Royal Address At Westminster This Morning Says Lower House Must Have Undivided Authority Over Finance-Brilliant Scene at Opening of New Parliament---Nationalists CHAUFFEUR SUES A PRETTY Plan Programme.

London, Feb. 21.-King Edward this afternoon opened in state the third Parliament of his reign. In a momentous speech from the throne. His Majesty outlined the plan of the ministerial campaign against the House of Lords, as follows: "Recent experience has disclosed serious difficulties, due to recurring differences of strong opinion between the two branches of the Legislature. Proposals will be laid before you with all convenient speed to define the relations between the Houses of Parliament, so as to secure the undivided authority of the House of Commons over finance and its predominance in legislation. These measures, in the opinion of my advisers, should provide that this House should be so constituted and empowered as to exercise impartially in regard to proposed legislation the functions of initiation and revision, subject to proper safeguards of delay."



Water Commissioners Decide to Charge Citizens This Year.

RATES TO BE FIXED LATER

Meter Rates Were Discussed and Laid Over-Many Matters Taken Up at Meeting on Saturday.

The citizens of London will have to pay for lawn services this year. For some three or four years no charge for water for this purpose has been made, owing to the fact that there was no regular supply. This year, however, a change will be made.

The rates will not be fixed until some time later. Chairman McMahen thought the past charges were too high for certain houses, and others thought changes should be made.

The city will be charged \$4,000 for the water to be used on the streets for street watering. Last year the charge was \$3,500, but the number of streets to be watered has increased, and the commissioners thought a readjustment should be made. According to the figures submitted there are 38 miles of streets to be watered this year, which at 2 cents a lineal foot, would bring commissioners' share to about \$4,-



The fire started from an unknown origin, in the basement of the building, while the theatre on the first floor was filled with people watching a moving picture show. By the time smoke began to appear in the room the floor had already been weakened by the flames, and when the rush for the doors began the floor collapsed, allowing the struggling crowd to drop in a mass to the basement. The entire structure was burned. The upper part of the building was occupied by business offices.

While but one body was recovered. a score of rescued were injured seriously, while hardly a person in the building escaped without bruises. In the rush for the exits two coal stoves were overturned. Many of the victims succeeded climbing out of the basement to safety, but many others were caught unstreet. der the timbers and trampled by those



Constitution Overhauled.

The constitution of the league was pretty well overhauled. It was decided hereafter to hold all National League meetings in New York. It has been the practice to hold the annual meetings of the league in this city, but the schedule meetings were generally shifted from one city to another. In future the meetings will all be subject to the call of the president on ten days' notice.

The league also gave its president com-The league also gave its president complete jurisdiction as to the framing of the schedule each season, on condition that President Johnson, of the American League, represents his circuit in the same manner. The plan, in short, is to have the schedules work automatically, nd to have the national commission

Wording Changed.

Some of the obsolete phraseology was rut out of the wording of the constitution. When the original was drawn up the National League stood alone in the first rank of baseball. Its championship race was then referred to as that of the Unit-ed States. This wording has been altered in every instance to read "the champion-ship of this league."

The paragraph relating to fines of umpires also was altered. In former times an umpire who failed to appear in his official capacity was fined \$12. In future he will lose one day's pay. The clause authorizing the league to hold back 10 per the umpires' salaries to cover fines, absence and the like, was cut out.

Memorial Resolutions.

The old clause relating to the notification of the league's president of the results of games was changed to conform with new conditions. The official scorer of the home club is now requested to notify the executive of the full result of the control of the full result of the full game within 48 hours. 
