

The Brodie Case Once More.

Mr. Brodie, the late Crown Lands Valuator for the North Riding, publishes a letter in the Elora Times, in answer to our remarks on his case last week. He denies having tried to influence Mr. Hanson to vote for Mr. Drew at the next election, which he says he can prove by gentlemen who were present, but whose names he does not give. The question of veracity must now be settled between Mr. Brodie and Mr. Hanson. The latter made the deliberate statement to us and to others that Mr. Brodie had tried to influence him in favour of Mr. Drew. Had Mr. Hanson sent us a letter retracting this statement under his own signature, we would have published it at once. But in place of that we received one in Mr. Brodie's handwriting, with Mr. Hanson's name signed to it, which we declined to accept or publish. Mr. Brodie says:—"The letter which was only a copy certainly was in my handwriting at the request of Mr. Hanson, but not his signature, and then to be forwarded by him to Mr. Innes, and Hanson told me before witnesses he had done so." Mr. Brodie is mistaken in the above statement, for Mr. Hanson's signature is in his handwriting, as anyone who examines it can testify. We have all the documents in our possession yet, and if Mr. Brodie thinks we are doing him an injustice he can have a look at the letter any time he chooses.

If Mr. Hanson agreed to this so-called retraction which Mr. Brodie sent to members of the Legislature and to us, is it not strange that he did not acknowledge its genuineness and request us to publish it when we wrote him asking for an explicit denial to it direct from himself? And it is stranger still that he should afterwards personally disavow the statements made in that letter, and in a subsequent letter to us say that he held the party who wrote it responsible for such statements it contained.

Mr. Brodie denies having attempted to frighten Mr. Hanson into making a retraction. We accept the denial, but at the same time cannot but think it strange that Mr. Hanson should admit that he had been threatened with all sorts of law suits &c., if he did not make the required retraction. We are unable to reconcile the two statements, and must leave that task to Mr. Brodie and Mr. Hanson.

We should not have taken so much notice of this matter but for the impudence of Mr. Brodie and his friends, who have tried to make out "a case of oppression" against the Ontario Government, but have signally failed. As regards our own share in the transaction, we feel that we have done right, and that, under the circumstances, we could not have acted otherwise than we have done. It rests with Mr. Brodie and Mr. Hanson to reconcile their contradictory statements, and we recommend them to do so—if such a thing is possible—before any more is said on the matter.

EDITORIAL NEWS.

We regret to learn that Mr. John Sandfield Macdonald is considered to be dangerously ill at his residence in Cornwall.

This London Spectator, in commenting on the fishery correspondence, charges the people of Canada with being "wonderfully mean-spirited," because in cool blood we ask for a bribe. It pictures us crying out: "Please, sir, I've been kicked, and if you don't give me sweeties I shall cry."

Where are the old-fashioned Tories gone to, that we hear so few of them raising their voices against this degradation, which Sir John A. Macdonald has brought on us?

The Boston Commercial Bulletin, in reference to the Canadian Pacific Railway says, we cannot have too many competing lines of travel and transportation across the continent, and the time is certainly not far distant when the entire coast line on the Pacific will be so densely populated and its commerce with Asiatic nations so vast, that all the lines now existing or contemplated will be inadequate to accommodate the trans-continental traffic.

The Committee of Privileges have postponed further proceedings in regard to the Marquette election for six weeks, thus practically evading a decision during the session. Had not Sir George E. Cartier obstinately refused to allow action to be taken last session, this act of injustice to the electors of Marquette and the candidates would have been avoided. Both the gentlemen interested are at Ottawa, and each asserts his readiness to defend his claim to the seat, if time be allowed; but it is obvious that no proceedings could result in a satisfactory decision being arrived at before the prorogation of the House.

Lots Nos. 9 and 10, King street, sold to Mr. Alfred Armstrong, who is fencing the same, and is going to build thereon next season. Lot No. 6, King street, sold to Mr. Adam Murchie, which will be fenced and built upon immediately. Lot No. 7, King street, sold to John Read. He also intends to build during the summer. The doctor looked at it for a very little; then shook his head.



REMEMBERABLE GENEROSITY.—As an evidence that the men now at the head of affairs at Ottawa do not feel at all certain that the country will endorse their policy at the coming election, a contemporary points out the significant fact, that they are holding out material inducements to doubtful constituencies, to lead them to return members whose representatives who will vote to maintain the present Government in power. Usually constituencies have to ask, and ask again, for appropriations for public purposes; but with a generosity without a parallel, the present Ottawa Government have advanced a large sum in the estimates for the improvement of the navigation of the St. Lawrence, for the special benefit of Montreal, though no grant for that purpose was sought. In like manner, a despatch was sent to the Toronto City Council a few days ago, conveying the information that if that body would grant \$200,000 from the City funds for the improvement of their harbor, the Government would add \$200,000 more for that purpose. "Straws show which way the wind blows," and these straws indicate pretty clearly that the Government feel the necessity of courting the support of these important constituencies, which they usually could reckon on without any special inducements. And if they feel their position to be ticklish in such places as Montreal and Toronto, what can the prospect be in the rural constituencies, where the electors are neither to be bought nor sold "like beads in the shambles," but are guided by principle, and will spurn those who would attempt to cheat them out of their birthright, by material compensation of any description!—Sarcina Observer.

It is predicted that Lake Erie, now the pathway of a mighty convulsion, will in time dry up and become the home of a teeming population. Careful surveys have shown that Lake Michigan has an average depth of 1,800 feet, Lake Superior of 900 feet and Lake Ontario of 500 feet. Lake Erie has an average depth of 120 feet, which is said to be constantly decreasing. The bottom of the lake is quite level, and composed of soft clay. This clay is constantly accumulating from sediment carried down by tributary streams. The south shore is composed of easily disintegrating blue, gray and olive shales and grey sandstone. The western and northern coasts are made up of limestone of the Helderberg group, which quickly yields to the action of the waves. Consequently both shores constantly are contributing to fill up the bed of the lake. The work is not rapid, but it is said to be as sure as fate.
