PARIS, May 2.—The Belgian delegation to the peace conference is expressing dissatisfaction over the terms of the preliminaries for peace as they affect Belgium. None of the territorial claims of Belgium have been granted except that for Malmedy, in Khenish Prussia, a short distance south of Aix Le Chapelle, the population of which before the war was largely Walloon. Malmedy will revert to Belgium. The territory on the left bank of the Scheldtriver and Maastricht and the Limbourg peninsula are not mentioned in the terms.

The almost painful question of the cost of producing milk has at last been thoroughly investigated, and answered very fully by the department of farm business surveys at the Ontario Agricultural College and the answer should be satisfactory to the producers of milk at least. The "Y" in High Schools

' The Y.M.C.A. recognizes the great field for reaching teen-age boys found in the high schools, and is promoting the estab-lishment of activities in that field. In the High Schools committees and "Boys' Cabinets" are organized and programmes put into operation to stimulate scholar-ship, inspire purpose, encourage clean ship, inspire purpose, encourage clean speech, clean sport, and clean habits, to direct towards their true vocation in life boys who are "drifting," and to develop manliness and character.

The V.M.C.A. wants to help these boys, by increasing their interests in wholesome sports and games, attracting them to the Y.M.C.A.'s and the Churches, inculcating in them and in the boys born of foreign parents, Canadian ideals of citizenship.

Red Triangle in Rural Life

The Y.M.C.A., in co-operation with the churches and of ar social organizations, is carrying the Red Triangle to the boys on the farm, the boys in the villages and small towns which lack Y.M.C.A. buildings and equipment. The Y.M.C.A. organizes these Church groups and others to carry on active work to interest, entertain, instruct and develop boys; trains their leaders and stimulates

The Y.M.C.A., in co-operation with the churches, will hold con-

ferences and comps this year to train leaders in Boys' Work, and in Canadian Standard Efficiency Training methods. These men will go back to their own communities equipped to "carry on." From 18,000 to 20,000 delegates will attend these conferences throughout the Dominion.

The "Father and Son Movement," by which fathers and their boys are brought together in sympathetic relationship is another branch of useful V.M.C.A. work.

All Y.M.C.A. work is fundamentally religious, and by reaching the boys the Y.M. C.A. reaches men. Fifty per cent. of the Y.M.C.A. work for boys is done in the churches and the proportion is growing.

For Canada's Girlhood

ning Commission may be good and that it may foresee the day when the city will possess double its present population, we are unable to see eye to eye with it, and particularly so with regard to residential streets which have already been improved.

Duke Street, from College to Queen Street, for example, is a residential street, and as far as can be foreseen that portion of it will always remain a resi-dential street. It would be advisable to have this street extended from Queen to Frederick and there would probably not be any serious objections on the part of the owners to this, but as for the other part, opposition is forthcoming.

In a number of instances good residences bave been erected between College and Queen. They take a pride in these and are acting within their rights objecting to having wide slices of land, and in some instances parts of their homes, cut off.

The owner of a lot cannot add thereto. Its nensions are fixed and generally speaking unalterable. Even though the house were untouched by the proposed street line, he would object to having it squatting on or near the street boundary, cheek by jowl. The appearances of a property count heavily. of the lot, with a frame of lawn, adorned with trees,

When a citisen has a residential property, upon which he has expended years of effort and care, in moulding it to his liking, he becomes attached to it and would not willingly part with it, nor relish being told to transplant it on a disfigured lot. The promise of a sum of money in lieu of damages would not npense him for the inroad.

Were those concerned less attached to their homes and to allow the plan to be adopted without protest, it is estimated that the property damages on Duke, between College and Queen Streets, would amount to \$50,000. Seeing that the widening of the street cannot well be viewed as one which would enhance the value of the affected properties, the ratepavers at large might have to bear the whole cost. Are they pre pared to do this.

In the list of streets there are improvements ommended which merit adoption but providing we guage opinion aright, the public is opposed to any general widening of residential streets, which would damage homes and their grounds. Dead ends can, in numerous instances, be advan-

eously opened, giving through connections between ets. New roadways should be made wider than any of the present streets. These undertakings will

In proposing to widen Duke Street, the city planners may conceive that it will become a business street. It may subsequently do so, along that part on the south side from Foundry to Frederick and on the north from Queen to Frederick. But King and Queen streets will likely remain the principal business

roughfares of the city.

Before King Street's mercantile space facilities en exhausted, there will be a revival of the osal to widen it. In doing so, the rightful sentiproposal to widen it. ACQUIRING THE GRAND TRUNK

In opposing the taking over of the Grand Trunk Railway system, that Bourbon of the Bourbons, the Montreal Star says: The welfare of Canada depends upon healthy

railway competition. The one great successful railway must have competition. The interests of the country demand it. But instead of strengthening the C. P. R.'s only competitor, the Gev rnnent proposes to buy the Grand Trunk and run by Government employes.

What competition can there be between a great company like the C. P. R. and a railway run by politicians who have to face an election every four years? Rates and conditions of traffic will become matters of political bargaining on the general principle of "The public be damned." When the Grand Truak Pacific scheme was

launched, it was to cost thirteen millions, and was to prove a boon to the whole Dominion; a great reviver of business. It has cost two hundred millions, is responsible for ten millions per anoum of the taxes that are collected, and has now gone bankrupt. The Star and some other papers protested its building, but a clique of politicians forced the mad thing through by purchased help of politicians.

There should be railway competition in Canada. There is, however, under private ownership, none. On the contrary, the railways have adopted common rates and compete only in service. Under public ownership competition in rates would be a probability.

The Star says the one successful railway must have competition. While pretending to argue for the public and set up competition, it is in reality contending that its friend, the C. P. R., be permitted to have no other rival than the weak, struggling C. N. R. and G. T. R. In essence neither the C. N. R. nor the G. T. R. had ever been serious contenders against the strong and wealthy C. P. R. Why it should desire to see these stay in the field is easily understood.

When the G. T. R. is acquired, it will not be operated by politicisus. Though were it and the C.N.R. to be operated by the Department of Railways, t could not make a worse failure of it than the boards who have directed this pair of lame-duck railways. A bill has been introduced and passed the committee stage, forming a company, owned by the country, to take over and operate all the railways owned and to be acquired by Canada; and whose directors are to be chosen for their ability and experience; to be independent of parliament and to hold office for life, providing they make good.

This country would not have taken over the C. N. R. had it not failed to live up to requirements as a transportation company and fulfilled its fidancial

The country would be willing to have the G.T.R. and its Grand Trunk Pacific system, rehabilitate serves, pay their debts and give the right kind of service to the public.

Canada, after lavishly aiding both enterprises, saw that they could neither beg nor borrow money from investors, with which to get on their feet; and having gone the limit in loaning them money and ranteeing their bonds, had to step in.

It is estimated that the C. P. R. endeavored to

both the G. T. R. and C. N. R. but public opin ion was opposed to its securing a monopoly of the transportation business of Canada,

Governments have, in the past, like profligates, squandered money on private railway schemes. They were in many instances mislead or over sanguine. R., National Continental and Intercolonial can be rescued from the ditches into which they have fallen, coordinated and eventually

No one desires to see a parliamentary committee perate the amalgamated system. Their tenure of office is too uncertain. There can be no question of their being eventually placed on a sound and profitable basis, providing their management is placed into the hands of capable men.
