Washington, D. C., July 11.—An official dispatch from Rome today reports unchecked advance of the Italian troops in Albania, with Berat as an objective. From the Voyusa, the Italians have carried all positions to the Semeni in an adance of approximately fifteen miles over a 50-mile front.



The following tribute to Nursing Sister Smith appeared some days ago in the Toronto Star, in a liter written home by a Canadian soldier, and reproduced in part in The Advertiser: "Although I was in an Imperial hospital, the night sister in my ward was a Canadian, Miss B. Smith of London, Ont., and for cool courage and devotion, she gave the finest example it has been my privilege to witness. She had been given two nights off, but with the sound of the first gun, she was on-duty and stayed right through until 8 o'clock in the morning. As they brought in the wounded she would rush from one bed to the other. Of course some poor chaps were beyond her help, but she made sure they were cared for before turning to the next one." This refers to the night of the first raid. The above picture of the hospital was taken on the occasion of a visit from King George and Queen Mary, Just as the royal couple were departing.

## WILL USE HYDRO FOR DEVELOPING NORTH ONTARIO

Commission Plans To Develop 130,000 H.P. on Lake Nipigon.

RUSH CHIPPEWA SCHEME

Additional Expenditure of Half a Million Has Been Authorized.

Speaking at the banquet tendered to the boosters of hydro by the utilities nission at Port Stanley last night, Sir Adam Beck announced that the hydre commission had plans to develop the vast resources of the north by the use of hydro energy. It is pro-posed, he said, to develop 130,000 horsepower on Lake Nipigon for Port Arthur and Fort William, and to open the way to the development of the vast pulp limits of that district, as well as to ald in the development of the small

minerals.

He also announced that the Chippewa scheme will be rushed, and a half million additional expenditure has been authorized by order-in-council that this may be achieved. Sir Adam said that the plan was to help the munition plants of Buffalo and the vicinity which are now 200.000 horsepower short of their requirements. Two other orders-in-council dealt with the Rideau scheme and the St. Lawrence scheme, both of which will develop an additional 10,000 horespower.

GAN BE CHALKED BRUTAL HUN

Fifty Belgian Girl Workers Killed in German Air "Victory."

LONDON, July 10.—British Wireless.

—In a recent German raid on the Belgians, more than 50 girls were killed by air bombs launched upon an ambulance park at Lapanne, behind the Yser lance park at Lapanne, behind the Yser front. According to a special dispatch from The Hague 50 bombs were dropped in the immediate neighborhood of the park, and several struck a large villa about 100 yards from the hospital.

Of the many girls in the villa engaged in making bandages and repairing linen for the wounded, 30 were instantly killed or died from injuries within a few minutes, 40 injured were removed from the villa, of whom 24 died later.



\$10 Tax For Those Who Won't Pay \$5 to Some Minister

Montreal Penalizes All Its Bachelors 25 and

MONTREAL, July 10 .- Official noices are being issued by the city to the effect that all bachelors who have the effect that all bachelors who have reached the age of 25 years, who are living, or making a living, in Montreal, are required to pay the special tax of \$10 a head on or before the first of August next.

All companies in the city shall file with the city treasurer before August 1, a sworn list of bachelors employed by them.

Bachelors who refuse information or obstruct officials shall be liable to penalties of a fine not exceeding \$40, and in default, imprisonment not exceeding two months.

SHELL FACTORY IS DOUBLING CAPACITY

INGERSOLL. July 10.—Buildings are being erected at the plant of the Ingersoll Machine Company, which will shortly mean that the capacity will be about doubled. low height, sometimes coming down to within fifty feet of the ground to loose bombs. The Germans, on the other hand, seldom venture below 10,000 feet, because of their fear of the Brit-ish anti-aircraft defences, which have reached a saite of perfection never be-fore achieved. 

## Geo. S. Gould London's New Utilities Offices Officially Opened

When completed, will cost \$115,000. Was erected by day labor and was started just a year ago. Is fireproof throughout and richly finished and decorated. Board of education will use top floor.

The new Utilities building, which was opened yesterday afternoon by Sir William Hearst, is declared to be not only the finest building in London, but undoubtedly the finest municipal structure in the whole province. Chairman Pocock pointed out it is unique inasmuch as it is one of the largest structures crected by any municipal government by day labor.

The building has been in the course of erection just one year Monday. It was on that day that the work of tearing down the building which the new one replaces was started, and the work has gone on steadily ever since. It will likely be another month before all the workers engaged in cleaning up the odds and ends will finish their work.

Those who have been through the building fairly grasp at the spendor of the new structure. Its finish is of the finest and best. It is not loud, but spells richness, turn where you may. In detail it is complete, and the workmanship and material are of the lasting quality.

COPIED FROM EDISON'S.

The ground floor office is what might be termed a vest-pocket edition of the famous Edison electric building of New York. It was there that General Manager Buchanan got his idea and utilized it when the plans for the building were being prepared. It might here be noted that the plans and details of the building were drawn and prepared by the commission's staff, and the plumbing and electric lighting installed by their own workers. The office space provided in the rear of the counter is large, and will be well fitted up to care for the whole staff. In the rear there is a small room for the stenographers to keep the din of the machines from the general offices.





So common are gallstones that of every thousand grown-ups who read this article, from 60 to 100 have gallstones and do not know it. This trouble, however, is rare in children and young persons.

Tight lacing, infections of the internal pelvic structures, sedentary life, constipation and carelessness in the selection of drinking water seem to contribute to their formation. 
