



> ABANDONS HISTORIC PREMISES IN FAVOR OF NEW QUARTERS ON THAMES EMBANKMENT AND WITH IT GOES THE CANADIAN PRESS.

An important event in the history of this old established organization is shortly to happen; it is removing from the editorial quarters which it has occupied in London for more than half a century. While the name Reuters is familiar to every newspaper reader and is a household word in many parts of the British Empire, probably few people, even in the metropolic, could state the location of the famous news agency. Like other institutions of international repute, the offices are situated in one of the narrow thoroughfares of the city, not far from the Bank of England and the Mansion House. They have a modest exterior. 

London's Ugly Duckling Scoffs

AT KINGSWAY'S SMUG RESPECT-

London, Oct. 29. (Canadian Press). This month saw the 17th anniversary of Kingsway and Aldwych. Those who regarded it as practically cerain that this great development would have a direct and almost immediate effect upon the neighboring Strand have been doomed to disappointment, says a writer in the Observer. He continues: Even as Kingsway and Aldwych have become, month by month, more gleamingly respectable, and increasingly unintersting, so has the Strand worn its tatterdemalion garments with an most famous street in the world seems to take a positive delight in being disreputable. It is no exaggeration to describe the Strand as the most famous street in the world. Its name is as full of magic to the Briton and the stranger in all parts of the earth as is the conjurer's wand to the child eager to be fascinated and mystified. Its story is a large slice out of the history of England, yet it is the ugly duckling of London's thoroughfares.

This condition of things is all the more remarkable when one remembers-and it is, easy to forget sometime, what architectural treasures the Strand possesses. Streets Law Courts! For all the abuse that has been showered upon this wonderful mass of Portland stone by the anti-neo-Gothic folk there is not one of us who is not secretly, or openly, proud of it. Wren's Middle Temple Gateway is just without the Strand, but yet seems of it. Westward there stands, sentinel-wise, the Wren-Gibbs Church of St. Clement-Danes, something to prepare the eye for the exquisite church of Mary-le-Strand, by Gibbs. This island church has for companionship Somerset House, one of the rarest examples of eighteenth century architecture, and the new Bush Building(the most fascinating block of offices set up in London during the present century. Australia House, the Morning Post Office, and the new Gaiety Theatre with its "most decorative blank wall in Europe," are all fine structures which should save any street from the fate which seems to have overtaken the Strand. Beyond Wellington Street are vast hotels, popular theatres, well-known restaurants, a famous hospital, and a great terminal railway station. Add to all this the fact that the Strand is the great historic highway that carries the Court to the City, and the lawyer and the business man to their clients in the West End, and what more do you want?

As a | shopping thoroughfare the street has taken on an adventitious character that would bring blushes to the cheek of the Edgeware Road. Importune traders stand by their doorways soliciting the custom of the passers-by. Cheap clothing, passport photos, surplus war stocks, picture post-cards—anything is good enough to sell in the Strand to-day. The old-fashioned shops with tradition behind them can be counted on the fingers of one hand, leaving the thumb out at that. To all intents and purposes the Strand to-day is three-quarters of a mile of penny-gaff.

But now, at last, some real improvements are about to be effected which should radically alter this state of things. The widening opposite the new Tivoli was but an earnest of what was to come. In a week or two the housebreaker will be busy upon two large sections of shabby old buildings possessed of no architectural merit, and in their place will rise up magnificent blocks of offices and shops, set fifteen feet back from the present street-line, and built of Portland stone. The elevations will follow a definite architectural idea, and fortuitous building will be, as far as possible, avoided.

OTTAWA, Ont., Nov. 2—(Canadian Press)—Canada's beauty spots, her home life, industries and sports are becoming known the world over through the activities of the Canadian Government Motion Picture Bureau, where information films in the "Seeing Canada" series are being constantly turned out for world-wide distribution.

It has been estimated that these "Seeing Canada" films are shown to an monthly audience of five million persons in the United States alone. These films are in great demand in Great Britain and are also being shown in France, Belgium, Switzerland, South Africa, India, South America, China, Japan, Australia New Zealand, the

Straits Settlements and elsewhere.

So great is the demand for pictures of this series that the Department has been compelled to enlarge its laboratories. Recently it moved into new quarters and with added equipment is able to turn out almost four times its previous output. Now the department is capable of an output of almost 200,000 feet of motion pictures a month while its output of still pictures number nearly 10,000 a year.
