THAMES RIVER CORRUPTED. Woodstock's Sewage Disposal Discussed by the Provincial Health Board. Toronto, Nov. 13.—At a meeting of the Provincial Health Board yester-

day the committee on sewerage reported on the disposal of sewage for Woodstock. They found that the water supply fr timated, be sufficient for a city of 25,-000 people. The sewerage system of the town at present includes the drainage of surface water and the committee recommend that the separate system be employed. The report continues: "Here in Woodstock, although the quantity of sewage is not large, still it has been allowed to enter the small River Thames, which runs through many miles of a fine farming country, supplying drink to many people, but more especially the farm animals. Towns are already taking or contemplating taking their water supply from this stream, and therefore more necessity exists that some other system of sewage disposal be adopted than emptying it into running streams." For the "north side" they recommend that the sewage be caused to flow over ten acres of land lying between the C. P. R. and the Thames, immediately to the north of Admiral street, which property is peculiarly adapted to the downward intermittent filtration. Eventually, they say, the south side sewage will have to be dealt with, and they recommend that the sewage from the Dundas street sewer be pumped thirteen feet, so as to be run on to the same plot of land, and that the municipal council should require the disinfection of the effluent before discharging into running water of the sewage from any tannery or woollen mill, dealing with hides from South

A Great Gathering in New York Expect

ed-English Delegates Coming. Indianapolis, Ind., Nov. 13.—President McBride, of the American Federation of Labor, has sent out the call for the fifteenth convention of the Federation, which will be held in Madison Square Gardens, New York, beginning Dec. 9. The basis of representation to the convention will be from national or international unions, of less than 4,000 or more, 2 delegates; 8,000 or more, 3 delegates; 16,000 or more, 4 delegates; 32,000 or more, 5 delegates, and so on;, and from each local district trade organization or federated body not connected with or having a national or international head affiliated with the federation, one delegate.
President McBride and Secretary Mc-Graith say the convention will be the largest the organization has ever held. Secretary McCraith's report will show that the order has been under a financial strain during the last year, on account of the many appropriations made by the Denver convention, but the Federation has grown in numbers and influence during the year. 



IT WAS ACCIDENTAL.

Coroner's Jury Renders \*\* erdict in

Carelessly When He Met His Death -A Recommendation Re the Electric Lights.

The untimely and sad death of Geo. King, the young Englishman killed on Dundas street on Monday evening, was according to a jury composed of fourteen citizens, purely accidental-due to careless driving. Yesterday afternoon, at Ferguson's undertaking warerooms, Coroner Flock held on inquest into the circumstances of King's death, the following acting as jurymen: John E. Boomer (foreman), John H. Boake, Sidney Chadwick, Albert E. Ladell, Joseph Scandrett, Wm. Collins, John Fortner, Alfred Morphy, Amos Bradford, Austin Hodgins, Wm. Morrison, Thomas Snell, Joseph Cook and Frank Harley. Quite contrary to the usual custom, the inquest was completed in one sitting, no adjournment being made, as the post mortem was conducted while the witnesses were heard It was made by Dr. James B. Campbell and Dr. Weekes, and was witnessed by a number of the medical students. Only seven witnesses were examined—Duncan Blue, a young herse trainer, who was in the rig with King when it collided with the vehicle belonging to Dr. Bucke; Wm. Johnston George Bayley, George Hooper, Thomas Chalmers, Alfred Stroyon (King's employer), and Dr. Weekes. The evidence given bore out the account of the accident as given in the "Advertiser" yesterday. King and Blue started out from Stroyon's stables early in the evening and drove around town. They called at a numher of hotels and had a few drinks, and were driving down to the stable when the accident occured. Both men were sober. They wer traveling at a pretty rapid rate—so apid, that George Bayley, who vas on his way home and was in frut of the Congregational Church, stoped and called the attention of his companion to the speed of the horse. The block between Colborne and Wateloo strets is very dark, too. The light, have recently been moved to one side of the street crossings, on account of the trolley wires, and this resulted in the center of the block being left in almost entire darkness. Monday night was very dark, and when Mr. Bayley went to the scene of the accident he had to stoop to the pavemen before he could discern King and Blue from various articles which had ben thrown from the rig. DEAD-HORSE SAUSAGES AND PIG-FEED.

The cheapness or horses in Canada has suggested to speculators the prosomething more than mere beasts of burden. At the meeting of the Ontario Provincial Board of Health, this week, a letter was read from a medical health officer in the eastern part of the Province informing the board that certain enterprising speculators were buying up old horses at \$1 per head and shipping them to Toronto, where they were killed and manufactured into sausages, although they were shipped ostensibly for fertilizing purposes. Several members of the board considered that if the horses had died of no specific disease but were killed and their flesh steamed that the meat would be innocuous. The prejudice against horseflesh as an article of diet determined the board to investigate the matter thoroughly and bring the guilty parties to account. Another letter was read from Mr. Richardson, M.P.P., of York, and set forth that a neighbor of his was in the habit of feeding his 200 hogs on the most filthy offal, notaheir railway with as much expedition bly dead horses. He instanced the narrative of a county constable who had visited the premises and had seen the hogs greedily tearing at the dead horse's carcass. Three Persons Lose Their Lives by a Chicago Fire.



LIKE A GREAT ORCHESTRA. Gilmore's famous band which is to appear here in grand concert on Tuesday, Nov. 19, together with Miss Ida Klein, the distinguished prima donna, formerly of the Metropolitan (German) Opera, New York, and of the Gilmore, Thomas Seidl and Damrosch concerts, must not be misunderstood as on the same plan as in the old days. Then it was a band pure and simple. Now there is nothing of the mere "band" about it further than it has one division of brass pieces. Another complication seems likely to arise, which may give the Sultan further excuse for inactio... The Halil Rifat Ministry is said to be tottering, and another Cabinet change

is likely to occur at any time.

In the meantime fresh disturbances are reported from Malatiah, where a number of persons have been killed, in-cluding four priests of the Society of Jesus, who were under French pro-tection. The French ambassador, M. Campbon, has been appealed to, and is preparing a very strong representation on the subject for the Porte. A squad-ron of five French warships has sailed from Piraeus for Turkey, and it is stated that an Italian fleet will rendezvous with the British fleet within a few days. There has been most serious trouble at Caesarea, not far from Jerusalem, but no details of the rioting there has yet reached this city.

A great panic prevails at Moosh, owing to the Kurdish movements. All those who can do so are fleeing from the city and neighborhood. Many people are reported to have been robbed and murdered. The Kurds are said to be in arms throughout the district. Troops are, it is claimed by the authorities, being hurried to the spot. Replying to the inquiry of the United States ambassador, Alexander Terrell, as to the safety of the American missionaries, Commissioner Darnham has telegraphed from Harput saying that they are alive, but in extreme danger. Mr. Terrell has informed Tewfik Pasha that the Government will be held responsible for the safety of the Americans. The Turkish Minister of Foreign Affairs has assured Mr. Terrell that everything will be done for their protection. tection.

It is now believed that the powers will not take definite action against the Porte until all the naval squadrons have assembled in Turkish waters, which will be about the time that the British ambassador to Turkey, Sir Philip Currie, returns here after consulting with his Government as to the future action of Great Britain. In the meanwhile the state of suspense is decidedly weary. The ambassadors themselves will be greatly relieved when the hour for action upon the part of Europe arrives. It now seems to be only a question of days.






