THE estimates were tabled in the House of Commons, Ottawa on Monday night. They provide for nearly \$48,000,000, on consoli dated account, besides some five millions on capital account. In addition to these estimates there will, of course, be supplementaries that will call for several millions more. The amount for railway improvements in this Province is placed at \$510,950, of which exactly \$500,000, are for the Murray Harbor Branch and the Hillsborough Bridge. Summerside Breakwater is to get \$35,000 Souris Breakwater \$20,000 and Casumpec Harbor \$22,000, various other items are down for this Province; but our space is used up. Next week, we will publish the itemized statement. There is no mention of the new Station House at Charlottetown.






