ROADS DISCUSSED IN THE HOUSE

Halifax, N. S., April 24, 1916

Two departments of the Murray Government that came in for strong criticism in the Assembly last week were those of the Roads and Mines. Both are "presided over" by Hon. E. H. Armstrong, Commissioner of Works and Mines. It would, however, be inaccurate to say that Mr. Armstrong "runs" these departments, or either of them. He neither runs them nor allows them to run themselves. That is, he initiates nothing on his behalf and ignores the recommendations of his officials. Mr. Tanner made this clear when the Government's highways "Policy" was under review early in the week. He quoted a flat condemnation of the Government's methods from the report of Deputy Road Commissioner Yorston who declares that statute labor is unsatisfactory and is becoming less valuable year after year. The Opposition leader asked Mr. Armstrong whether he endorsed this view-point and if so, what action the government proposed to take to meet the situation. The horn of the dilemma ultimately chosen by Mr. Armstrong was to throw down his own Deputy-Commissioner, Mr. Yorston. He said that he did not care what his Deputy said, statute labor was giving good results, and there was harmony between the Government road inspectors and the road overseers appointed by the Municipal Councils.

The Opposition Leader's answer to this was to read some two score reports of the Government's road inspectors wherein, practically with one accord, they condemned statute labor, and gave evidence of anything but harmony in many cases between the Provincial and Municipal road authorities. One inspector said that statute labor in his district was a "Farce." Another said that its usefulness had been utterly destroyed by politics—that the road overseers were more particular how the road workers marked their ballots than how they built roads. Another said the road-work done with the government

money was incomparably better than that done by statute labor. Nine-tenths of the Government inspectors took the same view, whether in self-praise, or from jealousy towards the municipal road authorities, or from conviction. One declared that the results obtained from Government money were four times as valuable as those given by statute labor. Another placed the difference at 2 to 1. Still another said that it would take one dollar of statute labor to do as much work as could be accomplished by a Government expenditure of "sixteen cents." Another inspector said that statute labor was done by "inexperienced men without proper supervision" and produces no results of value. Others found that it was impossible to cooperate with the municipal road overseers. Others claimed there was no attempt at Statute labor in their districts. After reading these reports, the Conservative leader asked Mr. Armstrong to indicate where, in these official statements of the government's own inspectors, evidence was to be found of the "harmony" he had spoken of. These reports took the Commissioner completely by surprise. Although Mr. Tanner had procured them by order of the House from Mr. Armstrong's own office, it was quite evident that the latter was ignorant of their contents, till the Conservative leader read them to the Assembly.

In an able review of the highways situation, and of the government's record of failure in this all-important public service Mr. Tanner demonstrated that good results could only be obtained by uniting the statute labor resources and the government road grants and having them administered by a single directing authority instead of by two separate and often antagonistic authorities as at present. The Opposition leader also insisted that statute labor should not be condemned, but intelligently directed. Messrs. Hall, Corning, Parsons, Kennedy, Zwicker and Douglas spoke strongly along similar lines. It was made clear to the House that the Conservative party stands for a progressive policy of highways reform, with local effort and the government authorities co-operating in the work, and the application of every dollar of motor-vehicle fees to road betterment. When the House adjourned for the Easter recess, the Mines estimates were under consideration and Mr. Armstrong's administration was sharply criticized. In the absence of Mr. Murray, who has been ill for the past three weeks, the weakness of his colleagues Messrs. Daniels and Armstrong is more apparent than ever. Long-holding of office has given Nova Scotia weakness and inefficiency in every branch of the public service.

Below are several interesting and highly pleasing letters written by the boys at the front in acknowledgement of the Christmas Stockings sent from this County.

Nurse Strong, matron of the Canadian Hospital at Boulogne, in a letter to her mother, Mrs. Gerard Strong, spoke of the happy coincidence that a Kings County boy, Jack Primrose, happened to be the orderly she called to help her unpack the stockings and that he was greatly delighted to assist in so doing as he knew all the donors of the stockings which fact seemed to bring home very near.

The letters follow:
1st Canadian Contingent, Divisional Artillery, B E F, 8th Battery, 2nd Brigade, C F A.

Miss Jean MacQuarrie, Canning
Dear Miss MacQuarrie:
I received your Xmas stocking and was certainly pleased to get it, as you know it is such a treat to get anything like that from home (Canada).

It would have done you good to have been here the day we got them we were like so many kiddies, they certainly cheered us up.

They never reached this hospital here in France until the March 1st, they must have been delayed on the road, some how, but I thank you very much for mine.

Well this is my first time in hospital and I hope it will be the last, as it gets tiresome lying in bed day after day. I have been here three weeks but I hope to be out soon.

I have been in France and Belgium for thirteen months now and goodness knows how long before we will be back in Canada, although I really think we will be back for next Christmas, but we are sure to see a lot of heavy fighting this summer, but the Huns are getting more than they bargained for.

I know a lot of fellows from Nova Scotia, they are in the 6th Battery, C. F. A. Major McLeod had charge of it.—I suppose you know he was drowned.

Well I think I will close this letter as the Sister is coming around with some medicine. You know nurses are called Sisters here. They are very good and attentive.

Dear Friend:
I received a Xmas Stocking from you today and I am writing at once as I am anxious to let you know how I appreciated your kindness and thoughtfulness. You have waited a long time for an answer to your gift. I suppose you knew that the stockings were delayed.

All articles are very acceptable and especially the harmonica which will give us a little music when things are dull.

I received a shrapnel wound on March 17th and though I am still in France, I expect to be transferred to Blightly to be operated on as the piece is still in the wound. The hospitals are very comfortable and the attention and nursing could not be improved on if a man was in an expensive hospital. The Nursing Sisters who have given their time and sacrificed everything to help us are very kind and it would be impossible to praise them too highly for their efforts.

I will close now thanking you again and wishing you and yours a long and happy life.

No. 2 Can. Stationary Hospital, Boulogne, France, March 23rd, '16

My Dear Miss Yould:

In answer to your note in the "Xmas Stocking" I am very pleased to say that I have both time and inclination to write you and thank you for the most useful and pleasing presents contained therein, the pencil I use, the paper I write upon and the envelope that enclose them are all from the stocking and if you personally packed the presents I sincerely hope it will give you pleasure to know that the recipient was exceedingly pleased and gratified; believe me the remainder of the boys also received stockings, some from ladies of your town and district and they were I assure you greatly appreciated it is the thoughtful good will behind it all which is so cheering to us. I am pleased to say my wound is not very serious, it was a piece of shrapnel that struck my cheek, as it struck a bone I was nearly serious wound now I am nearly recovered.

The sisters, who as Canadians, are extremely nice, they look after us better than mothers, probably because they are not quite so indulgent as a mother would be, well I have nothing but praise for them.

By when you receive this I guess I shall be back to duty again, my home is in Victoria, B. C. where I have a wife and family to whom I shall be very glad to return. My wife tells me in her letters that she intends to be glued right on to me if I ever get back and then I won't get out of her sight again.

Sergeant Cliff Hiltz of the 25th N. S. Battalion writes interestingly to his brother, Mr. W. Fred Hiltz, as follows:
11 Charles Street, London, April 5th, '16.

Dear Fred:

Just a line or two, before going out, I am in London now on a six days pass and am having a good time. We enjoy a brief respite from the trenches, oh! so much. London is a mighty city and I hope you will be able to see it before you "retire." Have seen most of the places of note: Westminster Abbey, St. Paul's, Houses of Parliament, The Strand, Piccadilly, Leicester Sq, Buckingham Palace, etc. But best of all I enjoyed the theatres and movies. Have been to the best of them. (Theatres) London, Hippodrome (Revue), Garrick—Madge Titheradge in "The Tigers Cub" (Play). Gaiety—"Tonight the Night," (Revue). Prince of Wales—Raymond Hitchcock and Mabel Tunston in "Mr. Manhattan," seats go from 4s to £4 10s for a box, needless to say we didn't have a box, they were all crowded. The "movies," well on the Strand every other place seems to be a "movie," and in "Cinema Land" are some of the best, seats go from 1s up to £1, 6d. I think the "movies" at the present time are having a great moral effect on the London people, I was to a great many.

Things at the Front are about the same as usual, our Battalion has lost about half of its original strength, we get our reinforcements from the 40th, they are good boys. We are all going up to Ypres soon, with the Australians who long to be with the Canucks, and when we do "Fritz" has got to move from Ypres and surrounding country. Yes the big drive will surely come soon, and Germany's downfall with it.

The following is from the pen of a sergeant in the 25th Battalion:

First action of 25th N. S. Battalion under mine explosion bombardment on Oct. 8th, 1915:

All the earth did seem to shake,
The Heavens above to rend and break.
The very rats in fright did creep
And burrow in the dark earth deep.
Like hail the deadly shrapnel fell
That night upon the plains of Hell.

"D" Company bore the brunt
And like veterans reinforced the front
The M. G. Section manned their guns
And a stream of fire played on the Huns
The "West Larks" battery lay in wait
Like demons did retaliate.

"D" Company led by Major Bauld
Went doubling up the Rossignol

KENTVILLE BOARD
OF TRADE HOLDS
SPECIAL MEETING.

The Kentville Board of Trade endorsed the Daylight Saving Scheme at a special meeting which was held in the Council Chamber of the Town Hall on Tuesday evening when there were present, President Blair, Secretary Porter, Wm. Yould, A. E. Calkin, G. C. Roy, A. A. Wolfe, H. G. Harris, George E. Graham, S. S. Strong, C. L. Dodge and others.

The President reported that the committee having in charge the arrangements for the horse show was making progress. A good prize list has been secured and the prospects are bright for a big show on the 3rd of June. H. G. Harris, on behalf of the Tourist Committee, stated that the Committee had met and were formulating plans for letter writing week commencing May 15th.

President Blair read a letter from Mr. O'Brien of Windsor, who stated that Hants County did not plan on holding the Tri-County Exhibition this year as the buildings suitable for the purpose were being used by the military authorities. He believed that the people of Hants would willingly aid Kings in the conduct of the Fair. Secretary Porter stated that Annapolis has no desire to hold the exhibition this year.

A letter was read from the secretary of Live Stock Commission at Ottawa stating that Mr. G. E. O'Brien of the Sheep Division of the Live Stock Branch in the Maritime Provinces will be in this vicinity about the middle of May and he will then make arrangements for the initiation of the sheep raising propaganda.

The Secretary announced that there was a deficit of eight dollars from the banquet given about a month ago.

A letter was read from the Windsor Board of Trade asking the Kentville Board to co-operate in the Daylight Saving Scheme. It was moved and seconded by Messrs. Roy and Yould respectively that the Board appoint a delegation to go before the Town Council and ask that body to make arrangements for the inauguration of the scheme. After a brief discussion by a number of those present the resolution was put and passed unanimously. Messrs Porter and Roy were asked to wait upon the Town Council, after which the meeting adjourned.

APRIL SESSION OF
MUNICIPAL COUNCIL

The Kings County Council met in the Council Chamber of the Court House on Tuesday morning, when the warden and all the Councillors were present. The session was a brief and lasting only a little over two hours. No business of outstanding importance was transacted.

A report was received from County Liquor License Inspector C. A. Patriquin, which stated that for the year ending December 31, 22 suits had been instituted, 22 convictions secured, 700 gallons cider destroyed, 150 gallons beer destroyed, 100 bottles hard destroyed, and 14 searches made.

A petition was received from 30 residents of Berwick and vicinity asking the council to appoint a commissioner to lay out a highway in Berwick, namely an extension of the highway known as Foster Street, the same to cross the lands of the D. A. R. to highway running east and west along the south side of the railway. The prayer of the petition was granted and W. H. Woodworth of Berwick was appointed commissioner.

L. K. Patterson, who was appointed a commissioner to report on the advisability of laying a road over the property of Edith Ogilvie for the benefit of

N. V. Beckwith and L. A. Cochran reported in favor of the road. It was announced that the new road would interfere with the rights of the property owner by cutting off pasture water. The matter was laid over for future consideration.

A letter was read from Geo. E. Graham stating that he would attend to certain matters in connection with the North Mountain Railway as complained about by the Council.

County Clerk C. L. Dodge reported that there were 674 dogs assessed in this County at one dollar each. During the year 180 dogs had been killed as their taxes had not been paid.

A communication was read from the Attorney General of the Province ordering the County to pay F. A. Masters the sum of \$181.32.

A resolution was passed by the Council instructing the clerk to collect all money due for statute labor unperformed. There is a large part of this money that has not been paid. The condition was considered very unsatisfactory and it was decided to collect the same at once.

A letter was read from Thomas A. Adams, Dominion Town Planning adviser, stating that he was willing to co-operate with the Council along the line of town planning. No action was taken on the matter.

A number of changes were made in the road surveyors.

A letter was read from Mrs. Robert Dickie and sons, expressing appreciation for sympathies extended by the Council during their recent bereavement.

It was moved by Coun. Bill and seconded by Coun. McNeill that the Legislative Council be asked to empower the Council to appoint a County registrar of Deeds. The motion was put and lost.

Councillors Bill and Nichols respectively moved and seconded that the accounts of the overseers of the poor in the Townships of Cornwallis, Horton and Aylesford be itemized this year and in the future, and that the accounts be filed in the office of the County Clerk. The motion passed. Councillor Wood remarking that it was too bad that a similar motion had not been passed some years previous.

D. A. R. DANCE GIVEN AT
KENTVILLE.

Kentville has long been noted for its hospitality, and the brilliant dance given by the employees of the Dominion Atlantic Railway on Monday evening last added further distinction to the Town's record for the excellence of its entertainments of this character. Red, white and blue were the predominating colors used in decorating the ball room; the walls were solidly banked with evergreens, pennants and streamers of those shades were draped from the ceiling. Guests were received by Mrs. George E. Graham, wife of General Manager Graham of the Dominion Atlantic, assisted by Mrs. Barclay Webster and Mrs. P. Giffkins. MILITARY NEWS

The detachment of the 112th were out on an eight mile route march Tuesday to Port Williams. The boys are being well trained and are getting in fine shape for the more strenuous duties to follow.

German Warships Bombarded British Coast.

London, April 26—Yarmouth was bombarded, as well as Lowestoft, by the German warships which attacked the eastern coast yesterday. Four persons were killed and twelve wounded. The following official account of the raid was given out today:

"The bombardment of Lowestoft and Yarmouth yesterday morning began at 4.10 o'clock and lasted about half an hour. Despite the heavy guns employed by the enemy ships the damage was relatively slight. A convalescent home, a swimming bath, and the pier and 40 dwelling houses were extensively damaged. Some 200 dwelling houses were slightly damaged.

"Two men, one woman and one child were killed. Three persons were seriously wounded and nine slightly wounded.

"Fire was opened on Great Yarmouth at the same time. Here the damage was one large building seriously damaged by fire, and another building slightly damaged by shell fire.

SWEET PEA

Sweet peas grow well on any ordinary garden soil provided it is drained so that the water will not lie on the surface after heavy spring rains. A sunny location should be chosen. Plants grown in a shady situation are usually weak and produce few flowers. A close bright situation with little air circulation where the plants are subject to the extreme midday heat of summer should be avoided. The sweet pea likes a cool moist soil during the summer and every effort should be put forward to furnish these conditions if we are to secure good bloom.

We prepare our ground, which is a sandy loam, by trenching to a depth of twelve inches and about 15 inches wide. The top 6 inches soil is kept separate from the subsoil. Into this trench 5 inches of manure is scattered and this is worked over some by mixing it with about half of the subsoil removed, after which the manure and soil is packed somewhat by tramping. The surface soil is then put on about 4 inches deep. Two ounces of ground limestone, one ounce of Slag, and one ounce of bone meal is then added to each yard of trench and well worked into the soil. The seed is then planted by running out a drill about 2 inches deep and the seed is covered about one inch.

As the plants develop earth is gradually worked up around the plants until the trench is filled level full, and as the summer heat becomes great a mulch of litter, or straw horse manure is placed each side of the row of plants. This holds the moisture and keeps the roots cool on our light soils.

Tests have been made during the past two years of plants started in pots in the greenhouse and planted out as compared with those started in the open ground. For this work four varieties have been used King Edward Spencer; Red, King White; White, Countess Spencer; Pink, and Tennant Spencer; Lavender, Beatrice Spencer; White was used in place of King White in 1914. These are five excellent varieties.

Ten 4 inch pots of each variety were seeded with from 5 to 6 seeds and the plants were later thinned out to 3 plants to a pot. When set to the open ground the earth in which the plants were growing was not

broken thus preventing any check in growth, and the contents of each pot was placed one foot apart in the row the top about 1 inch below the surface. The plants were well hardened off before planting by allowing them to remain in the cold frame and in the open a week before planting. The early sown ones 5 to 6 inches high when set out. In order to support the plants in the pots small twigs are struck into the soil. It will be seen that this method of getting early bloom is one well worth recommending and it will work attached to it is not very great. The plants grown in pots were set to the open ground on May 4th in 1914 and on May 11, in 1915 on the same dates that the seed of those grown entirely outside was sown. In 1913 the March 18th planted seed gave bloom on July 4th. The April 1st planted seed gave bloom July 10th and the seed planted in the open May 4th gave bloom July 25th.

In 1914 the March 27th planted seed gave bloom July 6th. The April 13th planted seed gave bloom July 10th and the field sown seed August 3rd. It will be seen therefore, that there is considerable gain from starting the seed in pots.

The pots can be placed in a bright warm window in the kitchen and seed started early in April will give excellent plants by planting time.

It will be noticed that the contents of each pot is set 1 foot apart, therefore, it is necessary to have but 1 pot for each foot of row. These will give a heavy growth covering any trills that may be put up.

In addition to the five varieties of sweet peas named above the following twelve sorts were considered the best out of the sixty-five varieties tested.

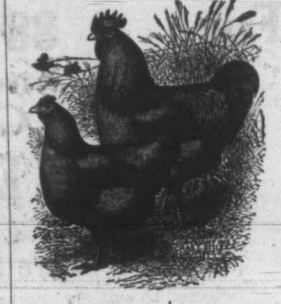

REPORT OF ANNUAL MEETING, KINGS CO. TEMPERANCE ALLIANCE

The annual meeting of the Kings County Temperance Alliance was held at Forrester's Hall, Berwick, on Friday, April 7th. By an unfortunate coincidence the Fruit Growers Association convened at the same time, but notwithstanding this handicap, the attendance at the Alliance meeting was well up to the average, fifty being present.

One of the interesting features of these gatherings is the dinner provided in the Hall by members of the Berwick W. C. T. U. About forty hungry men did justice to the wholesome viands on this occasion. The Berwick W. C. T. U. is one of most live organizations in the County, as is witnessed by the fact that the treasurer of the Alliance announced a gift from these women of five dollars, which seems to mean that after furnishing dinner for the members at twenty-five cents they gave proceeds to the good of the cause.

The meeting was privileged in having present two workers of more than local celebrity, Dr. H. R. Grant, general secretary of the Provincial Alliance, and Dr. W. J. Smith, Field Secretary of Social Service and Evangelism, of the Methodist Church. Dr. Smith, who said he was pleased to be enrolled as a member of this organization, spoke especially of conditions in Ontario and Quebec. Dr. Grant, whose name has been associated with all that is most effective in temperance work in the Province for the last twenty-five years besides giving wholesome advice respecting several topics under discussion, described the passage of the Corning amendment through the stormy seas of party and privilege to within sight of the desired haven. Two other new members were welcomed, and made appropriate remarks, Rev. G. D. Milbury and Rev. R. S. Meadows.

Considerable business was transacted, the forward movement, centreing in the appointment of the Secretary to devote his whole time to the interests of Alliance work, was ratified, and plans submitted by the Executive for the support of the work were adopted. A committee was appointed to submit some necessary changes in the constitution. It was on motion resolved that an effort be made to create a fund to be used for a stricter enforcement of the temperance laws, and that the Provincial Government be requested to reinstate Mr. Edward M. Beckwith in the offices of Stipendiary Magistrate and Justice of the Peace from which he had been so unjustly dismissed. A letter was read from Mr. E. E. Archibald of Wolfville, expressing his interest in the work, and his regret at being physically unable to be present, and a message of condolence was ordered sent in reply.

"During the period between the afternoon of April 20 and the afternoon of April 21, an attempt to land arms and ammunition in Ireland was under the guise of a neutral merchant ship, but which in reality was a German auxiliary, in conjunction with a German submarine. The Auxiliary sank and a number of prisoners were made, amongst whom was Sir Roger Casement."

This man, who was knighted in 1911, has been in British Consular service in different places. He has been an Irish Separatist for some two years and has tried to get an anti-English party in Ireland to join the Huns.
