REV. PERRY J. STACKHOUSE.

A short Biographical Sketch

Rev. Perry J. Stackhouse was born in St. John in 1876. His early education was obtained in the schools of his native city. He entered St. Martin's Seminary in 1892 and after graduating from there at the age of 18 assumed charge of the Mission at Dipper Harbor and Musquash. As a result of his work there fifty were baptized and the struggling mission was organized into a church. He left this charge in 1895 to enter Acadia University from which he graduated in 1899. Mr. Stackhouse during his session year was editor-in-chief of the Acadia "Atheneum". He accepted a call to the Tabernacle Church and entered upon his ministry there. His work was greatly blessed, up-



wards of seventy uniting with the church during the first eleven months of his pastorate. The hall in which they worshipped soon was outgrown and the work of building a church was begun and successfully completed. Mr. Stackhouse resigned his charge after three years of service in order to take a course in Theology at Chicago University. While pursuing his studies there he was pastor of Austin Avenue Baptist Church. A new building was found to be a necessity and a church was begun to cost in the vicinity of \$20,000. Mr. Stackhouse had the pleasure of seeing the Chapel finished and dedicated during his pastorate.

The theological course of three years was taken by him in two years and three months and the degree of Bachelor of Divinity was conferred upon him. A call to return to Tabernacle Church was received and accepted and in 1904 he again took up his work there. The Tabernacle Church during his six years ministry has grown from a struggling mission church to one of the largest in the city having an evening congregation of 4 or 5 hundred people. We feel that the Campbellton Baptist church is to be congratulated in securing the services of a man of his calibre and that the town is gaining a good citizen and one who will take a deep interest in its welfare.

Transacted

Their regular annual meeting of the Town Council was held on Tuesday with the full board in attendance. The session was a lengthy one as a large amount of business was transacted besides the appointment of officers for the year.

The application of C. S. O. Crockett for supply of water to his motor was referred to the Water & Sewerage Com.

The petition of Jos. Damboise for a street crossing in front of the Waverly Hotel was referred to the Street Com.

A communication from G. A. Fawcett, trackmaster of the I. C. R., was read, calling attention to the danger from fire starting in the old building near I. C. R. track just west of the Curling Rink. The matter was referred to the Fire Com.

The resignation of Leslie Chapell as Chief of Police was read and accepted from the 25th April. The application of Harry Jones for a position on police force and of Officers Duncan and Savoy for increase of salary was referred to the Police Com.

Several ratepayers of Ward Three asked for the opening up of a new street from Sugar Loaf St. to R. I. Duncan's west line. Referred to Street Com.

Coun. McLennan from Fire Com. asked for authority to purchase 500 feet of Maltese Cross hose and a hose wagon. On motion request was granted.

Accounts for supplies for the Electric Light department and election accounts were passed.

Coun. McLennan from Police and License Com. submitted report recommending that W. L. Goodman be granted a barber shop license on payment of \$10.00, and the Aved Co. a general business license on payment of \$50.00. Report adopted.

The Mayor drew attention to form of lease submitted by the Board of Health for dumping ground from James E. Kelly at rate of \$15.00 per year.

It was thought inadvisable to enter into an agreement as the location of the dumping was not in a proper place. It was claimed by some of the councillors that all kinds of material was being thrown there, contrary to the intention of the Board of Health.

Council then adjourned.

Lorient, France, May 9.—French Travellers arrived here this morning from the fishing ground and bring with them reports of a most remarkable phenomenon, which it is believed was caused by a volcanic eruption at the bottom of the sea. One of the steam trawlers yesterday was attracted by smoke and fire apparently rising from the waves. They steamed as near the spot as could safely be done. The fire and smoke increased in violence and the sea was very high. The fishermen attributes the strange phenomenon to submarine volcanic eruption.

VALUE OF AGITATION.

The Coal Miners Bill providing that no one shall be required to work a mine longer than eight hours per day, except in cases of emergency, has passed its second reading in the British Commons, and, having the support of the government, will in all probability pass its third reading. What the Lords will do with it remains to be seen. The promoters of this bill having introduced it twenty-one times, show the bull-dog tenacity of the typical Briton. At I have fairly earned success.

A GREAT IMPROVEMENT.

On the first instant, the rate of postage on newspapers, magazines and trade journals coming from the British Isles to Canada was reduced from eight cents a pound to two cents. The old rate practically excluded British periodicals from this country, throwing our people back upon United States publications almost exclusively. Now, we may enjoy reading papers and magazines from the other side of the water without fear of being bankrupted by the cost. The British and Canadian governments, who have divided the cost of the reduction between them, are to be sincerely thanked for thus opening the way to an intellectual reciprocity between this country and the old motherland to which we owe so much.

UNREST IN INDIA.

Simultaneously with the phenomenal increase in the Japanese merchant marine, which is rapidly driving British and United States vessels off the North Pacific Ocean, and the arrival of Japan at the stage of naval development where she can build her own battleships, comes from India the most disquieting news of any since the great mutiny of fifty years ago. The Hindu students of the Punjab, that section of India where the climate is coolest and the people the whitest, have so succeeded in fomenting riot that all the European residents capable of bearing arms have had to enlist in the militia, judges and other professional men enrolling as privates. All over Northern India, where the upper classes are of the same race as the Europeans, the same agitation for an elected parliament and home rule is being carried on, especially in Bengal, where the wall-to-do people have gone so far as to boycott all European goods. The educated natives, except those of the Mohammedan faith, are almost a unit against the continuance of British rule as at present constituted. An immediate armed revolution is prevented only, it would seem, by the fact that the Mohammedans, who number nearly one-fourth of the population, are for the moment siding with the European element against the brethren of the Hindu faith. This will delay the crisis for a few years, but an arrangement between the Hindus and Mohammedans is always possible for in Egypt the Mohammedans themselves are carrying on the same campaign against foreign rule as are the Hindus in India. The future of British domination is fraught with much uncertainty and hazard.

PROPORTIONAL REPRESENTATION.

The Acadian people of Northumberland County, who number between one-fifth and one-fourth of the whole population, are demanding that a candidate of their own blood and language be selected by one or each party on its ticket for next provincial election.

This demand is quite natural and proper and is entitled to the greatest respect at the hands of the dominant English-speaking majority, especially as the French majorities of Gloucester, Kent and Madawaska counties have in the past been very liberal in their selection of candidates for office.

Every political party—every group of people who have any

special aims to promote and peculiar ideas to propagate—should be represented in the legislature in exactly the same proportion as they are in the country at large. The party that has two thirds of the voters—and the voting population should include all adult persons who are not criminals or idiots—is entitled to two-thirds of the parliamentary representatives, and no more. The party that has one-third the voters should have the privilege of electing one-third the representatives, and no less. So with the smallest party. Each should have as much influence in parliament as it has in the country.

Proportional Representation (but coupled with the iniquitous system of plural voting which gives some classes two or three times as many votes as they are entitled to) is the law in Belgium, each political party there having the same percentage of deputies in parliament as of votes in the kingdom. Our system, under which fifty-five per cent. of the voters can elect all the representatives, completely excluding the other party or parties from any share or voice in legislation, is too old-fashioned and unjust to be allowed to survive any longer. Let Northumberland County lead the way in agitating for its abolition.

WILL GO INTO POLITICS.

As neither the Local Government nor the Opposition during last session showed any disposition to meet the demands of the New Brunswick Temperance Federation, the president of the latter announces that the Federation will go into politics. This decision—the only logical one under the circumstances—should make our next political campaign unusually interesting.

THE TERCENTENARY.

The tercentenary of the founding of the first permanent settlement of English speaking people in what is now the United States of America is being celebrated by a great Exposition in Jamestown, Virginia, where on April 26th, A. D. 1607, the English planted their first permanent colony on this side of the Atlantic. The next English settlement was at Plymouth, Mass., in 1620; and the intervening lands were rapidly taken up by men of the same race, the Dutch flag being lowered in what is now New York and New Jersey in 1664. Though the Spaniards settled in Florida in the sixteenth century, the Jamestown colony was really the beginning of the United States. Although the American nation is now, probably, not more than one-

third British in blood, its language, laws and customs are substantially English and bid fair to remain so permanently. Issues of incalculable importance hang upon the success of that experiment in Jamestown, three hundred years ago, and our cousins do well to preserve the memory of the event.

WHAT ABOUT THE POISONOUS SALMON?

By the way, what has happened about that poisonous salmon? Is no one to be put on trial for what looks on the surface to be about as dastardly a crime as was ever attempted in wholesale fashion in this city? Are we going to establish the precedent that a man can try the trick of distributing fifty thousand cans of poisonous food stuffs throughout Montreal, and get off with no loss but that of his canned rottenness, if he happens to get caught?

The public will not be satisfied with this affair if there are no arrests made. We know who were the auctioneers, and we have been told who shipped them the stuff—though that is denied. There are plenty of people to put on trial, and make them more than willing to reveal all there is to be known about the dirty business. The Health Committee cannot mean to leave the matter where it is; and the Food Inspector, Dr. McCarry, should exert his whole influence to bringing the guilty men to justice. That the penalty may be a small one, is unfortunate; but it would be a positive calamity to grant the plotters immunity on the remarkable ground that we could not punish them enough if we got started.—Montreal Star.



Trouble has again broken out between the town council and the local Board of Health and at a time when the public must suffer most. The discussion arose in the council when the Mayor read an agreement entered into between the Board of Health and Jas. E. Kelly for a piece of his property used for a public dumping ground, some of the members found fault with the locality, the cost was too much, the Board was not properly looking after it and refused to ratify the contract. The Board claims it is the only suitable place available in Ward 3, and then secured only after a fruitless search in the West end for over two years, that such a dumping ground is a necessity in that section, that it is properly looked after and the attention paid to it.

Mr. Kelly was to receive \$15 a year for five years, the town having the option of renewing. This the Board thought was a good bargain for the town. The board thinks the Council has interfered with their work and shows a want of confidence in them as a body. The result is Mr. Kelly has closed his dumping ground to the public and householders now busy cleaning up

their yards must pay 75c or \$1 to have their loads hauled a mile and a half to the dumping ground east of the town, where formerly the cost was 25c. As matters look now the council may be required to elect a new board at least some of the members and should have in the interest of the public health immediate attention.






