COMMERCIAL DISTRESS.

Montreal, May 15.
We learn, with great regret, that the resolution His Excellency has come to, in regard to the Currency Ordinance, has spread alarm among the Merchants—and, justly so, for the effects of his determination, are beginning to be felt very severely.

We have already stated our conviction, that, by sanctioning the Act of the Upper Canada Parliament, which increased the rates at which British silver would be a legal tender, His Excellency committed a blunder—but, that all the injury was done, that could be done—and, that, if the Act could not be undone, still, we had the satisfaction of knowing, that the extension of its provisions to this Province, could not make matters any worse—this was, and is, a satisfaction.

We have now to inform His Excellency, that the refusal to extend the provisions of that Act to this Province, will make matters a great deal worse.

If the Governor General will reflect, that the extension of the provisions of that Act to this Province, cannot increase the injury to commerce, already done—and, that the non-extension of it, will cause serious additional difficulty, such, for example, as the Protest of Bills, from sheer incapacity to convert Upper Canada Bank paper into available means, we cannot but believe he will change his mind.

The commercial relations between this Province and Upper Canada, are of such a character, that this latter Province is always largely indebted to Montreal—at this moment, the debt is due by Upper Canada to Montreal, in the sum of \$1,000,000. The Montreal Merchant has no other means of paying his debts, than in the Bank paper of Upper Canada, Kingston, at the increased rates, and brings it down here, to dispose of it at a ruinous loss. The paper of the Upper Canada Bank is not a legal tender, as a matter of course—and, the consequence is—that, with his hands full of Bank Notes, the Merchant cannot lift his bills at the Bank, here. Protest ensues—and ruin follows—Shake a Merchant's credit, and he is done for.

The absurdity of the whole thing is apparent, as the sun at noon-day. Let our readers fancy the same coins passing at different values, in London and Edinburgh!—What a state of things!—What a ridiculous legislation, there is the simple idea!—Yet such is the fact, here.—*Montreal Courier.*

The Hon. D. B. Viger, one of the Legislative Council, was liberated, on Saturday evening, from Jail, without bail. John Macdonell, Esq., was liberated at same time, but under bail.—We shall next see Louis Jo, and William Lyon Mac, back, and then, we shall hear the market's cry.—*Le jeu est fait Messieurs.*—*Ibid.*

Improvement in Glass Work.—Mr. Naysmith of Birmingham, England, is the inventor of a new mode of making concave and convex mirrors. The plan is to fix a circular plate of glass into an iron case, made airtight. A chamber is left in the back full of common air—by drawing out the air either with an air-pump or with the mouth, the atmosphere on the surface of the glass plate immediately converts it into a concave. Blowing more air into the chamber, makes the glass assume the form of a convex mirror.

Montreal May 20.
The Hon. Mr. Grey was the bearer of despatches from the Colonial office to His Excellency the Governor General, and the Earl of Mulgrave, eldest son of Viscount Normanby, was the bearer of despatches to Her Majesty's representative at Washington. After delivering the despatches to Mr. Fox, the Earl of Mulgrave will proceed to this City, having been appointed aide-de-camp to His Excellency Sir Richard D. Jackson, Commander of the Forces in British America.—*Herald.*

Quebec, May 22.
We have been requested, by the Chairman of the Board of Trade, to state that a communication has been received from Nathaniel Gould, Esquire, of London, acquainting the Board, that he had induced the Committee of Lloyds to admit *Hacmatat* in their rules among the materials for first-class ships for five years in stems and stern posts and timbers, and for six years in planking. The Board at their last meeting unanimously resolved that their best thanks should be offered to Mr. Gould for his valuable services in making the qualities of this timber known and appreciated, and that he should be requested to persevere in his praiseworthy exertions, & endeavor to obtain a superior classification for Colonial vessels partly constructed of Rock Elm, the admirable properties of which for certain purposes in ship-building, are not exceeded by any timber at present in use.—*Gazette.*

H. M. Troop Ship Athol, arrived yesterday evening, with the remainder of the 67th Regiment. We understand that they relieve the 15th Regiment, now stationed at Chatham, and which will shortly return to England in H. M. troop ships *Sapphire* and *Athol*.—*Ibid.*

Early yesterday morning the steamer *Canada*, brought down the 11th Regiment from Sorel and Three Rivers, which embarked on board H. M. troop ship *Apollon*, which will sail for England to-morrow, should the wind permit, and will take on board the detachments now stationed at Madawaska, off River de Loup.—*Ibid.*

Flapdoodle.—On Thursday night the lady of Capt. Harris, of the 24th Regt., stationed at Montreal, eloped with a Mr. N. D. David, advocate, but lately Major in the volunteer Cavalry. Mrs. H. has 3 children—the youngest is but a few months old. The latter she took with her. As it was supposed, as a matter of course, that the guilty pair would proceed to the "Land of Liberty," Capt. Harris, and Mrs. H.'s brother, (Capt. Walker, of the 15th Regt.) proceeded in that direction in pursuit. There was a report that they overtook the runaway a short distance over the line, and that David had been shot—but this report requires confirmation.—*N. Y. Com. Adv.*

APPOINTMENTS.—John M. Niles, of Connecticut, the unsuccessful candidate at the late gubernatorial election in that State, has been appointed Postmaster General of the United States, vice Amos Kendall, resigned; and Churchill C. Campbell, of New York, the defeated Congress candidate for Representative to Congress at the last Congressional election, has been appointed Minister to Russia.—*Acron Van*, formerly Charge d'Affaires of the U. S. at London, and for some time past chief clerk in the Department of State at Washington, has been appointed Charge d'Affaires at the Court of Spain.

Piston, N. S. May 20.
The Union Mines Rail Road—and the **First Locomotive in British America**—Last Thursday morning, intelligence reached town that the new line of Rail Road, from the Albion Mines to South Pictou, was completed, and that the Locomotives, with their trains of cars, would on that day travel through the whole length of the Road. The announcement was hailed with joy by the inhabitants of the town; and as the steamboat *Albion* made two trips to South Pictou, in the early part of the day, many persons availed themselves of the opportunity thus afforded, of witnessing an event in every way so important to the prosperity of Pictou. The Volunteer Artillery Company, in full costume, with their field pieces, joined the party, to add sound and effect to the general expression of public feeling.

Soon after the parties had landed at the terminus of the Rail Road, the smoke of the two Locomotives was discovered rising over the adjoining forest, presenting the novel appearance of proceeding from a moving body beneath, outstripping the wind in velocity. There was a good breeze blowing at the same time, in the same direction as the trains; but their superior swiftness gave the columns of smoke the singular appearance of proceeding for some distance against the wind. The spectators were ranged on the banks of the Rail Road; and to those who had not before seen such a sight, as well as to those who had, the passing of the trains presented a feature in the history of the British American Colonies, possessing intense interest, and which called forth from the assembled multitudes the most enthusiastic cheers, accompanied by discharges of artillery.

The event was every way an interesting & important one; and we doubt not, many of the boys who were there will, when their heads are "silver'd o'er with years," talk of the opening of the first Rail Road in America. We will take another opportunity of stating the number of chaldrons of coal which the Association will now be able to ship daily—but we may now say, for the information of those who may be interested, that the delays heretofore experienced in loading ships with coal, need not be apprehended, as they will henceforward be delivered from the end of the Rail Road, directly on board of all vessels drawing 48 feet of water and under. We congratulate the Company on the completion of this undertaking, and sincerely trust that their princely outlays at the Albion mines may be productive of as much advantage to themselves, as they have been of prosperity to this place.—*Mechanic and Farmer.*

The *N. Y. Sunday Morning News*, contains the following paragraph regarding Dr. Holmes, the recently discharged murderer.—*The* *alibi* incredible fact was stated to us by a gentleman from Vermont, that on the discharge of the adulterer and assassin Holmes, by the Supreme Court of that State, a number of citizens gave him a public dinner. Notwithstanding the intense feeling there, in favour of the Canadian authorities—we hope, for the honor of human nature, that there is some mistake in the fact. If true, the miscreants engaged in getting up the dinner, deserve to be bundled off to Canada or Botany Bay, with Holmes, and exiled from the country they disgraced.

Fredericton May 30.
On Saturday last, while the amusements of the day were proceeding, the residence of GEORGE GARDEN, Esq. Kingsclear, caught fire, and was consumed. Mr. Garden was in the Committee of Management, and was attending at the booth when the news was told him; and Mrs. G. was from home on a visit, in consequence of the state of her health. The neighbours and persons from the opposite side of the river, assisted by several individuals from town who were passing at the time, succeeded in saving a considerable part of the furniture; notwithstanding which the loss that has been sustained must be severe.—*Sentinel.*

Cuba Company.—The Sale of the first Company took place last week, and the Town has been wrapped in a cloud of dense smoke ever since. The price at which the cigars sold exceeds anything heretofore known here, the better lots exceeding \$20 per thousand, and some even sold at 7 1/2 each cigar.—The Company cleared nearly 100 per cent on their Stock.—*Halifaxian.*

Tornado at Natchez.—The N. O. Picayune, of the 10th inst., gives some particulars of a frightful storm which burst upon the city of Natchez on the 7th inst. It began at 2 o'clock and continued about 40 minutes. Many houses were blown down, steeples were prostrated, and in every part of the city, were unroofed, houses were torn to pieces, and their scattered planks flew about in the wind like feathers.

The greatest loss of life was among the flat boats, which were swamped and destroyed before the unhappy men could escape to the shore. It is stated that upwards of 200 lives were lost. Steamboat *Prairie* was destroyed. The capt and clerk narrowly escaped, and were unable to tell how many lives were lost in the boat. The steamboat *St. Lawrence* sunk. Many persons were killed and mangled beneath the fallen buildings. Nine dead bodies had been taken out from the ruins of the Steamboat Hotel.

There was about 50 burials on the 8th and many of the wounded were in a dangerous and dying condition. A boy was said to have been taken up in the air lodged in a tree half a mile from his father's house. A meeting of the citizens was held, and a committee of relief appointed. The neighboring planters had generously sent in large gangs of slaves to assist in clearing the streets and digging the dead from the ruins. The City Hotel and Tremont House had been taken for hospitals. The destruction of property was estimated at \$1,250,000. A public meeting was held in New Orleans on the 9th to take measures for sending relief.—*Boston Daily Ad.*

GRAND PROCESSION.

AT THE LAYING OF THE CORNER STONE OF THE SAINT JOHN MECHANICS' INSTITUTE.

The ceremony of laying the Corner Stone of the new Building for the Mechanics' Institute took place on Wednesday last, and a more splendid display has never been seen in this City, and we much doubt if it has ever been equalled in British North America. The different Trades who were to join the Procession, assembled at their several places of meeting; and thence marched to King's Square, where the line was formed about two o'clock, and proceeded down King-street in the following order:

The Procession, after passing down King-street, proceeded along Prince William-street to Reed's Point, thence along St. James-street and turning up Germain-street, proceeded directly to the building, which adjoins the St. John Church. The Trades walked four and four, and some idea may be formed of the extent of the Procession, when we state that

at the time the head reached St. John Church the rear was at the Post Office, corner of Princess-street.

On arriving at the building, His Excellency and Suite, dismounted, and the Trades were drawn up in a close column in front of the Building. We understand they amounted to 12,000 in number and with the immense crowd assembled, rendered the space in front of the Church and the adjoining streets one solid mass of human beings.

A space had been prepared in the Corner Stone, in which the following articles were deposited:

The Charter of the Institute; the Constitution and Bye Laws; List of Members; Catalogue and Rules of the Library; Programme of the Ceremony; St. John Almanac for 1840; the "Courier" of the 23d May, and the "Observer" of the 26th May; a number of Coins of the present Reign; with the splendid Coronation Medal of Her Majesty, and the Royal Marriage Medal bearing on the obverse highly finished and correct likenesses of Her Most Gracious Majesty VICTORIA, and Prince ALBERT of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha. On the reverse, the Royal Arms and the Arms of Prince Albert, with the Torch of Hymen united by a wreath of Shamrock, Rose and Thistle, surmounted by the Imperial Crown—embellished by a wreath of fruit and flowers with other ornamental decorations emblematical of happiness and plenty; also the following Inscription:—

Erected this Building, and devoted the same to the

PROMOTION OF SCIENCE AND THE ARTS.

The Institute was established in Dec. 1838, and the first President was Beverly Robinson, Esquire.

GOD SAVE THE QUEEN!

The Stone being duly prepared was lowered into its bed and properly placed by His Excellency, who used the Silver Trowel in spreading the mortar; then His Excellency applying the plumb and square pronounced the Stone well laid, which was acknowledged by three hearty cheers. Corn, Wine and Oil having been poured upon it by His Excellency, the Rev. the Rector, in a most impressive manner, offered up a prayer.

Owing to the shortness of the notice, several of the Trades who intended to join, were unable to make the necessary preparation, and many banners which were expected to be displayed could not be furnished in time. Those which were borne (and they were not a few) were very magnificent, reflecting great credit on the artists, and the good taste of the different trades who had provided them. The Blacksmiths and those who marched with them had inscribed on their banners "Industry and Benevolence unite in Friendship." "By Hammer in hand, all Arts do stand." "Arts, Trades and Manufactures." The neat banner of the "Sons of Vulcan," bearing their Arms, was much admired, and they were accompanied by a car, drawn by black horses, with a representation of two smiths at work at their anvil, the loud and unceasing stroke of whose hammers (which appeared to be worked by machinery) were greeted with frequent cheers. The Carpenters, who were very numerous, wore a red scarf, and each carried a long white wand. They bore aloft one banner, with the five architectural orders, and one with their arms, on which were inscribed the words "Great Britain, Ireland & the Colonies." "Union is strength." The Tailors were preceded by the golden fleece; each man wore a blue scarf, and their banner bore "Concordia pectus crescit." They were accompanied by a car, handsomely fitted up, and drawn by splendidly caparisoned horses, representing the Garden of Eden. In the centre stood a large tree, hung with abundance of beautiful fruit; the old serpent was twined round the trunk, and the figures of Adam and Eve, as large as life, stood under the branches. The whole of this pageant was exceedingly well got up, and was perfect of its kind. We could not learn to whom the credit of preparing it was due, but wherever it was deserved great praise for taste and skill. The Bakers wore a straw hat (of uniform shape) and blue ribbon, with a snow white apron & white gloves; their appearance was particularly pleasing and prepossessing. They carried a very large "Horn of Plenty," and the banner of their trade, with the motto "For the good of all." The Cordwainers, a numerous body, were dressed in white, psaltions and white gloves, with uniform aprons of chequered pattern, bound with blue ribbon, and trimmed with ruffles of the same. Their splendid banner bore their arms and the motto "Fidels Cordwainers."

The Banners, we are informed, were chiefly designed by Mr. G. N. Scurry, and painted

by Messrs. Smith, Holman, and Foulis; they reflect great credit on the talents and skill of the artists. It would be impossible, within our limits, to give a technical description of the devices, &c. which would be highly interesting to those skilled in Heraldry, or to describe the numerous badges, staves of office, insignia, emblems, models, &c. borne by the several trades; suffice to say, that the pageant far exceeded anything we conceived possible for New Brunswick to display, and the whole procession produced a most glorious and heart-stirring effect—an effect which will long live in the memories of all who witnessed it, and which we hesitate not to say, will have great and powerful influence upon the destinies of the Province.—*Courier.*

Saint John May 30.

On Tuesday the 26th His Excellency inspected the 67th Regiment, and after a minute examination into their state and efficiency in every respect, and witnessing their performance of a number of difficult movements, which they did in admirable style, His Excellency was pleased to address the Regiment in the following Speech:

"Soldiers of the 67th Regiment!"

"I feel highly gratified in having the satisfaction of this speaking of the high state of efficiency in which I have found you. I have inspected many Regiments, but can truly say, that I never saw a finer body of men, so fully equipped, and in such a high state of discipline, as I find the 67th. But there is one thing, Soldiers, to which I wish most particularly to call your attention. The disgraceful crime of desertion, has, I am sorry to hear, crept in among you to an alarming extent. You have sworn a solemn oath to defend your Queen and Country at all times; and though I cannot say there is now any prospect of your engaging in a War, yet, under present circumstances, it becomes a crime of the deepest magnitude. I am aware that Major Brookes has made an appeal to your feelings, but being an old Soldier myself—having served upwards of fifty years in all parts of the world—I wish to warn you all, in brotherly affection, of the consequences, and I hope—sincerely hope—that this appeal of one who wishes for no other title than that of 'The Soldier's Friend,' may not be made in vain.

"I again repeat that I am highly pleased with your appearance; and it will be my pleasure to report most favourably of you to the Queen. I feel proud of the high state of efficiency and discipline in which I have found the 67th Regt.—and, augmented in having its services under my command."

New York, May 30.

By the *Ellen Preble* and the *Lachry* from Canton, we have accounts to the 2d Feb. The blockade had been raised by the British ships, in consequence of the Chinese having given up Captain Gribble whom they held as a hostage until the sailor was surrounded who is supposed to have killed a Chinese in an affair. In other respects the intelligence is not essentially changed. But even this concession on the part of the British, longtailed as a good omen, and gives earnest that when the British expedition arrives, matters will be accommodated.—*Albion.*
