



Valuable Ruins Uncovered.

ARCHAEOLOGISTS GREATLY IN-

(Associated Press)-Dr. Keramopoulos, one of the Greek inspectors of antiquities, has accomplished some most interesting work in the ruins of the palace at Thebes. According to legend, this place was founded by Cadmus, who is said to have first brought the alphabet to Greece. In previous campaigns, the remains of the fresco decoration of the earlier palace, 1600 to 1400 B.C., were brought to light. This consisted largely of a frieze of elaborately dressed and colflured women carrying flowers. painted jugs, or ivory boxes. This year the excavator has found some of the store-rooms of the later palace, 1400 to 1100 B.C. From these there have been extracted a hundred or more big stirrup jars. They are unfortunately broken but they can be put together again. A considerable number of these jars have painted on them inscriptions in the still undecipherable Mycenean alphabet. The letters, or rather signs, are of a hieroglyphic character and are derived but differ from the well known and equally undecipherable Cretan pre-historic alphabet. Scientists believe it possible that the difference of alphabet means a difference of language. However much professors may dispute about the meaning and character of these alphabets, Athens archaeological circles attach special

commencing at 11 a.m. His Excellency and Ministers, feeling sure that the people of this ancient and loyal Colony desire to perpetuate the memory of our great deliverance and of those who laid down their lives to achieve it, direct that such observance shall take place throughout this Colony, and that at 11 a.m. on Friday next, the 11th instant, all normal activities shall be suspended for the space of two minutes, during which time all thoughts will be concentrated in reverent remembrance

The True Badge of Citizenship.

"Red Michael." of Red Deer. Alberta, or Dr. Michael Clark, is an outstanding public man in Canada. He was the friend and colleague of Gladstone and Grey, when residing in England, fought for an extension of suffrage, and for home rule for Ireland, and in Canada has been the foremost exponent of Free Trade, as Cobden and Bright understood it. As a Laurier Liberal, he became a Progressive, co-operating with leader Crerar until recently, breaking away on the ground that the Agrarian, or Western farmer, movement, was a class or group heresy. He is now a Liberal candidate. Recently, in a speech at Yorkton, Saskatchewan, he made the following

"I broke with the Progressive Party be progressive," declared Dr. Clark, in opening his campaign as Liberal candidate in the Federal constituency of Mackenzie.

One of the largest crowds in the political history of the town formed his audience. Dr. Clark stated that within the last few months the Progressive movement took on an "illiberal, narrow, intolerant and purely class aspect." Within the last few months movement had degenerated into a narrow autocratic class movement. My views about certain class movements are not the growth of the past few months. On March 5, 1920, speaking in Parliament, I used this language, "With what has fallen from these gentlemen about any one class permanently ruling this country I am in absolute agreement. The only logical and effective method is to combine upon common policy, sincerely held, as making for the public good, for which all should combine" He had been dubbed a political chamleon by critics but he reminded these that the chameleon merely changed the color of his skin, underneath he remained the same."

"Our outlook must be dictated by national considerations. We must support these policies we believe to be good, not only for our own class, but for all classes in Canada. Our outlook must be national. This is what influences me in appearing in this constituency as a Liberal candidate."

In another portion of his address, Dr. Clark said : "The caste to which a man belongs is an accidental thing, citizenship is the fundamental thing. Just imagine running society on the principle of herding the inhabitants of a country or province into seperate industrial principles. It is a retrograde step. "Fancy the men of history being re-

membered according to the class to which they belonged. Robert Burns was a farmer, but who thinks of the great bard of Scotland as a member of a class. Manhood and womanhood is the true badge of citizenship today."

Disclaims Responsibility.

DR. GRENFELD DENIES FOREIGN PRESS ALLEGATIONS.

At a meeting of the Grenfell As sociation held yesterday, Dr. Grenfell projects and said further, that he could not accept any responsibility for foreign press allegations unless made over his signature. Several gentlemen present upheld Dr. Grenfell and lauded his work. The Prime Minister suggested that Dr. Grenfell should boost Newfoundland in his future lectures

The meeting was held at Govern-

ment House under the presidency of His Excellency the Governor. There were present, the Lord Bishop of Newfoundland, Sir Joseph Outerbridge, Rev. Canon Bolt, Rev. Dr. Fenwick, Hon. M. G. Winter, C.B.E., Rev. E. C. Earpe, H. W. LeMessurier, C.M.G., Rev. C. H. Johnson, Rev. A. Clayton, Lt. Col. Macpherson, C.M.G., Rev. C. A. Moulton, Rev. R. E. Fairbairn, Messrs. W. C. Job, R. B. Job, W. G. Gosling, A. B. Morine, L. E. Emerson, H. A. Outerbridge, A. E. Hickman, C. McK. Harvey, H. R. Brookes, J. W. Hiscock, E. G. Grant. W. S. Monroe. L. C. Outerbridge, W. Winsor C. P. Ayre, R. F. Horwood, F. R. Emerson, E. R. Watson, and about forty other representatives of the mercantile, legal, medical and fishing community.

The Prime Minister, Sir. Richard Squires, who had expressed a desire to attend, was also present. His Excellency opened the proceedings, briefly stating the object of the meeting, which was to meet and hear Dr. Grenfell, who had recently arrived from St. Anthony and is leaving for Canada to-morrow, and to deal with allegations made not long ago in the foreign press. He then called upon Dr. Grenfell, who, after referring to hospital and other work of the past season, and expressing his profound belief in the future of Labrador, proceeded to deal with the allegations in the foreign press. He described the difficulties he always met with when lecturing, particularly when reporters actually did not attend the lectures. After touching upon an interview he had with the Prime Minister that morning, he requested Sir Richard Squires to let him have a press cutting from an Indianapolis paper shown him on that occasion. This article the doctor read in detail, commenting on it as he went along, and disclaimed responsibility for Mr. Howard or any f his projects. 



Suicide Amid White Flowers

A double love tragedy took place at the Hotel Continental, Paris, recalled in by the hotel authorities, found a wealthy Swiss merchant Geneva named Schaeffer lying fully clothed on the bed. By his side was a beautiful blonde Swiss girl named Marthe Gillabert. Both had evolver bullets in the head. The com was full of white roses, carnations, and wreaths. These floral wreaths, evidently made by the young girl, lay beneath their heads on the pillows. Inquiry elicited the information that Schaeffer, who was 42, was highly respected in Geneva, where he was married. Recently he had been ill, and had been attended by Marthe Gillabert, who was a nurse. The couple fell in love, and Schaeffer, on the pretext of business, Schaeffer and the girl apparently agreed that a happy life was imposs ble for them, and as they could not bear to senarate they took the fatal step of double suicide. Early on Friday the girl went out to the Madeleine flower market, and was seen by the hotel porter returning with her arms full of most beautiful white flowers. From the first examination of the bodies it appears that the girl must have fired both shots, first killing her lover, then turning the weapon on herself. 
