BEWARE OF OLD STAMPS.

A surgeon in the French army has just discovered that stamp collectors may be the means of disseminating tuberculosis by means of the stamps. A man in his employ was a great stamp collector, says the Medical Press and Circular, and occupied his spare time in fixing the stamps in albums or on sheets of gummed paper for sale, moistening the stamps for the purpose with his tongue. Three hundred of these stamps were placed in sterilized water, and with some of the water eight guinea pigs were inocculated. Each died with characteristic tuberculosis lesions. Children, says the sournal, should be warned against pairing any stroups near their mouths in order to moisten them, and foreign stamps should be disinfected in a five per cent sciption of carbolic acid before adding them to collections.

ENTANGLING ALLIANCES

Few people will agree with Premier Ross in his strained and stilled de fence of ministers of the crown occugeing positions on the directorate of companies which come before the Government for favors, such as railway electric, mining, insurance and bank ing companies, all of which, at one time or another, have some favors to ask of the administrations. Mr. Ross contends that the exclusion of ministers from the directorate of such companies would prevent some of our ablest men 'n public life becoming ministers. Mr. Ross and his attorneygeneral, Mr. Gibson, are officers of some four great commercial undertakings, and other members of the Cabinet are mixed up in smaller companies. The effect of this outside leverage is seen daily, by special and undeserved favors to enterprises officially connected with members of the Government. In Great Britain, a member of the Government being on the directorate of a commercial enterprise is so strongly condemned by public opinion that such a thing is unknown; the danger to the state of such divided allegiance is joo well known. The exclusion from the British Cabinet of presidents, vice-presidents or directors of companies has not prevented some of the cleverest statesmen being members of the Governments Premier Ross need not be alarmed that the supply of possible cabinet ministers will become scarce should we adopt the British custom. Montreal Witness, Liberal. The appointment of Mr. McShane the position of harbor master in the port of Montreal will, it is angrily asserted in trade circles, lose the Government thousands of votes in the next general election. As to that, the politicians have no doubt made their own calculations. Venal politicians, who consider that business interests must no the allowed to stand in the way of partisan politics, have been besieging the Harbor Commissioners for a year and a half past in the interest of Mr. McShane, and the majority of the commissioners have yielded to this impormissioners have yielded to this impor-tunity by making such an appointment as shows how far party politicians ap-pointed to a public trust are willing to go in the direction of betraying the besiness interests at the behest of the Government. The present administra-tion got the support of many honest men because of the maladministration men because of the maladministration of their predecessors, yet in this instance they have outshamed-their opponents. The salary and allowances of Captain Howard, the late harbor master amounted to \$3,400, and his assistant's salary was \$1,000 making a total ant's salary was \$1,000, making a total of \$4.400. Captain Bourassa, who has fulfilled all the duties of the office for

several years past, has been paid \$2,-His salary has now been raised to \$2,500, with allowance for horse, and Mr. McShane gets \$3,000. Therefore, the shipping interests of Montreal now ne snipping interests of montreal now ave to bear a burden of \$5,500, against burden of \$4,400 in what Liberals have hitherto considered the palmiest days of Conservative corruption; the individual cannot offend against common honesty with inpunity, so the present Government will hardly escape some retribution for such flagrant offences against the public trust as these. Those who have thus increased the burdens of the port, while at the same time reducing its efficiency, are the same men who reduced the salary chief engineer about two years ago by \$1,000, ostensibly in the interests of economy, but really at 'the bidests of economy, but really at the ord-ding of the Government, the object being to drive the chief engineer from office. We would again urge the busi-ness interests of this port to send a delegation to wait upon the Government at Ottawa with a strong protest against this appointment.

> The Ambitious Successor of the Queen of Sheba - He Might Undo Kitchener's Great Work-He Hates the British Because of the Past.

The cab'e announces that King Menelik of Abyssinia will not visit the French Exposition, as he had intend-And only a few days before the cable supplied the explanation of this change in the royal plans, in the shape of a statement that Menelik was preparing to march on the Soudan as soon as the Sirdar had left for South Africa. The ambitions and characteristics of Meneik make this more than probable. He believes bimself to be

the direct descendant of Solomon, by the Queen of Sheba, alleged in Abyssinian traditions to have come from the land then known as Ethiopia, a name still applied to it by its inhabit tants. The name Abyssinia is an apmixed character of the inhabitants of that great country.

#### The Vast Domain.

There is no exact limit to the vast domain loosely called Abyssinia. Lyng between 7 leg. 30 min. and 15 deg. 40 min, north latitude, forming the exreme eastern portion of Central Africa, it is the most delightful of countries, notwithstanding its proximity eight thousand feet above the sea level-affords all possible varieties of cli- leased by British troops in 1868. mate and products. Menelik, "Negusa Negust" ("King of Kings"), is absolute monarch of all the wide domain, with its four or five million inhabitants. It divided into three large provinces-Tigre on the north, Amhara on the south and Shoa on the southeast. Ethiopic is the language of the first: Amharic is spoken in the two othe provinces. The inscriptions of Egypt point to the importance of Ethiopia n ancient times, and it is known that there was constant communication Ethiopia. Up to a few years ago, however, little was thought and less was known of the country and its inhabitauts. The Ethiopian was thought of hu, who returned to England with the merely as one of the numerous sivege British troops. Soon after the solution back here withdrawn Prince Kaspeoples. But he is not even a negro. He bears no resemblance to the other inhabitants of the Dark Coninent, in fact, many of the inhabitants of Abyesinia are of the Caucasian race, of dark olive tint, approaching more nearly to the Bedouin than to any other people in appearance.

#### A Christian People.

More than this, the Abyssinians are Christian people, and have been since the fourth century, when Bishop Athanasius of Alexandria, who wrote the famous Athanasian Creed, sent missionaries to them. They are independent Christians, however, like no other creed on earth. They practise much of the Old Testament code, observing the rite of circumcision, the distinctions between animals called clean and unclean in the Pentateuch. and enforce the law "An eye for an eye" with a literalness never practised in Palestine. But they do not forget the Golden Rule, which is observed with directness and simplicity. If a priest-was married before he entered the priesthood, he may sitll retain his wife, but if not married he cannot marry after becoming a priest. There are numerous churches, but no images in them. Great reverence is paid to the saints, especially SS. George and Michael. The walls of the churches are covered with frescoes, where may be seen the Crucifixion, with Jesus on the cross, the two thieves on either side, the Roman soldier extending the sponge soaked in vinegar, and Mary weeping at the foot of the cross. Anachronisms do not embarrass their mural decorations, for in a picture of the Israelites crossing the Red Sea the soldiers of Pharaoh are armed with gune! Nor are they always true to the traditional interpretations of the Bible, for Eve tempts Adam with a banana instead of with an apple. The artist probably never saw an apple. The churches are rude buildings, circular in shape, with three divisions in them-an outer one for the people, an inner one for the priests and the inmost central part for the holy of holies, like the temple at Jerusalem. In fact. Menelik shows great consideration for a tribe of Jews in Abyssinia, the Faiashas, and prides himself upon his descent from the wisest of sovereigns through Menelik I. Hence he calls bimself Menelik II.

#### Life and Customs.

The life and customs of the Abyssinians are simple to primitiveness, yet they are an intelligent people, capable of a high civilization. The army of Menelik numbers come two hundred thousand, a formidable force, trained as they are and supplied with modern weapons. The Italians had a little experience with them which they will emember for many years to come, for the troops of Menelik go into battle to fight with rifles if they can, with .... and shield when they have a chance In their last battle with the Italians,

ANOTHER WAR CLOUD but one thousand escaped. Some three thousand were taken prisoners and the rest were killed outright. They nderstand the value of discipline, but they couple with the order of modern troops the flerceness of the savage, and will rush to kill, though wounded to the death themselves.

The discipline enforced even upon the chiefs is of the severest. If Men. elik is not pleased with the acts of one of his chiefs he sends for the man, and with his own royal hands lays on lustily with a stick. The monarch does it thoroughly, but firmly, for the good of the kingdom. These chiefs are responsible to him personally for their men and for the taxes required. Menelik is not easily deceived, for he goes about like a modern Haroun al Ras-chid to see that all is well in his capital, Adis Adaba. He even descends to the royal kitchen.

Attends to Details, Not a detail escapes him, and in his eagerness to see and learn everything he can snatch but three or four hours a night for sleep. He can fix his own watch if it gets out of order, and handle a Gatling gun with the beet of his men. At the same time he will take part in their dangerous sport of hurling javelins at one another while riding at full speed, and fears neither, man nor beast. But there are two persons who exert no small influence upon him, and these are his clever wife, Ta-hai-itu, and his cousin and the commander in chief of his armies. Ras Makonnen, both of whom worked hard for the introduction of the latest modern methods into Abyssinia. Such is the country and the people which may precipitate all its power upon the British Soudan to gratify the ambition of Menelik and Ras Mokonnen. cause have the Abyssinians to hate the English? This is a matter of history. The first of the three great kings of Abyssinia was Theodore III., who ascended the throne in 1855. Of considerable intelligence, Theodore organized an army of 150,000 men, and when Plowden, the English consul and his friend, was killed by a rebel named Garred. Theodore revenged his death by slaying some two thousand followers of this rebel. This was in 1860. means "mixture" referring to the rand when, two years later, another consul was sent by England Theodore dismissed him with a letter to the Queen. This letter was never answered, and in connection with the un welcome reappearance of Cameron, the consul, embittered the Ethiopian monarch. He put Cameron and his suite in prison, and when Mr. Hormuzd Rassam came to demand his release he too, was put in prison. Theodore then sent to Victoria for British mathe equator, for its mountains and chinery and workmen. He treated his table-lands-lying six thousand or prisoners kindly at first, but later almost starved them, until they were re-

Some History. Meantime rebellions against Theodore had broken out, and, although the Queen thought to conciliate the monarch by sending him some artisans and machinery, she found it necessary to support with troops her demand for the release of her subjects After severe marches through the mountains the British troops, under Sir Robert Napier, surrounded Theo-dore with the remnant of his army that was still faithful to him, and the Ethiopian died by his own hand. England was acknowledged supreme by the son of the dead King, Alam-aya-hu, who returned to England with the had been withdrawn Prince Kas sai, of the province of Tigre, declared his independence, defeated; the chiefs about him, and in 1872 was crowned King of Ethiopia under the name of Johannes. He was succeeded in 1889 by the present King Menelik II. Such is the story of British attempts against Abyssinia. It is possible that if the English troops had not been withdrawn in 1868 this broad domain would now be a part of the British possessions in Africa, but it is enough to know that a king of Ethiopia was brought to his death by British arms to understand how Menelik feels to-

#### ward Great Britain.

What Will He Do? Encouraged by Russia, it would take very little to induce Menelik to march the short distance to Khartoum and undo at one stroke all of the work so brilliantly performed by Kitchener. The struggle, under existing circumstances, would be by no means easy for England, and it is more than probable that the hardy, well trained troops of the Ethiopian monarch would sweep all before them.

Will Menelik try it? - Every traveler who has visited him has been struck by the tremendous ambition of the

That he can succeed at first, while all of England's forces are engaged in South Africa, is undoubted, and that he has such dreams is more than probable, while that he will do so is already rumored-perhaps has been suggested to him by some of England's numerous Continental enemies.





## Boers' Brutal their cry into the ear of Eternal Justice. Through weary periods of years **Barbarities**

HAVE WROUGHT THEIR DESTRUC-TION SAYS MRS. LEWIS, WHO WRITES FROM SOUTH AFRICA ON THE SUBJECT.

A friend of Mr. Warren Martin's has ent him the following article, by Mrs. Lewis, sister of the Prime Minister of Cape Colony, which recently appeared n the Methodist Times, under the 'title of "A Message to Christian Peo-

Dear Fellow Christians: I am constrained by an overwhelming sense of God's will to send out this message at

An awful war is upon us in this country; a war in which, on either ide, our nearest and dearest may fall. There is scarcely a household in the Cape Colony which has not some of its beloved ones in imminent danger, of death, not only in the colonial forces, which, in Natal and elsewhere, are supporting the imperial government, but in still larger numbers among the burgners of the republics now engaged in the war with Great Britain.

Every builet sent on its death mission may be bringing darkness not only to homes in the republics, but equally to the colonial homes of her majesty's loyal subjects. There surely never was a war in which more conflict of feeling was awakened, more bewildering anguish caused, than this which is now rending the hearts and souls of thousands who, like the writer are facing death to like the writer, are facing death to beloved ones, or what is even more bitter than death, family and hear disunions and separations, which may extend into and darken all the future of life. If ever there was need to get beyond the human, to reach out above the earth-to where "there is a river, the streams whereof make glad the City of God," it is in this terrible

It is because I fear that a consider able section of the Christian world of England, because of its tender sympathy with present suffering and its yearning after a present peace, is be-ing led by writers who have appealed only to these sentiments into an attitude with regard to this war which is out of harmony with the divine pur pose, at this time, that I am driven

o write this appeal. In the name of the Lord Jesus, and for His dear sake, I appeal to Chris-tian people of England to suspend the judgment they have been led to form on the question of the war in which Great Britain is now engaged.

IF EVER THERE WAS A WAR for the Lord of Hosts, if ever there was a war for truth and right, for the putting down of oppression and wrong, for the deliverence of a people powerless to deliver themselves, whose wrongs have cried up to Heaven until the Lord has come down to deliver

them, this is that war. It is not the grievance of the Uit-landers, though they have been very real, and have called for justice; it is not what British subjects have had o suffer of indignities and wrongs, though these have been numerous un-der recent Transvaal administration it is not the insult to England's power and prestige shown by the refusal to concede her demands that justice be done to her subjects, followed by the unparalleled act of defiance contained in the Transvaal war ultima tum, it is not these things, however, they may justly stir, the -national heart, which calls upon us as Christians to bring the united force of God's people, by the power of believing prayer, to bear upon this war question. These, indeed, are the appar-parent causes which have led the

war; but behind that nation, and behind these causes, is the moving power of the Omnipotent. These more recent wrongs and injustices done to comparatively a small number of British subjects, the foolhardy blindness which prevented the Transvaal authorities from seeing that the safety, as well as the very existence, of the republics depended on their granting the just concessions demanded of them, above all the suicidal acts which made them, while peaceful negotiations were still pending, rush into the war and commence their work of destruction within the borders of the colony which had been so neutral as to allow supplies of ammunition to go through to them-all these things, which have brought

British nation to unite to wage this

about the war now being waged, are the wrongs which THE GOD OF NATIONS has overruled to bring to pass that uniting of all political sections of the British nation in such a way that its vast resources—both the wealth of the nation and the flower of its army are willingly yielded up to wage this war, its forces being in the hand this war, its forces being in the hand of the "Lord of Hosts," His sword, of the "Lord of Hosts," His sword, His great and strong sword, by which He will smite oppression and bring deliverence to those powerless to deliver themselves, thereby saving from tyranny and destruction whole nations of peoples now existing and (yet to exist in the future history of this

continent. Let no Christian heart think that the immediate events which have led the immediate events which have led up to this war are the chief causes why the life-blood of the British Em-pire is being poured out to day. No! British soldiers are dying on African soil to day to put an end to a condisoil to day to put an end to a condition of atrocious wrong—a wrong continued throughout generations, and which, apparently, nothing but this sacrifice of life could right. Burghers of the republics and colonists together, the innocent with the guilty, are to-day explaining crimes which unarrecord for long mars have sent and

long years, have sent up

their cry into the ear of Eternal

generations of haman beings have grouned in this land under wrongs, oppressions and tyrannies, too widespread, too multiplied, too various to be enumerated within the limits of this paper.
For over 200 years the progenitors

of the Transvaal Republic and their escendants have crushed, maltreated descendants have crushed, maltreated, and, as far as they had power to do so, robbed of all rights belonging to them as fellow human beings the colored peoples of this land. Nor are the Cape colonists, who will suffer almost equally with the Republicans before this war is over, free from blood-guiltieses in this marter, though under the iness in this matter, though, under the British flag, their legislative wrongs, in the direction of native oppression, have perforce been far less heinous than those perpetrated in the Repub-lics, who now in their blindness and the Pharaoh-like hardness of heart of their leaders, have thrown down the gruntlet of war before Great Britain. Under Transvaal rule a ceaseless committal of crimes, legislative, social, and individual, have been perpetrated upon the helpless natives both within and beyond the borders of the Republic, for whom it has seemed till now there was no possible deliverance. Powerless to right themselves, with no human arm to look to for succor, the mute appeal of their helpless sufferings has gone up before God, the God of eternal justice.

THE CRIMES. which have cried unredressed to Heaven from the length and breadth of this land for over two hundred years, but more particularly from that part known as the Transvaal territory, de-fy description; and it has seemed as though redress would never come, as

though redress would never come, as though no deliverance were possible. To justice-loving souls who have known of these wrongs it has been like some horrible nightmare that in the nineteenth century, within the limits of a country over part of which there waves the British flag, political and social oppression by one-sace over another was being so grossly practised, to know that on every side individed, to know that on every side individed, to know that on every side individ-ual brutalities were being committed on defenceless victims, and that, not by Arab slave-driver or Moslem op-pressors, but by a professedly Chris-tian and highly religious people, who, with the Bible in their hands and loud professions of faith and prayers, were practising barbarities, in peace as well as war, which put to shame the records of what the savages of this land have inflicted, even in war time, upon

white races. Oh! it has been borrible beyond words—horrible! Wrong going on which no one seemed to realize save the helpless victims of those wrongs, whose groanings have fallen deaf on human ears; except on those of a few helpless watchers of these wrongs; whose eyes God had opened, whose ears He had unstopped, whose souls He had awakened to realize the ghast-ly condition of things, but who seemas powerless to gain redress as were

the victims themselves.

- But, blessed be God, it has not been vain that some of the Lord's own in vain that some of the Lord's own have kept watch night and day; that, though an agony so deep that there have been moments when life and rea-son has seemed at stake, they have without ceasing Lord! How long. Arise, O Lord! come in Thy mighty power! Make bare Thy mighty arm in the sight of all nations! Oh! Lord, come down as Arise. O Lord! of old, and deliver the oppressed of our land whose groans go up before Thee! Hear the cry of the afflicted,

MOAN OF THE DOWN-TRODDEN and crushed victims of the white man's Wilt Thou not work delivernce. Lord? Is there no human instrument which Thou canst bid go forth to do Thy will and make to cease he foul evils, this festering wrong in our land? On, God of nations, we cry to Thee! Our eyes look up unto Thee, O Lord! Arise! O God, arise!

Thus through long years has the cry Thus through long years has the cry of agony at the helpless witnessing of hopeless suffering been wrung from strained hearts and lives, powerless to do anything but pray. And, blessed be God, the God and Father of all the peoples upon earth, "His ear was not deaf that it could not hear, nor was His hand shortened that it could not save."

Though He delayed long in mercy to the wrong-doers to give opportun-ity of amendment, He speaks at last, "I have seen, I have seen the affliction of the people, and have come down to deliver."

And now, now that our God has risen, now that the fearful wrongs of past generations are to be righted, now that the Lord of Hosts has sent now that the Lord of Hosts has self-forth, as His avenging instruments, our British army, to right the wrongs that have cried up before Him for over two hundred years, to fight the bat-tles not of British against Boer, not of the Uitlanders against Transval of the Ultianders against to human oppression, as it appears to human sight, but to fight for the God of nations on behalf of the myriad lives, of the numberless nations with which the interior of Africa is teeming, and which only by the success of our British arms can gain through all the future years opportunities to develop as God would have them develop, and as God would have them develop.

What, then, should be the attitude

of God's people at this crisis? Is it not an awful anomaly to think of any of "the Lord's Own" withstanding His of "the Lord's Own" withstanding His gracious purposes? Failing to recognize His hand, failing to bless His delivering, saving grace, failing to adore Him for having seen fit to let the British nation, with all its faults, still be His sword to put right these terrible evils which have cursed the past history of this land, and menaced all of its future glorious possibilities.

Mrs. Lewis concludes with a strong appeal for the prayers of all Christians that the wrongs and sufferings of the natives may at last be ended by the triumph of British arms.

Paardeberg, Orange Free State, Feb. 28.—It is understood that some 7,000 Boers are concentrating on the British front. The British cavalry is in touch with them to the eastward, and skir-

mishing began this morning. AT WYNBERG London, March 2. - Dr. Leyds says Gen. Joubert is assembling 50,000 men at Wynberg, 70 miles north-west of Bloemfontein. Col. Albrecht, according to a despatch from Paardeberg, affirms that the Boers have 75,000 men left. Whether Lord Roberts is at Bloemfontein or not, he doubtless soon be dating his despatches there



British Troops Reach Barkly to the North of Kimberley.

Paardeberg, Feb. 27., via Modder River, Feb. 27, 4.30 p. m.-At 6 o'clock this morning the wante flag was hoisted over the Boer laager, and Gen. Cronje sent a message to the British laager, offering to surrender.

Lord Roberts sent Gen. Prettyman

to the Boer laager to bring General Cronje in. He returned shortly with the Boer commander, with an escort

from the 12th Lancers!
At 7.20 o'clock the Seaforth Highlanders, acting as a guard, lined up around the space where Gen. Cronje, through his interpreter, tendered his surrender.
It was a bright sunny morning.

Gen. Roberts was in khaki, and wore his sword. He shook hands with Gen Cronje and said, "You made a gallant defence, sir," and then seated the general on his right. Most of the mem-bers of Lord Roberts' staff weret pres-The interview was brief. Gen. Cronje's secretary acted as in-

terpreter, Gen. Cronje remained and breakfasted with the staff. Afterward one of the officers gave him a cigar, which he smoked in a quiet, preoccupied manner, saying very little. He wore a wide soft grey hat with a cord of orange leather and a band of dark green. His overcoat was of duck doth, and he wore black trousers and dark brown boots. In his hand he

arried a thick cane. Gen. Cronje looks like an elderly substantial farmer. He has broad round shoulders, a wide brow, and weather-beaten, oval face, and wears a short grizzly beard. He is very quiet in his manner. About the only thing he said was that there were three thousand men in his laager. NORTH OF KIMBERLEY.

Kimberley, March 1 .- Col. Peakman, with a mounted force and a Maxim proceeded to Barkly, 25 miles north west of Kimberley, where he was warmly welcomed. He left a strong guard and then proceeded to Longlands, Windsorton, and Klip dam, There were rumors of Boers in the neighborhood, but no demonstrations

The Diamond Fields Advertiser draws pointed attention to the fact hat, although Kimberley was relieved about two weeks ago, there has been no amelioration in regard to the food supply. It is still impossible, as it was during the siege, to secure a tin of condensed milk or cocoa without a medical certificate.

The inhabitants continue withou many of the common articles of food, although meat rations have been, inreased to half a pound a day. CRONJE FOOLED HIMSELF.

A correspondent has converse with many Boer prisoners both Free staters and Transvaalers. All seem ed convinced now that the war must-end in a British victory. They had never before believed that the British would be able to advance except by railway and they had supprosed that the efforts of relieving Kimberley were due to the necessity of securing the Kumberley-Mafeking line, whence an advance into the heart of the Transvaal would be easy.

Gen. Cronje, it appears, had stead-ly refused to believe that the British would make a long march away from a railway, and therefore he totally misconceived the object of the strategie movement of Lord Roberts, imigining that it was merely a change direction in order to attack Magersfontein by way of Jacobsdat. He Acop ed a Very Bad Line of Retreat

Which Was Not Justifled by any Rule of Generalship-An American Officer's Opinion.

New York, March 2 -Gen. John M. Schofield in a dispatch to the World from St. Augustine, Fla., says:—

The Boers appear to have committed their first serious mistake in the retreat from Kimberley by attempting to cross immediately in front of the British forces to reach Bloemfontein. Their lines of retreat should have been by way of Boshof, which they should have made sure to keep open, and thence to Brandfort or Winesberg, thus making certain their junction troops coming from the north and east

toward Bloemfontein. If for political reasons it was thought necessary to defend the capital of the Free State that place should have been held by other troops until Cronje's could reach it by this circuitous route.

But Bloemfrentein is strategically very weak point. If the Boers decide to hold it, Lord Roberts will have only to invest that place with sufficient force and will still have ample force to prosecute his campaign toward Pre-

As far as can be seen from the of-ficial maps the country about Wines-berg and Kroonstadt affords the first favorable positions for Boer resistance to the British advances on the Free State lines.

## FURIOUS COURAGE

Shown by the Canadians Made the Boers burrender

They Say-The arly Morning Charge and how the Boys Obeved Orders.

Toronto, March 2.-Tue following special cable, from Mr. W. Richmond Smith, dated, Paardeberg, Orange Free State, February 27, by courier to Kimberley, February 28 .- "Yesterday was a giorious day for the Canadian soldiers nere. By their gallant conduct they have gained the admiration of the wnoic army and the commenda-tion of Lord Roberts himself. The name Canadian is now a synonym for bravery, dash and courage. For days, the column, 30,000 strong, has been drawing the lines closer around the laager of Cronje's army. The advance was made by sap-ping along the banks of the Modder River. The brigade, commanded by Gen. Smith-Dorrien, in which were the west side of the river. The trenche of the Canadians extended for 400 yards on the river bank to the east, facing those of the enemy and 600 yards in advance of the Gordon Highlanders in trenches on the left flank while the Shropshires were on the left front, facing the enemy's laager. This was the position of affairs last night, when the Canadians were ordered to advance and build new trenches nearer to the Boer lines. C. D. E. and F. Companies accordingly advanced at three o'clock this morning, the two lines extending along the river for 400 yards in front of the

enemy's laager. The first line had fixed bayonets, while the second line arried shovels and picks. B. CO. IN RESERVE. with G a'nd H Companies as suppports. The line advanced within fifty yards of the enemy's trenches in dead si lence, when they met a most tremendous fusitade from the unseen foe. The most admirable discipline prevailed the men obeying their instructions. fell on their faces to avoid the fire, and remained silent, Not a shot was fired till the Shropshires' left flank poured volleys into the enemy.

Canadians then retired to the trenches Canadians then retired to the trenches they had occupied on the previous day, having checked the Boers' advance. At six o'clock Cronje and his whole army surrendered unconditionally, and the Boer general is now in Lord Roberts' camp with his wife, who was in the laager with him Lord Roberts is delighted with the splendid work of the Canadians, and says their gallant, plucky charge forced the sur-render of the enemy."

THE GREATEST SHARE.

A Paardeberg despatch of Feb. 28, says:—It appears that an action was about to begin with the Boer reinforcements at the moment of Gen. Cronje's surrender, but Lord Roberts forbade it until all the prisoners should be in safe keeping. Lord Roberts addressed the Canadians afterward, expressing in the strongest terms his pleasure and appreciation of their splendid work and courage. He attributed to them the greatest share in the Boer surrender, incording to despatches received from the front Boer prisoners declare-that the furious courage of the Canadians was a revelation to them.
