



Again, to hark back to good Canon Harrison, "pesteriferous purveyers buy up eggs, chickens, bacon, etc.; butter men travel about and buy up butter at farmers' houses, and have raised its price from 18d to 40d a gallon. These things are ill for the buyer and the poor man, and should not be allowed." After all about the only thing that is true is that there is no new thing under the sun. Like the poor, the profiteer is always with us.





### CLINIC HAS PROVED WORTH

Firm Well Worthy of Imitation by Other Employers.

peer medical clinic, establis 35 years ago to protect the health of 600 employees, and gradually enlarged and expanded until it now cares for a total of 2,700—that is the record proud-ly held today by a well-known Boston firm. At the time of its organization
