DEATH OF THE BISHOP OF MONTREAL. -The Right Reverend Francis Fulford, D.D., Anglican Bisnop of Montreal and Metropolitan of Canada, died on Wedesday evening, shortly after six o'clock in Montreal, aged 65 years. He was made Bishop in 1850, when he came out to Montreal. In 1859 he was appointed by Royal Letters Patent "Metropolitan Bishop of Canada." The Provincial Synod, which met on Wednesday morning, adjourned till the following day pending his severe!!lness. The late Bishop was noted for his learning, his high Christian character, and his administrative capacity; and his removal will be deep felt by the Anglican Church in this country.
