

Diocese of Huron was continued in Victoria

Hall yesterday afternoon. Ninety-four dele-

gates and members of the Board of Management were present. The reports of the secretary and treasurer [as published in yesterday's ADVERTISER] were highly gratify. ing, showing a great increase of zeal and in ing, showing a great increase of missions. Several terest in the cause of missions. Several new branches had lately been organized, and the Treasurer reported an increase of more than \$500 in money which had passed through her books. There had been a proportionate increase in the value of the bales portionate increase in the value of the bales sent to missionaries over those sent last year. Three very interesting papers were read as follows: "Incentives to missionary work," by Mrs. J. T. Wright, of London; "Mission work," by Mrs. Newton, of Bervie, and "Whatsoever thy hand findeth to do, do it with thy might," by Mrs. Boomer, of London. Miss Emery, secretary of the W. A. M. A. of the United States, was present, having come all the way from as present, having come all the way from

New York to meet her Canadian sisters of the Diocese of Huron. She gave a most interesting and instructive address.

A largely-attended and spirited missionary meeting was held in the Victoria Hall last evening under the auspices of the association. The Bishop of Huron presided at the meeting, and on the platform were Archdeacon Marsh, Principal Fowell, Canons Davis, Hicks, Richardson and Smith, and Revs. Hill. Mackenzie, Sage, Williams, Seaborn, Dewdney and others. The Bishop in opening the meeting expressed his pleasure at the interest which was manifest in the work of domestic and foreign missions. foreign missions. Rev. Mr. Dewdney, rector of the Trinity

Rev. Mr. Dewdney, rector of the Trinty Church, Durham, was called on to speak on the subject of 'Domestic Missions." He divided his subject into two parts—the Algoma field and the Northwest. The former he classified as the child of the Province of Outario, being originally started by that Province. The work, the speaker said, was very discouraging at first, not only from its difficult nature, but owing to non support from the Province that sent themen there. In the Northwest there was a very important work among owing to no support from the Northwest there was a very important work among the white population, which, since the introduction of the C. P. R., had wonderfully increased. All along the line of that road were scattered new settlements, and the present opportunity of reaching them yould be found the most advantageous. The burch should learn a lesson from the history the Province of Ontario, where through eglect a large number had been lost to the church and had joined other denominations. The Northwest was attracting the best class of people from England and the Canadian Provinces, and attention should be paid to their requirements in the matters pertaining to religion. The work among the Indians was very successful and had been established several years ago, particularly

tablished several years ago, particularly along the Mackenzie River bed. Unfortu-

tablished several years ago, particularly along the Mackenzie River bed. Unfortunately, however, there were evil influences at work in the Northwest. The Jesuit was at work among the Indians, which was much to be regretted. The speaker was of the opinion that it was more essential to have men to do the work than to have money to do it with. If the men were forthcoming the money would soon follow. Anything done for the Indians was an act of charity, because they were a dying race. Principal Fowell followed him, speaking on foreign mission, which he figured out to represent 1,030,000,000 people. Miss Emery, of New York, secretary of W. A. M. A. of the Episcopal Church in the United States, and one of the founders of the association, spoke on her experiences in the mission field. Of these people she related some very interesting stories illustrative of their eagerness to do something themselves to help the people of heathen lands and bring them out of the terrible state of spiritual darkness in which they were themselves found years ago. The speaker felt confident that the time was surely coming when all the world would own Christ as the Messiah because it was stated so in the Bible.

STILL WINNING.

The election in the North St. Pancras division of London on Tuesday last was a magnificent victory for the Liberals, the candidate backed by Mr. Gladstone being elected by a majority of 106, an increase of 369 over that polled by the same candidate in the general elections of 1886, when Mr. Cochrane-Baillee, now Lord Lamington, a Conservative, was the successful candidate. Mr. Bolton, the new Liberal M. P., is a well-known solicitor, who made a brilliant counsel for Miss Fortescue when she sued Lord Gormoyle for breach of promise of marriage, and was prevailed upon to accept \$50,000 in lieu of balm for her wounded

The result can be interpreted as a fair idea of the state of public opinion. It is undoubted that the public are with Gladstone and against Salisbury. There are many reasons for reaching the conclusion that the Liberals have a decided majority in the country, even though the Anti-Home Rule Liberals were handed over to the Tories. In Great Britain it is comparativeelectors into voting fo erument, as Sir John Macdonald has again and again been able to do in Canada. The British constituencies have not been gerry-mandered either. When Gladstone brought in his redistribution bill in 1884, he stipulated that the constituencies should be equalized by non-partisan civil servants; the work was so accomplished, and not one murmur against the redistribution was raised. Thus when British cities or counties give a verdict they may be relied on to express their opinion of the leading questions on which the parties differ. Taking these facts into consideration, the Liberal victory in the British metropolis is most significant, and there metropolis is most significant, and there can be no mistaking the general trend of public opinion. Gladstone is delighted with the prospects, and well he may be, when he reflects that in the 80 odd constituencies in which interim elections have been held since the general contest of 1886, his party have won no fewer than thirteen seats carried by Tories at that time, while the Tories have gained but one solitary seat—that of

THE GRAND TRUNK.

The official announcement of the Grand Trunk dividend for the second half of 1889 is chronicled by English papers just to hand. It shows the gross receipts for the half year to have been £2,203,000, and the working expenses, £1,568,000—a net revenue of £635,000. The net revenue eredits brought the total receipts up to £699,971. From this revenue, however, £479,900 in not revenue charges, less in-terest on bonds, etc., of controlled and subsidiary lines acquired by the company had to be deducted, as well as a deficiency

of £19,100 on the Detroit, Grand Haven and Milwankee. After disposing of these mounts, £200,971 remained available for dividend. This balance admitted of the payment of a dividend on the 4 per cent. guaranteed stock of £2 6s per cent., making with the dividend of £1 14s declared for the half-year to June 30, 1889, the full dividend of 4 per cent. for 1889, and a dividend on the first preference stock of £27s 3d per cent. for the year 1889, leaving a small balance to be carried forward. The Chicago and Grand Trunk, after debiting all revenue charges, shows as stated above, a surplus of £25,200 for the year ending Dec. 31, 1889. Financial authorities

regard this statement as satisfactory. So many Canadians are interested in th cess of this corporation that it will be reassuring to hear that the traffic returns continue to indicate that it is more than holding its own, despite the intense com-petition to which it has been subjected by rival corporations. Again, it is a share in a stock company, guaranteed to pay fabulous profits and to secure results in which faith could only be secure results in which faith could only be placed by gudgeons with little or no ability to discriminate, or too easy going to make much inquiry if they possessed the ability.

Think of Pelley handing over his money to this adventurer Birchell on his mere assurance that he owned and controlled a fair residence a mile and a half from

farm residence a mile and a half from Niagara Falls, heated by steam and lighted by gas, and with barns illuminated by electricity! There is nothing impossible in this age of improvement, and the day may be at hand when the average Canadian far house will be lighted with gas and heated by steam, and the barns illuminated by electricity; but such a story, in the present condition of affairs, should certainly been accepted with reserve. Yet it hardly seems a more improbable yarn than that told by the Canadian Dead Meat Company, recently floated in England, in the pro-spectus of which there is the following

spectus of which there is the extraordinary declarations:

From the Canadian Statistical Abstract and Record, 1888, it appears that 54 218 head of cattle and 30,421 sheep were shipped alive from the cattle and 33,399 sheep were sent to the United Canada. sent to Chicago, a distance of 900 miles, where they are slaughtered and the produce san back another 900 miles for export to Europe via New York.

It seems almost incredible that shrewd men of business have placed so much faith in this company as to put their money into it; and it was scarcely to be expected that a member of the Dominion Government would allow his name to be used to boom an organization bolstered up by such statements. It is nevertheless a fact that Sir Hector Langevin has his name on the directorate of the organization, and that so far his action has not been repudiated by his fellow Ministers. We venture to assert that no one of them can say that the pro spectus tells the truth. Not one of them will say that either a single sheep, ox, or cow has been shipped to Chicago from the district east of Quebec, slaughtered, and then sent to New York for shipment to Europe. Neither the credit of the Dominion nor legitimate enterprise can be promoted by the tactics of Sir Hector Langevin and his associates, who are really more likely to injure the good name of Canada, by such statements as those contained in their prospectus, than are men of the stamp that got away with the money of the trusting young English capitalists, Pelley and Ben-






