

DEGRADATION OF ATHLETICS.

We are so firmly convinced that the reasonable pursuit of athletics—that is, a pursuit that makes only such demands upon the time and health of its votaries as they can afford to honestly give—must work for good among all classes that we are very sorry to have to indorse the strictures which have lately been published upon the tendencies of certain modern athletes. The athlete in England has hitcherto enjoyed a high reputation for purity of motive in his struggles. Many of the most murked degree—have believed that the chief reward in the athlete's eye was the sensation of honorable distinction in a competition promoted, secondarily perhaps, for the distribution of prizes or the gaining of challenge cups, but primarily for the maintenance by healthy rivalry of a high physical standard. But coincidentally with the enormous increase in the popularity of hotball and of public athletic meetings, there has some to light the existence of a widespread tendency to make the practice of athletics a source of livelihood, and some of the methods pursued with that intent go far to show that the healthy body of the athlete may envelop a mind in a considerable condition of moral disease. This much is generally conceded; what remains to be found is a remedy. It is not exactly our province to suggest expedients for the remedy of this state of affairs; but one thing seems to us certain—that the purification of the running-path and of the football field can only come about by the co-operation of the gentleman and the player. JERSEY CITY, N. J., Nov. 22.—The Lehigh Valley officials believe they have broken the backbone of the strike at the eastern end of their road because success crowned their first attempt to move freight this afternoon.

The State Board of Arbitration will meet te-morrow morning and endeavor to effect a settlement.

A Hazleton, Pa., telegram says: Ten thousand coal workers in this region are idle on account of the Lehigh Valley strike There has been practically no business done in this branch of the road to-day.

POWDERIY SUSPAINED.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 22.—The finance committee of the General Assembly, K. of L., made its long-looked for report yesterday afternoon. The general executive committee was exonerated, and the order finds itself in a fair financial condition. In the report, among other things, the committee are very well satisfied with Powderlys and the executive board in the manner that donated relief fund for strikers was disposed of, and the members of the committee are very well satisfied with Powderly's explanation.

At a secret conference on Wednesday, at Pittsburg, between the Amalgamated Association committee and the iron and sheet steel manufacturers a compromise of the difference on the wage scale was effected. Eight thousand iron workers, who were othreatening a strike, will centinue at work and idle sheet mills will resume operations at once. operations at once.

Fourteen collieries, employing 6,000 persons, are idle to-day as a result of the Lehigh strike.

In the Abbey block on the fist floor were located the cloak and fur rooms of Jas. McKein, whose stock was appraised at \$50,000. The block at the corner of Worthington and Main streets, the seventh to be consumed, was occupied by the proprietors of the Hotel G endower and the City National Bank. Both of these were destroyed. Of the Wight block, which is built on three sides of a square, only the fronts on Worthington street and the build ings on the corner occupied by the Union Publishing Company were damaged. The block north of the Union office was damaged by smoke and water. The exterior of the Fuller block was badly scorohed. The origin of the fire is a mystery. Early this morning it was estimated the loss would reach \$2,000,000. It is now thought it will be considerably less.

WHEATLEY.—A owns a bush lot and intends to clear it up and fence it; can he force B, his neighbor, to build half the line fence? If so, what steps would A have to take to compel him to do so? MECHANISM OF A WATCH.

Wonderful Little Machine That Took Open your watch and look at the little wheels, springs and screws, each an in-dispensable part of the whole wonderful machine. Notice the busy little balance wheel as it flies to and fro unceasingly wheel as it files to and fro unceasingly, day and night, year in and year out. This wonderful little machine is the re-sult of hundreds of years of study and experiment. The watch carried by the average man is composed of 98 pieces, and its manufacture embraces more than

2,000 distinct and separate operations.
Some of the smallest screws are so
minute that the unaided eye cannot distinguish them from steel filings or specks of dirt. Under a powerful magnifying glass a perfect screw is revealed. The slit in the head is 2-1,000 of an inch wide. It takes 308,000 of these screws wide. It takes 308,000 or these screws to weigh a pound, and a pound is worth \$1,585. The hairspring is a strip of the finest steel, about 9½ inches long and 1-100 inch wide and 27-10,000 inch thick. It is coiled up in spiral form and finely tempered.

The process of tempering these springs The process of tempering these springs was long held as a secret by the few fortunate ones possessing it and even now is not generally known. Their manufacture requires great skill and care. The strip is gauged to 20-1,000 of an inch, but no measuring instrument has yet been devised capable of fine enough gauging to determine beforehand by the size of the strip what the strength of the size of the strip what the strength of the finished spring will be. A 1-20,000 part of an inch difference in thickness of the strip makes a difference in the running of a watch of about six minutes per

The value of these springs when finished and placed in watches is enormous in proportion to the material from which they are made. A comparison will give a good idea. Effect of Lightning on the Body. In describing the recent death of a boy by lightning a dispatch stated that

an accurate picture of trees and foliage in the vicinity of the accident was made on the boy's body, which phenomenon was supposed to have been produced by the lightning in a manner similar to that of making pictures or photography. This, however, is not correct. While such marks are observable occasionally

on the bodies of persons killed they bear no relation whatever to foliage of sur-rounding trees, although they bear a certain resemblance to those objects. There tain resemblance to those objects. Here is really no photographing of the image of the trees on the body. That the actual cause is quite different can be proved by experiment in the laboratory.
