He begged for a wider personal sympathy, and above all, that a larger number of the active workers among the women of Victoria should attend the regular meetings of the Anti-Tuberculosis Society during the coming year. Such great attention and sympathy were evinced during Dr. Fagan's address, that it may be assumed he will find all he desires in the future.


