

Search Being Continued.

BODIES NOT YET RECOVERED.

The search for the bodies of the victims of Saturday's tragedy at Big Freshwater Pond, was continued yesterday, last night and this morning without success. Diver Taylor who has had a raft constructed has made the pond are anything but favorable for diving, due to heavy rain and wind. Sir John Crosbie who has been untiring in his efforts to have the bodies located returned from the scene today. He reports that nothing to give a clue to where the accident occurred has yet been discovered, and the only things found so far are the fly book belonging to Mr. Duder, the top of a rod, a dip net, and an enamel mug found in the dory. The bottom of the pond is very rough being strewn with boulders and the men operating trawls and jiggers have experienced much trouble in their efforts. Chains with creepers attached are being used and have worked fairly satisfactory, but owing to the extent of the bottom it will take some time to make thorough overhaul. It is probable that detonators will be used this evening. There is no let up in the search, and continuously it is being carried out. All the implements used in such cases with others designed for emergencies are being utilised, to no purpose, however, and up to press hour no location of the bodies had been made. In many cases readers were under the impression that they could not claim because the securities were held in the names of persons residing in this country. It has occurred to me that there may be others in a like position who carriage with netting, especially if are still under the impression that they have no claim for repayment. I should like to point out to such persons that every British subject who received income which has suffered leduction of tax in this country may recover the whole or part thereof irrespective as to whether the securiies stand in their own names or not. By the last Finance Act the Income Tax was reduced from 6|- to 5|- in the £, and recipients of income from this country should take care that the tax is deducted at the lower rate in fu-



(Third Instalment.) (6) When a player plays the ball any player of the same side who at such moment of playing is nearer to his opponent's goalline is out of play, and may not touch the ball himself, nor in any way whatever interfere with an opponent, or with the play, until the ball has been again played, unless there are at such a moment at least three of his opponents nearer their own goal-line. A player is not out of play when the ball is kicked off from goal, when a corner kick or a throw-in is taken, when the hall has been last played by an opponent, or when he himself is within his own half of the field of play at the moment the ball is played by any player of the same side (7) When the ball is played behind the goal-line by a player of the opposite side, it shall be kick-

ed off by any one of the players behind whose goal-line it went, within that half of the goal area nearest the point where the ball left the field of play; but if played behind by any one of the side whose goal-line it is, a player of the opposite side shall kick it from within one yard of the nearest corner flag-

(7) In either case an opponent shall not be allowed within ten (formerly six) yards of the ball until it is kicked off.

The goalkeeper may within his own penalty area use his hands, but not carry the ball. The goalkeeper shall not be charged, except when he is holding the ball, or obstructing an opponent, or when h ehas passed outside the goal area. The goalkeeper may be changed during the game, but notice of such change must first be given to the Referee.

(9) Neither tripping, kicking, striking, nor jumping at a player shall be allowed. A player the goalkeeper within his own penalty area excepted) shall not intentionally handle the ball. A player shall not use his hands to hold or push an opponent. Charging is permissible but it must not be violent or dangerous. A player shall not be charged from behind, unless he is intentionally obstructing an opponent.


