Mica Used to Surface Cement

Ground mica is now being used extensively for surfacing concrete in cement work. It has proved very effective for this purpose as it gives an artistic finish to the work, and adds life and sparkle to the surface, taking away that flat, dead appearance that is common to concrete. About five pounds of mica is sufficient to cover 100 square feet. The electric light columns in Lincoln Park, Chicago, were treated in this way. Crushed red granite was used with the mica, so that the finished surface has the appearance of polished granite. The granite and mica surfacing material was applied to the inner surface of the square iron trough in which that part of the columns that was extended above ground was cast. When the trough was filled, the top or lid was screwed down, crowding the concrete into all the lines and corners of the mold. After the cement had set perfectly, part of the mold was removed to permit the post to cure more rapidly. The post was not removed from the mold until it had set for 24 hours at least. 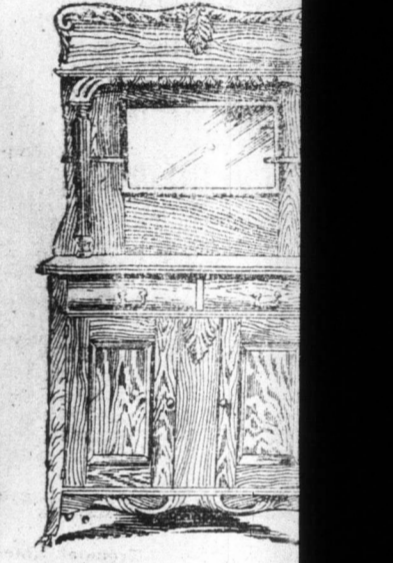

**Another
Railway Loan**

GOVERNMENT ANSWER TO SIR ROBERT BOND'S QUESTION.
RT. HON. SIR R. BOND.—To ask the Hon. Minister of Finance and Customs if the loan of £800,000 sterling raised for the purpose of defraying the cost of the branch lines of railway contracted for in 1910 will be sufficient to meet the total cost of the same, or, if the Government will find it necessary to borrow a further sum of money on that account, and, if so, what is the estimated amount that will be required?

ANSWER.
When the loan of four million dollars was raised in 1910, the surveys of none of the branch lines were completed, and, accordingly, the amount asked for and raised under the Loan Act was based on a mere estimate of the length of these proposed branches.

At the present time we can make a much closer estimate of the length of the branches, and of their cost, as three of the proposed branches are completely surveyed; one branch railway is built and being operated, and two of the other branches are partially constructed.

The surveys are at present engaged in locating the branch to Fortune Bay. There will then only remain the short branch from Deer Lake to Bonne Bay to be surveyed.

When completed the branches will probably represent the following mileage, according to the estimate of the Government Engineer:—Bonavista, 88; Trepassay, 102; Heart's Content and Grate's Cove, 85; Fortune Bay, 43; and Bonne Bay, 25, or a total of 343 miles for the several branches.

The increased mileage over the original estimate is brought about by the desire on the part of the Government to connect as many settlements as possible with the line of railway.

It is not to be understood that the branch to Heart's Content by about 16 miles, by building it down the shore from Dillon, and connecting 5,000 people, instead of crossing the barrens from Carbonear to Heart's Content, where there are no inhabitants.

The Bonavista Branch, by connecting settlements in both Trinity and Bonavista Bays, increased the line from 11 to 13 miles.

The same is true in relation to the survey for the Bay de Verde branch, where a very considerable increase has been made on the length of the line, owing to the fact that the railway passes near or goes through every settlement in the District.

For the same reason a considerable increase was made in the length of the road from St. John's to Trepassay.

Under these circumstances the branches under contract to build will at \$15,000 a mile on a mileage of say 340 miles cost in the neighborhood of \$5,100,000.

To this amount, of course, will have to be added, for three of the branches, the cost of the right of way where the railway passes through private property, the cost of station fencing, and any additional equipment not embraced in the Construction Contract.

The Government have not, as yet, made any detailed estimate as to what the total cost will be. To date the Contractor has been paid, on the certificate of the Government Engineer, for 35 miles on the Bonavista Branch, 55 miles on the Trepassay Branch, and 10 miles on the Heart's Content Branch, at the rate of \$15,000 per mile, or 145 miles in all—an average, for the three seasons' work, 1909, 1910, 1911, of about 45 miles per year.

For the foregoing reasons it will be seen that the amount of the loan raised in 1910 will not be sufficient to defray the entire cost of the whole of the branch lines, when finished in 1915, and it will be necessary to borrow a further sum of money to complete the several lines.

There is sufficient money in the Bank to the credit of the loan to pay for the work to be performed in the season of 1912, but the Government may consider it desirable to introduce a Loan Bill this session to cover the amount over and above the loan of four million dollars, as no loss will be sustained by reason of our having the money here before it is required, as the local banks pay us the same rate of interest as we pay on the loan.

Railway Operations.
ANSWER TO SIR ROBERT BOND'S QUESTION.
RT. HON. SIR R. BOND.—To ask the Hon. Colonial Secretary to lay on the table of the House a copy of the Government Engineer's Reports for the past three years on the equipment and operation of the Newfoundland Railway.
Also.—To lay on the table a statement from the Government Engineer as to whether in his opinion: (1) Sufficient rolling stock has been provided by the Railway Contractors to meet the requirements of traffic, and to fulfill their contractual obligations to the Government of this Colony.

(2) As to whether the locomotives in use on the lines of railway between St. John's and Carbonear, and between Brigus Junction and Placentia, are sufficiently powerful to ensure regularity of service on scheduled time; (3) As to what cause the irregularity on those lines during the past year must be attributed; (4) As to whether a sufficient number of section men are employed on the several lines of railway to ensure proper maintenance, and to keep the lines of railway open for daily traffic during the winter months; (5) As to how many miles of track are embraced in a section, and how many men are allotted to each section; (6) As to whether in his opinion the Railway Contractors have employed all necessary means to keep the railway lines open to traffic since the commencement of the present year; (7) As to what steps he has taken to acquaint himself of the conditions with which the Railway Contractors have had to contend in operating the railway since the beginning of the present year.

REPLY OF COLONIAL SECRETARY TO SIR R. BOND.

February, 22nd, 1912.
A.—The Government Engineer has not furnished any reports for the past three years on the equipment and operation of the Newfoundland Railway, other than reports of irregularities in train service. He made an inspection in 1909-10, but did not make a report as he had nothing new to report. In 1910-11, he had not time to make an inspection, and the inspection for 1911-12 will be made this Spring.

B.—(1) The Government Engineer has considered the railway fully equipped with rolling stock, but the Company have been building as fast as their plant would permit, and rapidly. It is difficult to lay down a hard and fast line as to the actual requirements, traffic conditions vary so much from those in other countries, and the population served is so small. A good deal of trouble with regard to freight delays was due to lack of proper facilities to handle it at St. John's. This has been rectified to a great extent by enlarging the freight shed. The engine power is being added to by engines of the heaviest type admissible on a 50 lb. rail, and the type of passenger cars and their upkeep is improving. A great improvement has been effected on the Placentia line by the placing upon it of properly equipped train lately, to replace a train the accommodation on which was very justly a cause of frequent complaint. It would appear that the cross-country service has now as many passengers as it can conveniently handle, and with the advent of increased traffic from the branch lines will probably be over-taxed in the near future calling for an increased freight service to one of the daily trains, so that the evil result of mixed traffic, now in evidence, may be eliminated.

(2) As a general rule, the engines used on the Carbonear Branch are the heaviest and best in the service, and sufficient to ensure regularity of service. The engines used, however, is not a mixed one. No permissible improvement in power or speed would rectify the delays which arise through handling freight. The engines used, for some time past on the Placentia Railway, are of a type which should be equal to the work of running on schedule time where the same trouble not experienced on this branch as on the Carbonear line.

(3) The principal cause of delay on the Carbonear line for the past year has been the handling of freight in conjunction with passenger traffic, and the delay on the Placentia Railway has been due to the late despatch from Brigus Junction on account of late arrival of train from St. John's, and shunting operations at Placentia, where the station and pier arrangements are of a most awkward character and very hard to operate. The number of men engaged on maintenance is generally sufficient to keep the railway in safe running condition. There are not sufficient to attend to matters of detail and general appearance of the outfit, such as an English Railway Engineer would require, and which are more or less sentimental as applied to a railway in this country. It is impossible to say what number of men would be required to keep the lines of railway open in the winter months, especially under present conditions, when men appear to be of little service except in the immediate neighbourhood of a push plow.

(4) The Sections vary from 6 to 10 miles for each gang of four men. The Government Engineer is of the opinion that on the whole the Company have done all in their power, considering the equipment at their disposal, to keep the railway lines open for traffic. There may be isolated instances in which better results might have been obtained, but generally speaking Mr. Hall believes they are doing the utmost in their power to keep the lines open.

(5) The Government Engineer is advised every day through the Mail Clerks' reports on the conditions, and where these are not available he keeps in close touch with the Company's operations through the Dispatching Office, and all reports of the roadmasters and train gangs are put at his disposal by the Company.

Mr. T. P. Connors with 60 men from St. John's station left this morning to do snow clearing to Avondale. Yesterday they went but got only as far as Mount Pearl.

Ship in Danger.

When the S. E. wind of last evening began to freshen up the report went about the city that the Tobasco which was off Cape Spear was in a dangerous position, and that the heavy slob ice being pressed landwards was rafting upon her. Men, however, conversant with conditions outside did not believe that such could occur. At 2 p.m. today the ship was 4 miles off Cape Spear forcing in slowly through the heavy slob ice which is driving off the coast. She should arrive this evening. She left Liverpool on the 5th of February, was reported by the Nascope which saw her Thursday week and she has not been seen since Monday night late in the slob off this port and Cape Spear. She has 550 tons freight and a large mail from Liverpool.

THE OPORTO MARKET.—The Marine and Fisheries Department had this telegram from Oporto to-day: "Thirty-five to 38 shillings; large; 30 to 32, small. Fish very scarce."

Glencoe in Port.

The s.s. Glencoe, Capt. Cyrus Taylor, arrived here at noon to-day via Bay Bulls and Port aux Basques from Louisburg. She left the latter port on Monday, Feb. 12th, at 10 p.m. In order to get clear of the ice Capt. Taylor kept to the south 10 miles. He found ice very heavy there and had to steam back to the N. E. and look for an opening. He found a lake and went south again about 15 miles till the ship was out in the strain of Scattered ice. The ice was very heavy and running together. When the wind increased and the sea bove in the Glencoe got caught in a firm grip, where she could not move. She remained in the ice till Saturday morning, having driven out on the Mizzen Bank, 60 miles to sea. At 2 a.m. Saturday last the wind came from the N. W. with intense frost. The gale of the day before had broke up the ice and the ship was free next day. Capt. Taylor put her for Port aux Basques and got in there 7 a.m. Monday. Leaving there 6 p.m. same day a lot of ice was met in strings coming down the coast, and at Cape Race it was very heavy and closely packed, so that they had a hard time getting round after leaving Trepassay, Tuesday, at 11 a.m. The ship left and got into Bay Bulls at 8 a.m. yesterday and lay there till 10:20 this morning, when the ice moved off and a good run was made down the shore. Nine saloon passengers came from Louisburg and 25 from Port aux Basques, who had been waiting there to go on to Sydney; also 15 steerage passengers. Capt. Taylor speaks well of the Glencoe's qualities. Four passengers from Boston on the ship went fishing for cod through the ice on Mizzen Bank last Thursday week. They were all delighted with the unique experience. The mail brought by the ship is a very large one. Some of the passengers drove in from Bay Bulls overland last evening.

The Portia Here.

The s.s. Portia, Capt. T. Fitzpatrick, arrived here at 7 p.m. to-day from the westward, bringing considerable fish, &c., as cargo. The ship going up to "bannel" and on the return had a succession of show storms and had to put into several ports going and returning. Channel was beset by heavy slob ice and the ship found it difficult to get out, but Capt. Fitzpatrick was equal to the emergency and did the trick neatly. All the way down the coast the ship encountered heavy slob ice, and at 2 p.m. yesterday she got into Fermeuse, where she harbored for the night. She had all she could do to get into that port, which filled quickly with slob with yesterday's gale. Her passengers were: Messrs. L. C. Mullins, Geo. Rose, Tibbo, T. Handigan, J. W. McParlane, P. E. Lake, H. Lake, A. Mille, T. Murphy, T. Pike, W. Gooby, M. Litzzy, W. Butler, A. Giovanni, P. Power, J. H. Moore, M. J. White, L. Cashin; Mesdames White, Moray, Simoni; Misses Arnott, Condon and 23 steerage.

Off Cape Race.

The Furness Co. to-day had a message from Cape Race saying that the s.s. "Albion" was in a very large slob east of the Cape and working in for the open water with the ice moving rapidly off shore. She should arrive here about 5 p.m. She left Halifax Saturday morning last, is six days out to-day and has been on the coast knocking about in the slob ice since Monday morning.

While the local train which is now on here way here since Saturday last from Carbonar was this side of Avondale yesterday, in forcing

through the snow drifts with a double header the plow going before the engine became caught and the advance engine of the two ahead of the train which were going at great speed went completely through it and smashing it in pieces. Not often does such an accident occur, and when it happened the train hands believed that the en-

gines had gone off the track. They, however, escaped damage. Yesterday 60 men went to work on this end of the line and cleared the rails to Mt. Pearl and will continue up the track.

Men Driven Off

Hon. R. Watson received a message from Heart's Delight last night informing him that four men who had gone out on the ice in the morning were unable to get back to land as the wind had changed and taken the ice from the shore. The Colonial Secretary made arrangements at once with the Nfld. Produce Co. to send the s.s. Fogota out in search of the men. The wind blew a strong breeze just then from the S.E. and the weather was thick, so that it would be risky to send a steamer out till the storm abated. The message which Mr. Albert Case sent to the Colonial Secretary said that the four men were then about six miles from the shore between Heart's Desire and Heart's Delight and that there was no hope of them getting ashore unless a steamer was sent. The Fogota went out about 1.20 o'clock this morning. Meantime the telegraph offices in Trinity Bay were ordered to be kept open all night. There was some difficulty in getting a crew together, but seven men working on Crosbie's premises volunteered to go and this avoided a further delay. About 8 o'clock this morning Hon. R. Watson, who was up all night and in touch with the telegraph offices, received a message from Heart's Content saying that the four men were seen at daylight walking in over the ice towards Selly Cove and that a boat was then putting off to go to the edge of the ice and take them on board. The change of wind had canted the ice towards the south side of Trinity Bay again and gave the men a chance for their lives.

Bible Society's Annual Meeting.

About 800 persons attended the annual meeting of the Nfld. Bible Society in the College Hall last night. His Excellency the Governor, who was accompanied by Lieut. Gen. A.D.C. was greeted on his arrival at the hall with the National Anthem. This was followed by a hymn, Scripture lesson and prayer, by Rev. J. Sutherland. The President, Hon. H. J. B. Woods, then made a short address on the object of the meeting and announced that the Governor had kindly consented to take the chair. His Excellency having done so delivered an eloquent address during which he dwelt on the great work that the Society was doing in spreading the knowledge of the Scriptures. He gave several personal experiences of instances wherein incalculable good had been done by the spread of the Gospel. After hymn No. 2 was sung, Rev. J. Thackeray read the annual report which indicated a successful year and the accomplishment of a great amount of work. The Lord Bishop then spoke of the reach of the Gospel while the Bible was read by millions. It was now translated into so many languages that its pages could be read by seven tenths of the population. At the present time but a small proportion of the world's population had been reached and a strong effort is now being made to put the Gospel within the reach of those remaining. A third hymn was then rendered, after which Rev. D. Rogers arose and in a forceful address spoke of the spread of the Bible. It spread out like a tree over the earth, the fruit thereof being the spiritual results in the soul of those who read its pages. Hymn 5 was then rendered, whereupon a vote of thanks was proposed to the officers and the Committee by Mr. C. S. Pimentel, seconded by Mr. E. Murray. It was carried unanimously. After Hymn No. 6, His Excellency was accorded a vote of thanks, proposed by J. Bell, seconded by Ensign Hargrove, S.A. The Lord Bishop then imparted the Benediction after which this most encouraging and successful meeting of the year, the musical part of the programme was ably handled by Mr. W. H. Stirling.

Mr. Patrick Dalton Dead.

Mr. Patrick Dalton, the well-known resident of Monkstown Road, was found dead in his bed at his late residence, Maxse Street, this morning. Deceased in his early days worked as a miner and made a good bit of money at Tilt Cove, Bett's Cove and Little Bay. He was a most hard-working and industrious man and would never be a day idle in winter as well as in summer if he could possibly avoid it. In recent years he worked for the City Council, and although he was past the age when most men are able to put in a good day's work, Mr. Dalton could do his share as well as the men half his age. He leaves a widow, but no children. His wife was Mrs. Kinella, daughter of the late Mr. John Kinella, of King's Road, and sister of Mr. Dan Kinella, miner, of this city, and of James Kinella, of Brookton, and Mr. Patrick J. Brophy, of Brookton, Mass. Deceased was born in Ireland and was about 70 years of age. He came to this country with his brother, Michael, deceased, when Tilt Cove was first started, and worked with him on the "blasting contracts," in which they were very successful.

Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.

LONDON, Feb. 22. Counter demonstrations on a vast scale in reply to that addressed by Churchill and Redmond are arranged for Easter Tuesday in Belfast, the speakers being Bonar Law, Carson and the Duke of Abercorn. There will be a high procession in which over 100,000 Unionists will march to the meeting place.

LONDON, Feb. 22. During the present year Parliament will be asked to authorize the construction of the railway and harbour for Galway, with a view to the establishment of a Galway-Halifax route by which it is claimed that the Atlantic passage could be completed in from 2½ to 3½ days. The Bill being a non-contentious one, hopes are expressed that these works will be begun early next year.

LONDON, Feb. 22. A sensational announcement in the Welsh coal trade is the statement that the British Admiralty has arranged for supplies of American coal to be delivered at Gibraltar or Vigo. The steamers Blenheim and Teespool have been chartered in London and will load 17,000 tons at Norfolk, Virginia and Newport News early in March. It is believed that further charterings will take place. It is understood the Admiralty wishes to reserve what Welsh coal is available.

LONDON, Feb. 22. A circular announcing the Irish National banquet on St. Patrick's Day, at which John Redmond will preside, states that it is expected that the Home Rule Bill to which the Nationalists confidently look forward for the realization of their country's hopes will be introduced into the House of Commons shortly before the date of the banquet. The circular bears the signature of two Irish members of Parliament, McVeagh and Keating, thus giving importance to the statement that the Bill will be introduced during the second week in March.

MONTREAL, Feb. 22. Justice Charbonneau gave judgment this morning in the famous Hebert case in favour of the wife. He practically holds that any officer authorized to solemnize marriage can marry any two persons who observe the ordinary formalities, including the marriage license, no matter what their religion may be. The judge holds that the Ne Temere decree has no effect against the civil code, which he holds authorizes all persons who are allowed to keep registers by civil statutes to marry parties. As to the marriage of Emma Clontare and Eugene Hebert, solemnized by Rev. Wm. Timmerlake, a Methodist minister, authorized to keep a register under the civil statutes, July 14th, 1908, he holds that it was performed legally.

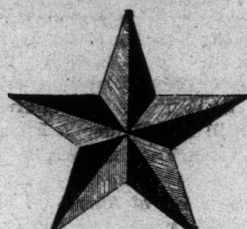

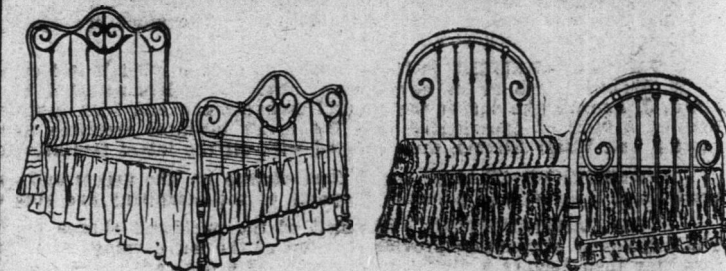
