Berlin Wants Discussion With Washington To Prevent Two Nations Going To Actual War, is News From American Capital.

Washington, Feb. 10. - Germany is understood here to have addressed to the United States a communication suggesting that the two Governments discuss ways and means of preventing actual war between them. While information regarding the channel through which the communication was addressed is lacking, it is probable it is being forwarded by the Government of Switzerland.

Germany is understoo I to have made it clear that although diplomatic relations have been broken, she greatly desires that peace be maintained. Preliminary outlines regarding the com nunication do not indicate that it carries with it any suggestion that Germany may modify her submarine warfare.

However, the whole communication is said clearly to invite this Governmen; to make suggestions regarding steps it thinks mig t prevent war.

TIME FOR LONDON TO WAKE UP ON THE NATURAL GAS QUESTION

While London fiddles with the natural gas question and conjures up delays, the industries of other communities in Western Ontario defy the coal famine and proceed to their business without fear of shortage or

The natural gas situation in London gives evidence of an attempt on the part of a high power to shut the fluid fuel out of the city. The dictator al methods used in several instances are being repeated, and London takes no serious steps to prevent the manufacturers from becoming disgruntled. Not only has London lost industries in the past because firms were allowed to slip through our fingers, but new industries have gone to the other cities because they were assured of a natural gas

Today 13,000,000 feet of natural gas pass the city's very doors. This is equivalent of 740 tons of coal, or more than enough to run the city industrially. Of course all of this gas cannot be secured, but it is certain that a portion could be secured, and the city does not need to tie itself down to an agreement. The city might endeavor to locate natural gas near the city. If it is not willing to do this, it should not cut off its nose to spite its face. It should secure the gas at the best price, on the best proposition offered.

It is said to The Advertiser on the best of authority that the Mc-Clary Manufacturing Company has been planning the installation of ten immense furnaces to facilitate its output. This would mean the employment of more labor, and the enlargement of the plant. It is for these furnaces that the company hopes to secure natural gas, and if it can be secured it is believed that the company will become an extensive steel manufacturer in addition to its present many other activities.

Washington, Feb. 10 .- The administration, fearing that ultimately war or "a state of war" with Germany must come, is anxious to keep alive the martial spirit in America.

It wishes to guard against the sapping influences of an undue sense of security. On the other hand, there is no manifest move to raise an army for actual war, though there has been some progress made toward naval and economic preparedness.

This epitomizes the Government position today at the close of one week of broken relations between the United States and Germany.

SHIVERING IN PORTS.

It finds much of the neutral shipping ordinarily plying the Atlantic shivering in home ports. Germany has slain travelers in an apparently indiscriminate sea war, and shipping has been destroyed at the rate of about three-quarters of a million tons monthly. WILSON'S POLICY.

The president himself has determined to follow the literal wording of his recent speech to Congress, to ask only for the means of protecting American seamen's and people's lives. He will keep upon Germany the burden of an actual declaration of war.

BY FRENCH TROOPS SCORES OVER FOE

All Male Citizens To Undergo Violent Artillery Fighting at Verdun, But No Infantry

Paris, Feb. 10.—The following official report was given out here today:
"We made surprise attacks last night on enemy posts west of Auberive and in the sectors of Bezange and Parroy, and took prisoners. There was violent artillery fighting last night on the front between Vacherauville and Cauriers wood (Verdun front), but no infantry action.

"Last night one of our aviators set forth to drop bombs on the railway stations and barracks at Karlsruhe (In Germany, about fifty miles from the French border), His objectives were attained. He set forth in a French machine at 10:50 p.m. and returned at 2:10 a.m. this morning, his mission having been accomplished.

"German aviators dropped bombs this morning in the region of Dunkirk, and last night and again this morning on Amiens. There were no victims at Dunkirk. One woman was killed at Amiens. Bombs also were dropped on Nancy and in the region of Pont St. Vincent. One civilian was killed and four were wounded."

Second, yesterday's reported falling off of aggregate tonnage sunk, produced wonder as to whether the fallure was only temporary or whether Great Britain has already done something to lessen the force of the submersibles' attacks.

Washington, Feb. 9.—A wrong impression has been given during the past month in the press of the United States concerning the present status of the Lewis machine gun in the United States war department.

In reference to the chances of a more pronounced break with Germany, it is disclosed that the precise course of the United States has been determined. President Wilson will not ask Congress for a declaration of war, but only for authority to take necessary measures to protect neutral rights. This would still leave the first act of open hostilities to Germany's choosing. The convoying of merchant vessels by American warcraft might be ordered.
