for an annuity equal to one-half the sum of such Subscriptions which her deceased husband may have paid. Provided, however, that if the wife of any Member of the Fund shall die, and he should marry again, he must, in order to entitle his new wife to such annuity, pay ten dollars a year additional for each year of his connexion with this Fund previous to his marriage, otherwise her claim shall be considered as commencing only at the time of her marriage. And provided always that when in any year the current income shall be insufficient to meet the claims of that

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year in full, such claims shall be proportionably reduced by the deduction of an equal per centage from all.

(11.) Any Minister, upon being received from any affiliated or other Conference or section of the Christian Church, and to whom a standing may be assigned among us as having travelled any number of years prior to such reception, may obtain a standing in connexion with this Fund for such previous years by paying, in addition to the Annual Subscription of ten dollars, a *bonus* of ten dollars for each such year's privilege.

(12.) Any person having been a Member of this Fund, who shall cease to be connected with the Conference, may bere paid the sum of his Annual Subscriptions of ten dollars each, whenever, subsequent to such disconnection, there shall be in the Treasury of the Fund a sufficient sum arising from payments under the 3rd and 11th Rules, or an excess of current income above the amount of claims under the 10th Rule, but not from the Capital Stock which may have been previously accumulated.

(13.) It shall be the imperative duty of each Chairman of a District to earnestly endeavour to secure the due observance of the Rules of this Fund throughout his District, by calling special attention to them at the September or Financial District Meeting; by particularly enquiring at the Regular District Meeting whether proper attention has been paid on each Circuit to the interests of the Fund, especially in regard to the 5th and 6th Rules; and by reporting to the Conference if any Preacher, Superintendent or other, is unfaithful in this respect. It shall be his duty, also, to see that all the money collected in his District is paid to the Treasurers of the Fund, with a particular account of the sources whence obtained, at least one day before the time appointed for the meeting of the Committee in each year.

(14.) A particular account of the state of the Fund in regard to the amount of the Capital Stock, Current Income, and Expenditure, &c., &c., shall be prepared under the direction of the Committee, and presented annually to the Conference.

(15.) No alteration shall be made in the Rules of this Fund until after notice of such proposed change shall have stood one year on the Journal of the Conference, and shall have been reported by the Committee, and not then, unless concurred in by a two-thirds vote of all the Members of this Fund then present.

QUESTION XIII.

What are the Resolutions of the Conference in reference to the affairs of the Book Room and the Provincial Wesleyan ?

20 Answer.

1. That the Conference contemplates with much gratification any indications of prosperity in the working of our Book Establishment, and being more deeply than ever convinced of the desirablences and importance of a more extensive diffusion of our incomparable Wesleyan. Literature, together with other various productions of a healthy Press throughout these Lower Provinces, confidently relies upon the cordial and assiduous co-operation of each of its members, and of the Wesleyan Public generally, in securing the accomplishment of this object.

2. That whilst the Gonference regards the increased circulation of the *Provincial Wesleyan* during the past year as affording encouraging evidence of its efficiency and growing popularity as the Organ of our Church; it, at the same time, deeply regrets to observe the delinquency of a large number of the subscribers in the payment of their subscriptions, and feels the absolute necessity of the utmost exertion on the part of our Ministers to collect the arrears on their respective Circuits at as early a date as possible, and would most earnestly recommend that in future, in every practicable instance, the subscribers be induced to pay their Annual subscriptions during the early part of the year.

8. That the Conference, entertaining a high estimate of the devotion, zeal and talents, which have been displayed by the Book Steward and Editor of the Provincial Wesleyan, the Rev. John McMurray, during the past year, in the discharge of the onerous and responsible duties of his position—tenders to him the expression of its most cordial thanks, and would assure him of the warmest sympathy of his brethren in his indefatigable efforts to promote the success of that department of the great interests of the Conference more especially confided to his care.

QUESTION XIV.

What are the Resolutions of the Conference respecting the Educational Fund for Ministers' children ?

ANSWER.

The Conference regrets to observe that while there has been an increase of Ministerial subscriptions, the amount to the 1. ' reques ensuin; Secreta 2. I vision from a number sevenr child, allotted accordin

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bere has amount collected upon the several Circuits since 1858 has been, considerably less than that realized from the same source prior to that period; and in view of this circumstance and the probable rapid increase of claimants, the following resolutions are adopted, viz. :

1. That those members of the Fund who do not expect to derive benefit from it in the education of their children, shall pay \$2 annually. That those who do anticipate to have elaims upon this Fund shall pay an annual subscription of \$3; and that those who may be actually receiving from it, shall pay \$4 per annum.

2. That the attention of our people be especially called to this Fund, and that its claims upon their generous support be affectionately and strongly urged in all our congregations.

3. That the disbursement of this Fund shall be postponed until the Conference of 1865.

QUESTION XV.

What are the resolutions of the Conference with reference to the Children's Fund?

ANSWER.

1. That John Starr, Esq., and the Rev. James Taylor are requested to act as General Treasurers of this Fund for the ensuing year; and the Rev. Duncan D. Currie as General Secretary.

2. In accordance with the standing rule, which makes provision towards the support of the children of our Ministers, from a certain rate of contributions in proportion to the number in Society; it is agreed that for the ensuing year SEVENTY-EIGHT members shall provide the allowance for one child. The following statement has accordingly been drawn up, determining the number of children's allowances to be allotted at the Financial District Meetings to the Circuits, according to rule :---

QUESTION XVII.

What are the Resolutions of the Conference with regard to the Parsonage Aid Fund? According to relation

ANSWER.

1. The Conference recommends that the Rules for the formation and constitution of this Fund, as printed in the Minutes of 1862, continue in force.

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2. In order to accomplish the intentions of Conference in the formation of this Fund, and to ensure uniformity of action in the distribution of grants, the following regulations are adopted :---

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1st. That in every case where a grant is sought to be obtained from this Fund, it must appear, that, with the assistance of the grant, the property shall be entirely free from the burden of any debt.

2nd. Every application for aid from this Fund must receive the sanction of the District Meetings, either Financial or regular, before it can be considered by the Committee.

3. Full and definite particulars must in every case be furnished to the Committee, whether the effort be for the erection of new premises, the purchase of buildings already erected, or the liquidation of debts.

4. The Treasurer of this Fund shall not pay the amounts which may be granted in aid of local efforts, until he shall have received satisfactory evidence upon the following points :

(1.) That the title of the property is valid, and that the deed is executed upon the Connexional plan. (2.) That the whole of the sums subscribed on the Circuit are available, and secured so as to relieve the Circuit account from any charge for rent or interest. (3.) A Certificate from the Registrar of Deeds must be forwarded, stating that the Connexional Deed is recorded, and that the property is free from all encumbrance, whether by way of Mortgage, Judgment, Widow's Thirds or otherwise.

I.-RESPECTING THE ACADEMIES.

1. The best thanks of the Conference are due to the Rev. H. Pickard, D.D., for his continued, highly acceptable, and successful devotion to all the interests of the Institution, as well Financial as Educational, especially of the Branch for Males, which, by the Divine blessing, continues in a state of the most estisfactory efficiency. 2. The Conference also presents its cordial thanks to the Rev. J. Allison, A.M., Principal of the Branch for Ladies, and to Mrs. J. Allison, A.M., Chief Preceptress, for their zealous and increasant toil in the duties of their own department of the Academy; and the Conference hopes that the benefit sought for the health of Mrs. Allison, by the extended Summer vacation, will, by the blessing of God, be fully realized, that she may resume her professional employments, at the time appointed, with perfectly recruited vigour.

8. This Conference rejoices in being able again to commend the Mount Allison Academies to the patronage of our own people, and to our fellow-colonists generally, as affording facilities for a first-class Academic Education, for the youth of both sexes, under decided Christian influences, which are at least equal to those offered by any other similar establishment in Eastern British America.

II.-THE COLLEGE.

1. That, from the reports submitted, the Conference learns with peculiar pleasure that the arrangements made last year for the establishment of a College proper at Mount Allison have been so entirely successful, and that a work of so much importance has been commenced so auspiciously, confirming the hope that the continued blessing of Divine Providence may be confidently looked for in its zealous prosecution.

2. That, in the estimation of the Conference, this Institution, with commodious edifice, efficient Faculty, well arranged Curriculum, &c., is already entitled to take rank with the best Collegiate Institutions of the Provinces, and worthy of the confidence and patronage of the public.

3. That the Conference would earnestly recommend to the considerate attention of our numerous benevolent friends, this Collegiate Institution of our Provincial Methodism, as being highly deserving of aid by Donations, Bequests, the founding of Pr fess rships and Sch larships, &c., in order to give greater permanency and efficiency to this important department of cur O mexiconal work.

III.----THEOLOGICAL DEPARTMENT.

1. That the report of the Ex-President respecting the general deportment, the diligence and success in their c urse

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of preparatory study, and the Ministerial promise of the young Brethren, who have been under his charge as Theological Students during the past year, is highly satisfactory to the Conference.

2. That the Conference rejoices to learn that our beloved President, the Professor of Theology, is prepared, after a year's absence from Sackville, to resume the office to which it is believed he has been designated, not only by the choice of his brethren, but also and especially by the Head of the Church.

3. That the Conference regrets to learn that the income from the endowment Fund yet falls short of the amount which is necessary for the comfortable maintenance of this important portion of our educational work, and therefore trusts that those friends throughout the bounds of the Conference, who have not yet paid the sums which they had promised to contribute to this Fund, will hasten to pay their subscriptions; and that other subscriptions needed to bring up the Fund to the amount originally contemplated, may be speedily obtained.

4. The Conference regards it as of primary importance to the continued prosperity of our section of the Christian Church in Eastern British America, that the efficiency of its Ministry should be fully maintained, and it is therefore resolved, in order to guard against the introduction into our work of any person not in all respects suitable as a Candidate for this Ministry, that a Committee shall be annually appointed, whose duty it shall be to thoroughly examine all the Candidates recommended by the Districts, aud to report minutely to the Conference the result of such examination.

5. The Chairman of each District is required at the time of the Financial District Meeting, to make suitable arrangements for the examination of the young men at the ensuing District Meeting, and in order to direct more fully the studies of the young Ministers, as well also to provide for more thorough annual Examination during the four years of their probation, the Conference adopts the following course of reading and study :---

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CONTINGENT AND HOME MISSION FUND.

QUESTION XIX.

What are the resolutions of the Conference with regard to the Contingent and Home Mission Fund?

ANSWER.

1. That the Conference calls the attention of the members of our Church and Congregations to the yearly increasing deficiencies on many of the Circuits, (amounting this year alone, after the grants from this Fund have been accounted for, to nearly \$6000), bringing the Ministers appointed to those Circuits into embarrassment in their pecuniary circumstances. The Conference would affectionately appeal to the friends of Methodism on behalf of this Fund, which aims at relieving the dependent Circuits, and sustaining such fields of labor as may be opened and required as Home Missions, and also designed to meet those cases of affliction which, year after year, calls for sympathy and aid, hoping that the income of the Fund may be greatly increased the ensuing year.

2. The Conference urges upon all its Ministers the duty of giving strict attention to the adopted rules for securing the current income, as printed in the Minutes of 1856—57; and that they also bring the foregoing Resolution before the serious consideration of the Church, that the important objects contemplated may be secured to a much greater extent than they have been hitherto, or possibly can be, without the increased liberality of its friends to augment its receipts.

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TO THE MEMBERS OF THE WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH IN EASTERN BRITISH AMERICA.

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DEARLY BELOVED BRETHREN,-

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As Pastors and Teachers, we greet you in the Lord; giving thanks to God who hath called us to be his people who were not a people. "Grace be to you and peace from God our Father, and from the Lord Jesus Christ." Deeply solicitous for the interests of truth and holiness in our sin-smitten world, we earnestly desire that every one of you, with ourselves, may walk worthy of God, who hath called us unto his kingdom and glory. "For this cause, also, thank we God without ceasing. because, when ye received the word of God, which ye heard of us, ye received it not as the word of men; but as it is in truth the word of God, which effectually worketh also in you that believe." Appreciate highly the preaching of the Divine word. As frequently as possible be found in the house of God. Here expect the unction of the Holy One, who will guide you into all truth, and remember that the truth essential to salvation is found alone in the sacred scriptures. From no other source can we learn the nature of sin and the way of salvation. Have faith in God's Book. The strongest evidence possible of the ⁴ Divinity of the Bible is found in the hearts of those who have realized by blessed experience, that the gospel is the power of God unto salvation. Keep yourselves in the love of God, and all the wily efforts of the great deceiver and his agents-false teachers -- will not be able to move you away from the hope of the gospel. No dangerous errors will find a lodgment in your intellect while the heart is established with grace.

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As ye have thus received the "Engrafted word which is able to save your souls," see that it "dwell in you richly in all wisdom." But be ye doers of the word and not hearers only, deceiving your own selves." All saving truth is practical in its tendency. It is not written, "Happy are ye if ye know these things," but, "if ye know these things, happy are ye if ye do them." Knowledge must not supplant duty. Nor can profession and resolves supply its place. Individual duty must be performed, or the work of grace will not advance. One of the leading features of God's peculiar people is their good works. Not only to his sent servants, but to every child in his family, the Great Master enjoins, "Go work to day in my vineyard." Yes, to day. Oh, how valuable our present privileges and opportunities! But how affecting the admonitory words of Jesus. "I must work the works of Him that sent me while it is day, the night cometh when no man can work."

Brethren, "let us not be weary in well doing; for in due season we shall reap, if we faint not." But in order that you may, with cheerfulness and diligence perform your duty, you must enjoy the favor of our Heavenly Father. Unless the love of Christ constrain us, we shall certainly live to ourselves—

"'Tis love that makes our willing feet In swift obedience move."

Take care to cherish the influences of the Holy Spirit. Always kindly entertain the heavenly Guest, and he will abide with you forever. Then will the flame of love burn on the altar of our hearts with inextinguishable blaze. Then will the commandments of God not be grievous, and the duties of religion no longer be irksome. All will be done as to the Lord and not to men. We need scarcely remind you that the field is large, and the necessity for labor imperative. In the family, the neighborhood in which you reside, and in the Church, you can surely find your place and proper work. Let us call your special attention to the solemn responsibilities associated with domestic life. Does God entrust you with beings destined to an immortal existence, who must receive their impressions, for good or evil from you? Oh how anxious should you be to have them them brought up in the nurture and discipline of the Lord.

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Bring them early to God's house, as the parents of Jesus brought Him to the temple. There publicly offer them to God in that solemn ordinance which recognizes them as heirs of the blessings of the covenant of grace.—Surely they are as eligible for the seal of the righteousness of faith, as were infants in former days. The Church of God has never been without the "*little ones.*" They were regarded by the great Head of the Church, with peculiar interest, in that important period when he remodeled and enlarged his Church, with all the plenitude of gospel blessings.

But this is the easiest part of your duty to your children. By word and deed let them discover that you believe in the doctrines of the Scriptures, and that you are in earnest in religious matters. Plead in prayer, while gathered around the family altar, that blessed promise, "I will pour my Spirit upon thy seed, and my blessing upon thy offspring." Would you be useful in your day to those around you? Be consistent in your profession of religion. Ponder deeply the solemn words of the Lord Jesus to his disciples, "If any man will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross and follow me." The line of distinction must be visible, between the Church and the world. But, alas, too many professors of religion, seem disposed to disregard the emphatic requirement of the Gospel, "Come out from among them, and be ye separate." We should remember that although Christianity has greatly influenced mind and manners in this country, Satan is not yet bound, but is endeavoring with great success to nullify the influence of the Church for good by artfully introducing the spirit, maxims and customs of the world. Be on your guard, ye followers of the Lamb, make no unhely alliances; the friends of the world are yet the enemies of God, "Watch and pray that ye enter not They hade ow h into temptation."

In the Church be found in your place, not merely when the word is proclaimed, but in the *prayer meeting*. There rally around us, instead of taking those seats which are as far away as possible. Cheer the hearts of your class-leaders by a faithful attendance at Class-Meeting. Willing absence from this means of grace, peculiar to us, but which God has 4 graciously owned, is a manifest indication of spiritual declension. "Then they that feared the Lord spake often one to another, and they shall be mine, saith the Lord, in that day when I make up my jewels."

We are grieved to know that some of you, neglect, or hesitate to obey our Lord's last command. We would earnestly exhort you, to yield to the tempter no longer, but hasten, in humility to unite with your brethren, in showing forth the Lord's death, " till He come." While you love and reverence the Sabbath, God's first institution, and regard it as binding upon man to the end of time; seek also the grace that will enable you to observe the day as to the Lord ; then will it prove, as designed by its author, refreshing to soul and body. Let the Sabbath School have a large share of your attention; forward its interests in every possible way. Be not discouraged because fruit is not apparent. You work for God. Behold the husbandman waiteth for the precious fruit of the earth, and hath long patience for it, until he receive the early and the latter rain. Read and study the sacred page in order to ascertain the will of God, respecting the use of earthly property. How small a proportion of what God allows us to accumulate, do we return to him as a thank offering, while many of his servants are straitened in their circumstances, and various departments of his cause are in a languishing condition? It is enough to make us blush to read of the offerings of saints of old, to the cause of God. Shall we with all our additional light and privileges, give less of our income to the Most High? God forbid. Resolve at once to find out your duty, and hasten to perform it with sincerity and pleasure.

"If we have sown unto you spiritual things, is it a great thing if we shall reap your carnal things?" And while you sustain those who labour among you, and are over you in the Lord, forget not those who toil in the regions beyond; cultivate a missionary spirit. Here you will find room for many precious gifts, withhold not your sons and daughters, money or prayers from this God-like enterprize. Have a share in every moral and religious movement, to benefit our race. Encourage the circulation of our wholesome literature. Every desirable Book

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for personal or family use may be obtained at a cheap rate, at our excellent Book-Room, in Halifax. The Provincial Weslevan we also heartily recommend as a choice family paper. Not a family should be without it. We would also remind you of that important rule of our Society, "Neither buying, selling or drinking spirituous liquors, unless in cases of extreme necessity. "Abstain from all appearance of evil." The decrease of members in Society during the year is a matter of deep humiliation before God. While we, as ministers, resolve afresh " that we will give ourselves continually to prayer, and to the ministry of the word," we ask you to bow with us before the mercy seat, and earnestly implore that the Holy Spirit may be poured out, in copious effusions upon every circuit throughout the Conference. We would not be unmindful, of those gracious visitations, which have reached some circuits, and which have enabled us to report with gratitude the number of 2000 on trial. We ask your continued sympathies and prayers; our interests are interwoven with yours. For now we live, if ye stand fast in the Lord. The very sudden removal of our beloved Bro. the Rev. Wm. Smith. of sainted memory, from our midst, calls loudly upon us to be up and doing, waiting for the coming of our Lord. Many of you were brought to God through his instrumentality. 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OF THE BRITISH CONFERENCE TO THE ADDRESS OF THE CONFER-ENCE OF THE WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH IN EASTERN BRI-TISH AMERICA.--1862.

REVEREND AND DEAR BRETHREN :

We have received with lively satisfaction and thankfulness your Annual Address, and have also welcomed with fraternal cordiality the Rev. HUMPHREY PICKARD, D.D., and the Rev. CHAS. CHURCHILL, M.A., your able and respected representatives; together with the Rev. JAMES ENGLAND, whom you have introduced to us. We trust that they will communicate to you, on their return, such tidings of our unity, and of the prosperity of the work of God among us, as will gladden your hearts, and enable you to join with us in ascriptions of gratitude and praise to God.

We have, indeed, much to be thankful for. On every hand we witness enlargement of our means and openings for usefulness; and though our numerical increase is not so great as we could have wished, and not by any means proportionable to the amount of agency we employ, we cannot but hope that faith and prayer will bring down the blessing of God upon our efforts. We have need to bear in mind ourselves, and to impress upon all our people, that the great business of Methodism, to which everything is to be subordinated, is to save the souls of men.

We sympathize with you in the difficulties which attend the carrying on of the great work of God in your extensive and interesting country. We counsel you to grapple with those difficulties in the same spirit which characterized our fathers in this land, and which, by the blessing of God, had such a glorious issue. Faith in God, confidence in the power and adaptation of

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old paths proved m hearts of directed Such a ze cise of Ch enlargeme of the wor bers, is cou in its activ to distingu the Gospel, and a determination to use all available means within your reach, in dependence upon Divine aid, will assuredly prove successful.

We venture, moreover, to express our trust that you have passed the extreme point of your trials; and that, under the blessing of Divine Providence, in the development of the rich natural resources of your country, and in the creation of more favorable external conditions, you will find both greater materials of usefulness, and means to make them available.

In the meanwhile you cannot do better than maintain your existing educational and evangelical agencies, which the Great Head of the Church has already blessed so richly, and which have in them the promise of much greater blessing.

We regret that, in consequence of the urgent demand for laborers in the work of the Circuits, you are able to give so restricted an application to the means of theological training for your Ministers. It cannot be too strongly laid down as a principle for the government of the Christian Church, that a well-instructed ministry alone can be expected to be a permanently efficient ministry. The more extensively, by means of the circulation of Christian literature and the increase of general education, the people at large are elevated and improved, the more necessary it is that a corresponding improvement should take place in the intellectual and literary qualifications of the ministry.

We earnestly exhort you, under all difficulties, to abide in the old paths; to endeavor, by the use of our long-tried and approved means of grace, to keep alive spiritual religion in the hearts of the members; and to encourage them in all welldirected efforts of an ardent and aggressive Christian zeal. Such a zeal, seconded by a conspicuous and self-denying exercise of Christian virtues and graces, will tell mightily on the enlargement of the Christian church, and upon the conversion of the world. A church which, though it may be small in numbers, is compact in its unity, decided in its resolves, and energetie in its activities, cannot fail to answer the design of Christ, and to distinguish itself in his service. In particular, such a church will never lack a succession of faithful men, in whom the flame

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of divine love, kindled into new ardor by surrounding influences, will break forth in the highest manifestations of ministerial zeal and success.

It cannot but be matter of encouragement to you to reflect, that though, as regards your own ecclesiastical organization, you may as yet be small and comparatively feeble, you form a part of a great religious body, which stands out foremost amongst the hosts of the church militant; which is in actual conflict with the prince of darkness throughout the world, to a greater extent than any other Christian community; and which, if not everywhere equally successful, is still collectively advancing, by sure and steady marches, to still wider conquests. Throughout this extended body there thrills the impulse of one great evangelical motive—there exists a most deep, intimate, and practical sympathy, the effect of which is felt by the most disheartened, and is of itself a power to inspirit and sustain, such as few Christian churches can command.

We therefore desire to encourage you still to labor on in hope, while we assure you of our confidence and brotherly affection. We have cause of encouragement, above all, in the assurance of the Divine sympathy, and the all-powerful help of the great Head of the church, who will be with us and for us, in proportion as we are decidedly and avowedly on His side; and we would take for our common direction and comfort the conjoined precept and promise, "Be not weary in well doing; for in due season we shall reap if we faint not."

We have received among us as a fellow-labourer, with respect and affection, the Rev. Charles Churchill, M. A.; who, we hope, may be rendered as useful here as he has been with you. And we appoint as your next President the Rev. Charles DeWolfe, D. D., and, as Co-Delegate, the Rev. Thomas H. Davies.

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CONFERENCE OF THE WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH OF EASTERN BRITISH AMERICA, TO THE BRITISH CONFERENCE.

REVEREND AND BELOVED FATHERS AND BRETHREN,-

of THE

Assembled in our Annual Conference, it is our pleasing duty to convey to you the assurance of filial affection and reverential regard which we cherish toward the parent body.

In the relation we sustain to you, we need not say with what satisfaction we have treasured up the affectionate and judicious counsels, embodied in your reply to our last Address. The names of your honoured men are with us as household words; and, in days of feebleness and trial, it is a source of strength and encouragement that, in ecclesiastical organization, we occupy no isolated position, but form part of that great section of Christ's militant Church which He has signally honoured and blessed.

The communications of the Rev. Dr. Pickard and the Rev. James England, our representatives in your last Conference, have gladdened our hearts. The unity and harmony which prevail among you, the evangelical character of your agenciesthe increase of your membership, the efficiency of your Educational Institutions, the extension of your missions at home and abroad, and the consolidation of your various interests, — give evidence of prosperity and progress, in which we truly rejoice.

To us, the year has been one of more than ordinary anxiety. The numerical returns of the last Conference were the subject of careful and conscientious inquiry, and the occasion of earnest and prayerful resolve. Along our rocky coasts, in sparsely. settled localities, in the woods, and in the wilderness, as well as in towns, villages, and populous districts,-in cabins and schoolhouses, as well as in commodious and sacred edifices,-we have been carrying out our great commission, and seeking to save and gather into the fold of Christ the wandering souls of men.

The apparent results of these efforts have not been in proportion to our agencies or anticipations. We have been favoured in some parts of our work with outpourings of the Spirit of God ; our congregations have been generally increasing; some two thousand persons have been received on probation for churchfellowship; and notwithstanding the discouragements arising from severe financial pressure, many departments of our work have been sustained and strengthened; yet we have, to our sorrow, to report the loss of more than three hundred names from the roll of our membership.

Though happily exempted from the direst and most disastrous effects of the war, which, "with confused noise, and garments rolled in blood," is still dividing and desolating the neighbouring Republic; yet the surgings of that unmeasured calamity have swept over our shores, and have seriously interfered with the prosperity of our work.

We have been humbled in view of the past; but, "as we have received mercy, we faint not." We have undiminished confidence in the faithfulness of the Redeemer, in the efficacy of prayer, in the power of the Cross, in the coming of the Holy Ghost, and in the suitability and sufficiency of our agencies and appliances.

One venerable minister, William Smith, has, during the year, passed from the militant to the triumphant Church. He was distinguished by theological attainments of no ordinary kind, by able and affectionate ministrations, by pastoral fidelity, and by earnest wrestlings with the Angel of the Covenant. He was a good man, and his praise is in all the Churches.

We regret that several of our beloved fathers and brethren are compelled to retire from the active work. We desire, on their behalf, the richest consolations of the Holy Spirit, and trust that as, with diminished strength, they seek, in a more secluded sphere, to fulfil the ministry which they have received , from the Lord Jesus, their efforts may be crowned with abun-

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The exigencies of our work have led us, in times past, to open the door widely for admission to our ranks; but with an increasing conviction of the imperative necessity of an intelligent and educated ministry, to meet the requirements of the age, we have adopted more stringent regulations for the reception of probationers, and have resolved to extend to them, as far as possible, the advantage of theological training, under the care of our esteemed President and Professor of Theology.

The Mount Allison Wesleyan College, auspiciously inaugurated, has been, during the year, in successful operation, and gives promise of occupying permanent rank among the most honoured Collegiate Institutions of this Continent.

Our present Conferential Session, which has been marked by great harmony, has been rendered unusually interesting, in consequence of the simultaneous meeting of the Representatives of three ecclesiastical bodies in this city, affording opportunity of fraternal greetings, and hallowed interchange of sympathies, in impressive illustration of the unity for which the Redeemer prayed;—" That they all may be one; that the world may believe that thou hast sent me."

We have shared in the national joy, occasioned by the auspicious marriage of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, and have embraced the first opportunity, in our collective capacity, of presenting an Address of gratulation through His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor of this Colony.

We request the Rev. W. B. Boyce to act as our Representative in the British Conference, and with him we associate the Rev. James Narraway, A.M., and the Rev. Professor Allison, of the Sackville Institution, should they be in attendance at the Conference.

We have nominated the Rev. T. H. Davies as President, and the Rev. Edmund Botterell as Co-Delegate, for the next year.
