





## HONORS SCANDAL

Would Publish Reasons In HAPPY GIGGLES'S RECIPE FOR A Future For Award Of All Honors

London, Aug. 8 .- A lively dis cussion arose in the House of Lords last night on alleged scandals connected with the distribution of honors. The Earl of Selborne, calling attention to the bestowal of honors in return for contributions to party funds, moved that hereafter the rea-sons for rewards should be published and the Premier in recommending receipts should satisfy the Sovereign that no payment or expectation of payment was associated with the re-commendation. The House came to no vote on the subject.

Earl Curzon, Government leader in the House of Lords, deprecated the course proposed on behalf of the Government as calculated to deter wealthy men from charitable contributions on the fear that they would come in under unworthy suspicions Supporters of the motion, including Baron Beresford and Baron Charnwood, urged the adoption of the American system of auditing and publishing party funds.

The only preparations I made against contact with the enemy was to wrap the upper portion of my body firmly. During the battle I was never hampered for an instant on account of my sex. The soldiers, the real brave soldiers, treated me like a comrade. Only the cowards jeered.

Dictating to me her tale, she constantly made girlish gestures. She hid her face in the pillow and blushthe battalion all carried the same.
