TOWN ORGANIZES FOR REFERENDUM

A meeting of the citizens of Newcastle was held on Tuesday afternoon at three o'clock in the Town Hall to organize for the referendum on Prohibition which is taking place July 9th or 10th.

Rev. Thomas Marshall, organizer for the N. B. Temperance Alliance was present, also Donald Fraser, President of the N. B. Temperance Alliance, and gave interesting addresses as to the wonderful benefit which has been derived since the Prohibition Act went in force, and they also explained the work which would have to be done before the referendum takes place, in order that a large majority for Prohibition be secured when the vote takes place in July.

Rev. L. H. MacLean, E. A. McCurdy, Rev. E. A. Kinley, T. A. Clarke and others also spoke of the work in hand, and organization was proceeded with. The following executive committee was then appointed:

Chairman—E. A. McCurdy

Secretary—F. E. Locke

Other members of the executive are Andrew McCabe, T. A. Clarke, Mrs. S. A. Demers, Mrs. C. C. Hayward, Mrs. T. A. Clarke, Mrs. Dr. Nicholson, James Stables, J. E. T. Lindon, and the executive was also given power to add to their numbers. The executive meets shortly to draw up their committee, and it is hoped that the people of Newcastle and surrounding Parishes will give their heartiest support in favor of the Prohibition Act when vote is taken in July.

TARVIA PLANT EXPECTED DAILY

The Caville Co. which have charge of the new tarvia road from Chatham to Newcastle, are putting an early start on their contract. The plant was shipped last week from St. John, and is expected here every day now, and when it arrives the work will be commenced at once from the Chatham end and will go steadily forward as fast as circumstances will permit.

The Tarvia road is a real permanent roadbed with a surface that is quickly and easily renewed every few years or so often as it wears and is the cleanest and most satisfactory road yet devised for all classes of traffic. With the extraordinary conditions that existed here in regard to the granite supply this road will probably cost \$25,000 per mile. As about 20,000 tons of granite are needed for this road work, the local supply was totally inadequate and granite for the foundation of the five mile stretch of road is being brought from the Miramichi quarry Co's property at Quarryville and with this long haul is an exceptionally expensive item in the cost of construction.

Legislation To Meet Newsprint Needs

Ottawa, June 6.—The Citizen tomorrow will say that the Dominion Government will introduce legislation this week compelling Canadian makers of newsprint paper to supply fifteen per cent of their total output to Canadian publishers, this being sufficient for the needs of the news papers of this country. The bill to be introduced, the paper states, will not fix the price.

A meeting of the Daily Newspaper Association Saturday asked the Government to pass legislation forcing the mills to keep them supplied at prices not higher than current export rates.

MIRACULOUS ESCAPE

A miraculous escape from serious injury or even death was recorded here on Monday last, when a car driven by Mr. Walter Amy, with Mrs. Amy and two children and Mrs. C. C. Hubbard as passengers, backed over the bank at Lower Mill Cove and made a drop of about twenty feet into the brook below. Mr. Amy was unable to make the jump on the lower side of the hill and was backing up for a start when the car became unmanageable and backed over the bank. Nobody but the occupants suffered a scratch, but needless to say, the latter had very bad cases.

ITINERARY OF AMERICAN EDITORS

Montreal, June 3.—The itinerary for the tour of the National Editorial Association of American editors has just been issued and will run from June 7 to June 26. It starts at Yarmouth, N. Control Of Swarming

Swarming is the bees' natural method of increase, and the instinct to swarm is particularly strong under the extremely favourable conditions for bee activity of the Canadian spring and summer.

The uncertainty of swarming, the loss of honey following the division of the working force of the colony, the possibility of swarms escaping, and the difficulty in preventing swarming in many parts of Canada without considerable labour, all make the control of swarming quite the greatest problem in bee management.

To encourage work in the hive and to discourage the desire to swarm, plenty of room, both in the brood chamber and in the super, a large entrance should be given to all colonies as soon as conditions are favourable, but these measures will not always be enough to prevent swarming in many places, especially in the north.

If the apiary can be watched all day, it is a good plan to clip the queen's wings at fruit blossom time. When the colony swarms, remove the hive to a new stand, place on the old stand an empty hive, to which the swarm will return, the queen having been meanwhile picked up and placed in a cage in the new hive. The field bees will join the swarm and the parent colony will be so much weakened by their loss that it is not likely to swarm again.

Where the apiary cannot be watched, the plan of preventing swarming by examining every brood comb in every colony every week, and destroying all the queen cells is very laborious and not always effective. A simpler plan is to remove the queen at the beginning of the clover honey flow, and eight or nine days later, destroy all the queen cells except one, or destroy all and give a ripe cell of select parentage. In this way a young queen is obtained which will not swarm and, besides will be more prolific in the fall and will be less likely to swarm next year. This plan, however, causes a certain amount of loafing until the new queen starts laying. This loafing can be much reduced by introducing a ripe queen cell at the time the queen is removed, and if this is done early enough before any preparations for swarming have been started, the bees are unlikely to build further queen cells. Where, however, one prefers to use the surer method, only those colonies that are actually preparing to swarm should be treated, and some means for quickly ascertaining if a colony is building queen-cells in preparation for swarming should be employed. One of the best of these is to have the brood nest occupy two chambers, and then by prying up the upper chamber, one can see at a glance if the queen cells are being built along the lower edge of the combs in this chamber.

In many parts of southern Ontario, southern Quebec and similar regions the desire to swarm is strong only during the first two or three weeks of the honey flow from clover, and the separation of queen and brood by a queen excluder, the queen being put into a lower chamber containing only empty combs and foundation, may be enough to tide the colony over this period. Another good plan that may be employed to prevent swarming in this region is to use two brood chambers and confine the queen to the lower one early in the honey flow, at which time the combs in this chamber usually contain a large number of empty cells.

Method Of Orchard Cultivation

The method or system of cultivation to be adopted may be varied to some extent to meet local conditions. In reality, however, all systems should be, and in most cases are, a slight modification of the "clean cultivation and cover crop system."

THE CLEAN CULTIVATION METHOD, calls for all the ground under and around the trees to be ploughed and frequently harrowed until around July first.

This system has much to recommend it, viz. (1) maximum conservation of soil moisture, (2) excellent conditions for liberation of plant food especially nitrogen, (3) tightness and cleanliness of the orchard and (4) control of insect pests.

In connection with this, either fall or spring ploughing may be practised, the former however, only in those localities with a favourable enough winter to so permit. The great secret of success with any system of cultivation designed to conserve moisture and liberate plant food is to get on the land as early in spring as possible otherwise, if the orchard is not ploughed until late, most of the advantages of cultivation are lost.

Modifications of the above consist in leaving a strip of sod about four feet in width next to the trees. In old orchards where it is difficult to get close to the trees this may be practised successfully, in which case the grass is cut once or twice during the season and allowed to remain as a mulch.

In both these instances, on the cultivated portion a mulch is maintained until about July first, when a cover crop of some sort should be sowed. If the seed is not expensive, some leguminous crop like red clover or crimson clover at the rate of about 12 pounds per acre for the former and 10 pounds per acre for the latter, or summer vetch at the rate of 50 pounds per acre is advisable, as these will add a considerable quantity of plant food to the soil.



If too costly, rape may be used as a cover crop, at the rate of 30 pounds per acre. THE SOD MULCH SYSTEM, of properly handled may be advisable on moist soils where there is abundance of plant food. This system must not be confused with the SOD SYSTEM, which is not to be recommended. In the former, for the first few years grass or old straw is hauled on to the orchard and placed around the trees to form a mulch. This practice is continued until the cuttings from the sod beneath the trees is sufficient in them selves to form a heavy mulch.

- Flags should be hoisted at 8 a. m. and lowered at sunset. Never allowed to fly all night.
- When hauling down the flag do not allow it to touch the ground.
- To place a flag at half mast, hoist it to the top of the flagstaff, then cover it, the WIDTH OF THE FLAG ONLY. When lowered at sunset it should first be raised to top of flag pole.
- Secure the halliards tightly to keep flag close to the staff.
- To fly the Union Jack right, in top staff corner place broad white.
- The white Ensign is exclusively the Naval Flag, and should not be otherwise used. The Red Ensign is the Flag of the Mercantile Marine. The Union Jack can be flown by any one on shore, but never on the water.

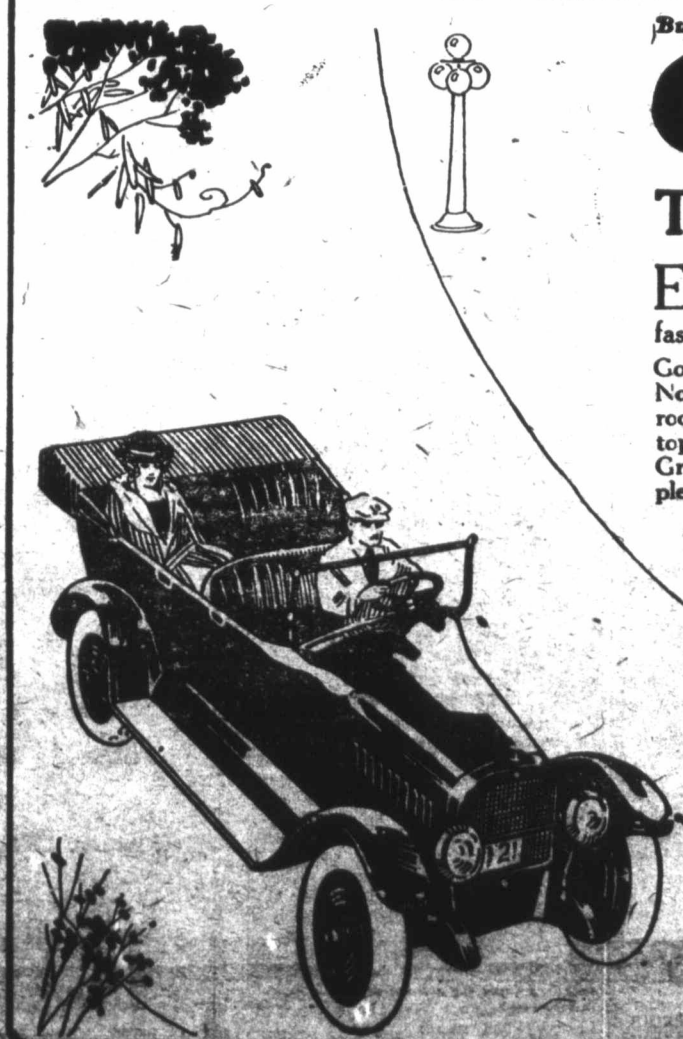

All Women Can Vote In Coming Election

One of the most important features in connection with the July election, when the electors will be asked whether or not they want Prohibition or a return of the open bars, is the fact that all women, by merely taking the trouble to register within two weeks of election day, will have an opportunity to vote and assist in eventually giving New Brunswick real Prohibition.

Circuit Court

Chief Justice McKeown presided at the May session of the Circuit Court for the County of Northumberland, which opened at Newcastle Tuesday morning at 11 o'clock. There was a large attendance of barristers including Hon. J. B. M. Baxter, K. C., of St. John and Peter Hughes of Fredericton.

While several cases were entered for trial, a number of settlements were effected, and, with two or three cases postponed, the Chief Justice was enabled to adjourn the court without any adjournments having taken place.

Hon. Mr. Baxter is associated with Mr. McDade in the various cases in which the latter is interested.

In the matter of Richard McDermald vs. Richard Murphy, Hon. Robert Murray, K. C., announced a settlement effected out of court. The defendants agree to a judgment that the plaintiff recover possession of the lands and premises in the Parish of Anwick and to the payment of \$60, mesne profits. The defendants reserve their right to sue in the Probate Court for their claim against the estate of John McDermald for wages and disbursements amounting to several thousand dollars. McDade for the defendants.

In the matter of William Sweeney vs. John Dawson and O'Brien, Mr. McDade announced a settlement. The defendants admit an innocent trespass and pay damages to the plaintiff in the sum of \$8.00.

In the matter of A. E. Hanson vs. the Royal Bank of Canada, P. J. Hughes for the plaintiff and Allan A. Davidson, K. C., for defendant, agreed on a settlement, the plaintiff receiving the amount of his claim, totalling some \$900, less deductions agreed upon.

In the matter of the Miramichi Rubber Company, vs. William B. Ross, Mr. McDade for the plaintiff, the defendant agreed on a settlement, plaintiff to receive \$340 and costs. T. H. Whalen for defendant.

In the matter of Thomson vs. Mullen, it was agreed between Mr. Davidson, K. C., for plaintiff and Mr. Williston for defendant, that the case be tried on September 14th next.

In the matter of Hotchkiss vs. Snowball, a suit for the recovery of \$4000 damages for failure to deliver laths, a settlement was effected out of the court. The defendant admit the contract but were unable to perform it owing to a strike. The plaintiffs receive \$2200. Teed and Teed for the plaintiffs and Mr. McDade for the defendant.

In the matter of Maloney vs. Foran, a suit for the recovery of \$2000 for failure to deliver lumber, adjournment was made until September 21st. McDade for the plaintiff and Davidson, K. C., for defendant.

Jump In Rates For Insurance On Farm Property

Because the losses by fire on farm buildings show a percentage considerably heavier than losses on other forms of property, the New Brunswick board of fire underwriters will increase farm rates twenty-five per cent. per annum. The rate for persons owning and occupying farm property will be lower than in cases where the farms are occupied by tenants. Insurance men consider that men owning and occupying farms take greater care and exercise stricter precautions against fires than do the tenants who have little to lose outside of their furniture and contents of barns and sheds. There is, of course, a lighter premium where farms are located in fire districts of town and cities—Telegraph.

Study of Music Cultivates Accurate And Quick Thinking

A school trustee who was once opposed to granting more time on the school curriculum for music study, but who now is heartily in favor of it, owes his change of attitude to being shown the value of music study as an educational subject the same as arithmetic, grammar, geography or any other regular subject, in addition to the cultural and recreational side of music.

The case for music is well put by a school music supervisor who makes the following observation: "While the main purpose of music education is to cultivate an emotional reaction for the beautiful, yet the intellectual discipline which goes hand in hand with well organized music study may easily hold its own with that developed by mathematics or science. What subject lays such stress on quick perception? The young child is taught to think through his ears first. I wonder how many music teachers realize that their success depends directly upon correct hearing? I feel that public school teachers have grasped this truth much in advance of teachers of piano and orchestral instruments. After the child has had much training in thinking through his ears, then he is taught to think through his eyes. For training in precision, regularity, form, restraint and control music has no peer. What demands more accurate, quick thinking than music reading? In mathematics the pupil thinks in rhythm, and the mind must be alert.

"Music study which scores in intellectual discipline as well as in emotional reaction demands more time in the daily program and better trained teachers than many school systems now have, but as soon as we prove to school authorities the possibilities of music as an intellectual stimulus they will give it more consideration in the school program."

Newsprint Paper Takes Big Price Jump Soon

The Canadian Export Paper Company, Limited, has announced its schedule of export newsprint paper prices for the third and fourth quarters of the current year, the new prices showing very large advances over those prices recently prevailing on their export paper prices.
For the third quarter of 1920, which commences July 1, next, the new prices will be 5 1/2 cents a pound at mill which is equivalent to \$110 per ton. For the fourth quarter of 1920 which commences October 1 next, the new prices will be 6 1/2 cents a pound, mill, which is equivalent to \$130 a ton.
The Canadian Export Paper Company, Limited, controls approximately \$25,000,000 per annum of the export paper output of five of the leading Canadian newsprint producers.
It is generally expected that the other Canadian producers of newsprint paper in Canada will advance their prices in line with those adopted by the Export Paper Company, as is usually the case, and that for the last six months of this year the highest prices yet paid for export newsprint from Canada will be netted by the companies.

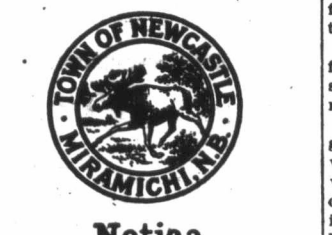

Methods Of Growing Tomatoes

Tomatoes should be kept growing from the time the seed germinates until the fruit is ripe. If sown in the hot-bed very early they are likely to receive an injurious check when held back until it is safe to plant them out. When the seed is sown about the middle of April the seedlings are ready to prick out into flats about the 10th of May and should be ready to set out immediately after the early June frost, which usually occurs in Prince Edward Island the first week in June. They are ready to prick out into the flats when they have the third leaf. In setting them out they should be planted so that the first leaves are about level with the ground. A little clay may be mound ed around them to protect them from the wind.
 Any good garden soil is suitable for tomatoes. It is usually best to delay manuring the plants until after the first fruit has set. Most amateurs make the mistake of planting in soil that is too rich in nitrogenous manures which produces great vines with late fruit or a very large percentage of green fruit. Once the fruit has set, then liquid or other forms of manure may be applied generously.
 A series of experiments were conducted with two varieties, "Bonny Best" and Sparks Earliana, for several years at the Charlottetown Experimental Station, to determine the best method of growing tomatoes. Five methods were used with each variety as follows: No. 1. The plants were set four feet apart each way and the plants allowed to spread over the ground. They were unpruned and left lying on the ground.
 No. 2. Planted two feet by four feet apart. The tomatoes were pruned to two stems and tied to wires.
 No. 3. Planted two feet by four feet apart. The tomato plants were pruned to one stem and tied to stakes.
 No. 4. Planted two feet by four feet apart, pruned to one stem and tied to wires.
 No. 5. Planted two feet by four feet, pruned to one stem, tied to stakes and one half of the foliage removed during the ripening period.
 The first method produced the greatest quantity of fruit each year with both varieties. The tomatoes were later ripening than with the other methods and the total quantity of ripe fruit from the plot was less than on the plots grown by the second method, where the plant were pruned to two stems and fastened up with wires. The second method gave the largest returns of ripe fruit. This was closely followed by method No. 3, which produced the most early ripe fruit though not the greatest total quantity. The removal of the foliage in method No. 5, decreased the quantity, of both ripe and green fruit, but greatly increased the percentage of ripe fruit on the plants.
 Large quantities of tomatoes can be produced by planting four feet apart each way with the least amount of labour. A good percentage of ripe fruit can be obtained if the plants are not supplied with nitrogenous manures until after the tomatoes have set. The method that was most successful in producing ripe fruit early in the season was that of tying the plants to stakes placed two feet apart in the rows.

Ask For Removal Of Burden Of Tax Collecting
 Ottawa, May 31—The burden of collecting the "discriminatory and confusing" luxury tax, which they consider "ill-advised, poorly conceived and poorly devised," was asked to be removed from their shoulders by the retail merchants of Canada at a special interview with Sir Henry Drayton, minister of finance, in the Chateau Laurier this morning, at which 200 retailers from all over Canada were present. Instead of making the retail merchants collect the tax, they asked that it be collected at the source of supply, namely from the manufacturer and importer, and absorbed in the same manner that all systems of taxation are absorbed. Full sympathy and co-operation with the government was expressed by the retailers through Henry Watties, Ottawa, who acted as chairman of the meeting.
 Sir Henry Drayton listened for an hour and a half to the reading of the memorandum which had been prepared and to a dozen or more speakers representing the various sections of the retail trade who voiced the objections to the luxury tax.
 In replying he did not answer any specific objections, nor indicate if any change would be made in the budget proposals.
 One of the most interesting statements in Sir Henry Drayton's reply was: "In the interest of everybody, the government desire to check extravagance, and pull down the cost of living. Perhaps we are already setting our faces towards lower prices. The government wants to encourage efficiency in business. But we are not going on borrowing money."

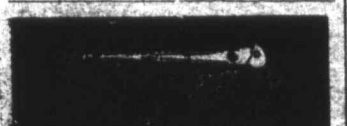
